### The Blind Boys will headline IWU's fifth annual MLK Day celebration

Indiana Wesleyan University's fifth annual MLK Celebration on Friday, January 12, at 7 pm in the Phillippe Performing Arts Center will feature The Blind Boys of Alabama

The annual free public concert commemorates the life and legacy Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and marks what would have been his 89th birthday.

"We are excited to have them on campus," said Vicky Kinder, assistant to the vice president for multicultural enrichment and employee development at IWU. "If you don't already have your tick-

et, you'll want to be sure you get one. The event is free to attend. but a ticket is required."

The American gospel group was launched by a group of friends, Clarence Fountain, Jimmy Carter, George Scott, Velma Bozman Traylor, Johnny Fields, Olice Thomas, and the only sighted member, J. T. Hutton, in the Talladega Institute for the Blind chorus in 1939. Today, The Blind Boys continue working with a legendary 70-year recording career, five GRAMMY Awards, one Lifetime Achievement Award,

### Two restaurants opening in downtown Marion

One new restaurant has opened in downtown Marion and another plans to soon. Miles to Go, described by its owner Margaret Miles as a "Carryout Café," opened on Monday, January 8, at 5th Street, in the old Grand's Hamburger Stand.

The café will be open from 7 am-3 pm, Monday through Friday, serving breakfast and lunch.

"The building is small, with limited seating," said Miles in an email, "however we have put a lot of hard work into the inside to transform the space into a comfortable, inviting and smoke-free atmosphere."



The restaurant was scheduled to open on January 2, but a broken water main delayed the opening

Miles says that the foods will

be served at a fast pace to accommodate the earlier morning customer that would like breakfast on the way to work and the lunch hour customers that have a limited

amount of time to get a good lunch.

The café will have daily specials and sell fresh fruits, baked goods and specialty sandwiches that are prepared fresh daily.

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





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### The 'Great American Songbook' gets underwritten

t the far end of four flights of stairs, high atop the grandeur that is the Palladium Theater in Carmel, just off Rangeline Road, is an American treasure.

Right now it is tucked away up there. Out of the way, protected, available to those who know what they seek.

It is the collection of the Great American Songbook Foundation, a grand attempt to preserve our past nurtured by Michael Feinstein, along with Harry

Connick, Jr., and a few others, to keep alive the finest moments in American popular music. You've certainly seen Feinstein at one time or another on TV: The tuxedo, the charm, the voice that is, well, let's just say that, like Sinatra, you can understand every word that he sings.

That's what the American Songbook is: Words and music, carefully crafted by men like our own Cole Porter and Hoagy Carmichael and Irving Berlin and Johnny Mercer and Jerome Kern and the

Gershwin brothers, George and Ira--interpreted by talents like Sinatra and Crosby and Ella Fitzgerald and Sarah Vaughn and Rosemary Clooney with music by Glen Miller and Duke Ellington and the Dorsey brothers. The lists of all go on and on. The collection has more than 100,000 pieces, including 40,000 pieces of sheet music.

We of our time like to think that rock and roll was our gift to the world. It was not. What was our gift, of course, was jazz

and the written record of all that is in the permutations in the Great American Songbook. Popular single songs, written and orchestrated to be performed on the piano in the living room or by a soloist in a saloon, or elaborate musical ensembles designed for Broadway production, or the music of the Big Bands, because "it don't mean a thing if it ain't got that swing.

Last week the future preservation and presentation of that Songbook became a little more--a lot more--secure with the announcement that the Simon family--mainly Bren Simon in memory of her late husband Herb--is giving the \$30 million Simon estate called Asherwood to the Great American Songbook Foundation to create a home, a museum on a grand scale even beyond the dreams of Mr. Feinstein. Simon was an owner of the Indianapolis Pacers and made his millions in the shopping mall business

Not unlike the day when another Indianapolis woman, Ruth Lilly, forever changed American literature when she gave \$300 million to the longsuffering Poetry magazine, a gesture that would ensure that the art form would flourish for another century or so. Bren Simon is doing for American popular music what Ruth Lilly did for American poetry: Giving life to art forms that have faded from favor in the public arena.

