## The Blind Boys will headline IWU's fifth annual MLK Day celebration

Indiana Wesleyan University's fifth annual MLK Celebration on Friday, January 12, at 7 pm in the Phillippe Performing Arts Center will feature The Blind Boys of Alabama.

The annual free public concert commemorates the life and legacy Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and marks what would have been his 89th birthday.

"We are excited to have them on campus," said Vicky Kinder, assistant to the vice president for multicultural enrichment and employee development at IWU. "If you don't already have your tick-

et, you'll want to be sure you get one. The event is free to attend, but a ticket is required."

The American gospel group was launched by a group of friends, Clarence Fountain, Jimmy Carter, George Scott, Velma Bozman Traylor, Johnny Fields, Olice Thomas, and the only sighted member, J. T. Hutton, in the Talladega Institute for the Blind chorus in 1939. Today, The Blind Boys continue working with a legendary 70-year recording career, five GRAMMY Awards, one Lifetime Achievement Award,

## Two restaurants opening in downtown Marion

One new restaurant has opened in downtown Marion and another plans to soon. Miles to Go, described by its owner Margaret Miles as a "Carryout Café," opened on Monday, January 8, at 5th Street, in the old Grand's Hamburger Stand.

The café will be open from 7 am-3 pm, Monday through Friday, serving breakfast and lunch.

"The building is small, with limited seating," said Miles in an email, "however we have put a lot of hard work into the inside to transform the space into a comfortable, inviting and smoke-free atmosphere."



The restaurant was scheduled to open on January 2, but a broken water main delayed the opening for a week.

Miles says that the foods will

be served at a fast pace to accommodate the earlier morning customer that would like breakfast on the way to work and the lunch hour customers that have a limited

amount of time to get a good lunch.

The café will have daily specials and sell fresh fruits, baked goods and specialty sandwiches that are prepared fresh daily.

### Romanda's

The second downtown restaurant will be a second location for Romanda's, the popular Converse restaurant that will serve breakfast and brunch. Romanda's will take over the space that became available when Cazuela's closed last month.

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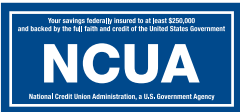

McKinnie said he has been singing gospel for most of his life: “I was brought up in the church singing gospel music. I played drums and been singing since I was a kid.”

They are inspired to create gospel music by “the people. People enjoy what we’re doing; we enjoy doing it,” McKinnie said.

The respected group has collaborated with well-known singers, Mavis Staples, Stevie Wonder, Prince and Lou Reed.

Excited about the opportunity to honor Dr. King with their music, McKinnie said: “Just tell them that The Boys are back in town, and they’re going to have a great time.”

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# The ‘Great American Songbook’ gets underwritten

At the far end of four flights of stairs, high atop the grandeur that is the Palladium Theater in Carmel, just off Range-line Road, is an American treasure.

Right now it is tucked away up there. Out of the way, protected, available to those who know what they seek.

It is the collection of the Great American Songbook Foundation, a grand attempt to preserve our past nurtured by Michael Feinstein, along with Harry Connick, Jr., and a few others, to keep alive the finest moments in American popular music. You’ve certainly seen Feinstein at one time or another on TV: The tuxedo, the charm, the voice that is, well, let’s just say that, like Sinatra, you can understand every word that he sings.

That’s what the American Songbook is: Words and music, carefully crafted by men like our own Cole Porter and Hoagy Carmichael and Irving Berlin and Johnny Mercer and Jerome Kern and the

Gershwin brothers, George and Ira--interpreted by talents like Sinatra and Crosby and Ella Fitzgerald and Sarah Vaughn and Rosemary Clooney with music by Glen Miller and Duke Ellington and the Dorsey brothers. The lists of all go on and on. The collection has more than 100,000 pieces, including 40,000 pieces of sheet music.

We of our time like to think that rock and roll was our gift to the world. It was not. What was our gift, of course, was jazz

and the written record of all that is in the permutations in the Great American Songbook. Popular single songs, written and orchestrated to be performed on the piano in the living room or by a soloist in a saloon, or elaborate musical ensembles designed for Broadway production, or the music of the Big Bands, because “it don’t mean a thing if it ain’t got that swing.”

Last week the future preservation and presentation of that Songbook became a little more--a lot more--secure with the announcement that the Simon family--mainly Bren Simon in memory of her late husband Herb--is giving the \$30 million Simon estate called Asherwood to the Great American Songbook Foundation to create a home, a museum on a grand scale even beyond the dreams of Mr. Feinstein. Simon was an owner of the Indianapolis Pacers and made his millions in the shopping mall business.

Not unlike the day when another Indianapolis woman, Ruth Lilly, forever changed American literature when she gave \$300 million to the long-suffering Poetry magazine, a gesture that would ensure that the art form would flourish for another

times we have an idea or a thought and then another thing occurs in our lives that we never could have expected that causes a sea change in our journey.”

Or, to quote from that American Songbook, “first the tide rushes in . . .”

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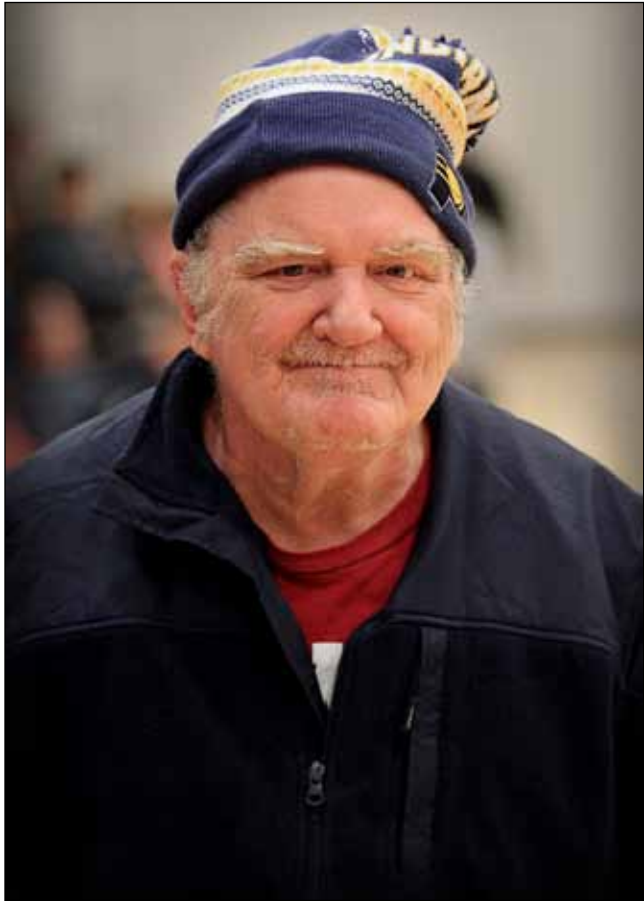

After some impressive basketball in recent weeks, the Marion Giants' seven-game win streak was snapped on Saturday night, as they were defeated by Fort Wayne South Side, 92-81. With the loss, the Giants dropped to 8-2 on the season.

Jalen Blackmon led the Giants with 21 points, while Latrell Simpson finished with 16 and JK Thomas added 15. Tyrese Cobb scored 12 and Dre Aguilar chipped in 11 points in the loss.

**Mississinewa**

After a disappointing third-place finish in the Grant Four tournament back on December 23, the Mississinewa Indians started off the second part of their season with another poor outing, as multiple miscues cost them in a 74-55 loss to Southwood on Wednesday night.