No one knows just yet how the Simon bequest will play out. What is known is this: The 50,000-square-foot Simon home on 107 acres along Ditch Road is valued at about \$30 million and is being given to the Songbook foundation. Whether the museum will be relocated from Carmel, or whether the estate will be sold with the proceeds going to support the cause is yet to be determined.

Feinstein, a Columbus, Ohio, native and five-time Grammy award winner, settled in Indianapolis when he struck a deal to move his archive, mainly the Ira Gershwin material, to the newly completed Palladium and Center for the Performing Arts in Carmel. Both Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard and Indianapolis business magnate Mickey Maurer were players in that drama. But its obscure location, high above the Palladium stage, hasn't generated traffic. About 6,000 people a year come either by chance or on scholarly purpose.

Said Feinstein, "Some-

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

### Eastbrook wins two; Giants, Eagles take second losses

#### Fasthrook

Coming off their secondplace finish in the Grant Four tournament, the Eastbrook Panthers earned their first win of the new year and fourth of the season with a 60-48 victory over the Muncie Burris Owls on Tuesday evening.

After scoring 11 points in the game's first two minutes, and leading 23-13 after one quarter of play, the Panthers let their foot off the gas ever so slightly in the second quarter, allowing the Owls to cut the lead to 37-29 heading into halftime.

However, the Panthers opened the second half with a 12-2 run to take an 18-point lead they would not relinquish.

Ryan Mansbarger, who has had a nice string of games over the last few weeks, continued his strong play against the Owls, leading the Panthers in scoring with 26 points.

"Ryan has shown a lot of

leadership," Head Coach Brian Childs said. "He is taking good quality shots, he is getting to the rim a lot, and he is getting to the free throw line more this year than he did last year. That is making his game much more efficient."

Along with Mansbarger, starting point guard Capone Johnson was another big part of the Panthers' success, scoring 15 points while leading the team in both rebounds and assists.

"Capone's play was [excellent]," Childs said. "He did a good job of getting everyone involved, and he has been really good here the last four or five years. I can tell that he is starting to settle into what varsity basketball is all about, as well as finding himself.

"[All in all], the kids were feeling pretty good and pretty confident. We got to play a lot of kids tonight, and everybody made a contribution. It was a good team win." The Panthers came away with their second impressive win in as many games, as they defeated the Cowan Blackhawks 73-35 on Saturday night. With the win, the Panthers are back at .500.

"We kind of got off to a sluggish start, but then all of the sudden, we got a couple of steals, we got a couple of baskets, and then we found a rhythm offensively," Childs said. "On defense, we pressed a bit and then created some turnovers. Last night was another great team win. It was a nice carryover [from the Burris game] to get us back to .500 heading into a tough game with Oak Hill."

Coming off two impressive wins, Childs believes that his team's confidence will be high heading into their big matchup with stateranked Golden Eagles.

"Well, I think that anytime you can string together consecutive wins, it's good," Childs said. "The kids are feeling pretty good with where they are at right now. We've got a tough stretch of games coming up here, but I think we feel about as good as we can heading into the Oak Hill game on Friday."

To be able to come away with a victory, Childs knows that his team must be offensively efficient throughout the whole game.

"I think the biggest thing we need to do is to keep scoring on Friday," Childs said. "The problem in the Grant Four game is we were hanging in there, but then we went through a little scoring drought. You can't do that against a team like Oak Hill. They are awfully efficient defensively, so we have to find ways to keep putting the ball in the basket to be able to give ourselves a chance."

Mansbarger finished with 20 points and Bryce Schamber added 12, while Johnson chipped in nine points and 10 assists in the loss.

The Madison-Grant Argylls finished 1-1 over the weekend, dropping an 85-65 decision to the Blackford Bruins on Friday before defeating the Northfield Norsemen 58-55 on Saturday.