"We turned the ball over 24 times," Head Coach Andrew Evertts said after the loss. "Regardless of how well we play, we are very rarely going to win if we turn the ball over that many times. The majority of them were in the first half, so we dug ourselves a hole. We battled back pretty well--we got it down to two on two separate occasions late in the third quarter--but then they went on a run early in the fourth, and we ran out of steam."

The Mississinewa offense struggled most of the evening against the Southwood defense, not just against the press, but also in the half-court. "They pressured us [quite a bit]," Evertts said. "We knew that was going to happen, but we didn't run our press breakers well to start the game. But we also had a lot of turnovers in the half-court. We had a lot of guys with a lot of turnovers."

Thabit Gault continues to be a bright spot for the Indians despite their struggles, leading the Indians against Southwood with 17 points and 12 rebounds. For his career, Gault now has 508 rebounds and is the fourth-leading rebounder in the state of Indiana.

"I'm so happy for him," Evertts said of Gault. "He's such a good kid, and I can't say enough good things about him. He's worked his butt off and done great things for this program."

The Indians are 5-5 and are not where Evertts wants them to be at this point of the season, but he still believes that his team will right the ship here in the coming weeks.

"I know we are struggling, but I still think we are going to turn this around," Evertts said. "The last two days of practice have been great--some of our best practices of the season. I think we are fine. We have played a really tough schedule [so far], but this is the time of the year, every year, that we get roll-

ing."

**Oak Hill**

The Oak Hill Golden Eagles went 1-1 over the weekend, defeating Peru on Friday night 75-59 before losing to nationally ranked Covington Catholic, 69-53, on Saturday. Against Peru, the Golden Eagles took an early lead and did not relinquish it, playing well on both sides of the ball, especially in the first 16 minutes.

"We had a very good first half of overall good basketball," Head Coach Kevin Renbarger said. "We did a pretty good job of limiting a team that is very athletic and wants to score in the lane to perimeter jump shooting."

Four Golden Eagles finished in double figures against Peru, led by Spencer Ballinger's 23. David Arens finished with 21 points, while Caleb Middlesworth scored 17 points. Tyce Frank rounded out the group with 10 points in the victory.

Arens, in particular, has really stepped up his game up in recent weeks, particularly on the offensive end. "David has surrendered himself to concentrating on all facets of the game other than scoring the basketball," Renbarger said. "I think when he did this he didn't put so much pressure on himself to score, which means he let things come to him much more."

Against Covington Catholic, Oak Hill fell into a hole early and, despite a valiant effort through most of the game, they were unable to recover from the Colonels' early run.

"I think the quick start was a catalyst," Renbarger said. "Covington Catholic got off to a 7-0 start. I think the first quarter start against a team as disciplined and unwilling to make mistakes on either end of the floor is a hole you're not going to get out of."

Several role players really stood out in the game, including Tahj Johnson and Reid Newhouse, who both contributed in several different ways. "Johnson played exceptionally well from beginning to end and I thought Reid Newhouse had his best game of the year," Renbarger said. "He was giving up literally a foot to his opponent and held him to under his averages."

Though the Golden Eagles were defeated, Renbarger hopes that his team will learn from this loss going forward.

"Our kids competed for 3 periods and outside of the first quarter and a half, we played this team relatively even," Renbarger said. "I think I want the kids to learn from the other team more so than what we did or didn't do against them. We had areas of concern that were greatly disturbing and we need to fix, but I want our kids to take notice of how Covington Catholic went about their business in regards to execution on both ends of the floor. The level of competition that [Covington Catholic] provided us is exactly what we need to win [going forward]."

Though the resignation will not be made official until the next School Board meeting, the transition has already begun.

I know that will continue."

"We appreciate Mike Quinn's heart for our student-athletes during his time here," Superintendent Brad Lindsay said. "His character, his integrity, and his caring and friendly attitude toward all made him a valuable part of our team."

James Bell, who teaches health and physical education at Marion High School, will be named interim athletic director, while Mosi Barnes will remain the assistant athletic director.

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
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