The Argylls fell behind early, 16-2, against Blackford, and never recovered. Bruins' freshman Luke Brown finished the game with 35 points, and the Argylls' defense was unable to stop Blackford's offense.

"We just did not do a very good job defensively [against Blackford]," Head Coach Brian Trout said. "We were not [playing good help side] defense when we needed too. ### Butler falters in second half, falls to Seton Hall

With 9:57 remaining in the second half and an 11-point lead, it seemed that the Butler Bulldogs, fresh off their win over then-No. 1 ranked-Villanova, would earn their second win in as many games over a ranked opponent.

But the No. 21-ranked Seton Hall Pirates proved that they were not about to go down without a fight.

With the Bulldogs leading 65-54, the Pirates' full court press took the Bulldogs out of their game plan, resulting in a 16-3 run that ultimately carried Seton Hall to a 90-87 victory on Saturday afternoon at the Hinkle Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

Seton Hall improved their record to 14-2 and 3-0 in the Big East, while Butler fell to 12-5 overall and 2-2 in league play.

Seton Hall center Angel Delgado who played a remarkable game, was the catalyst in the comeback, as he became the focal point of the offense. He dominated in the post and also showed great touch on his passes to the perimeter, giving Seton Hall guards Khadeen Carrington

and Desi Rodriguez great

looks from beyond the arc. "The main thing we talked about was getting the ball inside consistently, not once out of every five or once out of every six times," Seton Hall Head Coach Kevin Willard said. "Six or seven possessions in a row, we either threw it to [Delgado] or attacked [Butler] off the dribble. I thought we did a good job of getting the basketball inside to Delgado. Once we got the ball consistently inside, we put pressure on [Butler]."

Delgado finished with 28 points and 15 rebounds while also dishing out six assists.

Even though they were trailing, the 6-10 center from the Dominican Republic had no doubt that his team could battle back and earn the win.

"I told the guys, we could be down 20 [and come back], Delgado said. "We've been through this a lot of times. These guys, they know how to handle it."

The Pirates trailed by seven points on three separate occasions in the first half, but trimmed the deficit each time, preventing the

Bulldogs from running away with it.

And in the second half, Butler almost did.

Leading 46-43 early in the second half, the Bulldogs went on a 19-9 run to build their game-high 11-point lead, and, for a moment, seemed to be in control.

Carrington and Delgado had other ideas.

With the Pirates' press shutting down the Bulldogs' offense, Carrington hit three triples in a row and Delgado hit three of four attempts from the charity stripe to help turn a 65-54 deficit into a 70-68 lead in just over three minutes of game action.

The two teams exchanged the lead over the next 4:18, but at the 2:15 mark, Myles Powell, who had been struggling with the flu for most of the week, knocked down a corner three to give the Pirates a lead they would not relinquish.

Butler briefly tied the game at 82, but the Pirates hit their free throws in the closing moments to secure the victory.

"They are a really good team. Credit goes to Coach Willard and their seniors for stepping up and making some huge plays down the stretch," Butler Head Coach LaVall Jordan said. "We knew coming in that it was going to be a battle. In this league, every night, it's going to be a one- or two-possession [game]."

It was a tough loss for the Bulldogs, but it doesn't get any easier for them, as they will face their fourth ranked opponent in row when they travel to Creighton to take on the Blue Jays on Tuesday evening.

Coach Jordan knows that his team has to be ready.

"We can't dwell on [the loss]--we have to move on to the next one," Jordan said. "That's playing in the Big East--nobody is going to feel sorry for us, and we can't feel sorry for ourselves. We have to learn from it, continue to grow, and be ready to compete the next time out."

Kelan Martin led the Bulldogs in scoring with 27 points, while Kamar Baldwin and Henry Baddley each finished with 14. Nate Fowler provided quality minutes off the bench with 11 points and three rebounds in Butler's loss.

Panthers shot just 32 percent from the field, leaving a lot of points out on the floor.

If and when the IWU Wildcats make it back to the NAIA nationals again




