City of Marion launches new web site

The City of Marion launched its new website on Thursday, December 21, culminating an 18-month collaborative design process with Marion Design Co. of Indiana Wesleyan University.

"This is the new way government is going to work," said Marion Mayor Jess Alumbaugh at the launch event.

The new site will have a new, free domain provided by the State of Indiana: www.cityofmarion.

Luke Anspach, co-founder of Marion Design Co. and senior digital designer, presented the new site at the event. "A lot of investment, a lot of process, a lot of research," went into the new site, he

The site is designed to be userfriendly, specifically for city residents. The site has four main categories: living, business, visit and government.

City officials will be able to update content on the site themselves, without commissioning a third party. The new website is also designed to be intuitive, sustainable, and reliable.

The site is meant to be a "new front door to Marion," Anspach told the group at the launch. He listed the other ways it affects the community as:

- a resource hub—the place to go to find information
- enhances two-way communication through the web
- organizes government assets and information
- celebrates the city.

"Go explore" the new site, Anspach said.

Back home in Marion, Bowlds focuses on cancer recovery

born and raised in Marion, returned kindled hope and friendship during his fight with cancer.

Though he grew up in Marion, Bowlds traveled to Los Angeles in 1988 and remained there for 28 years, until he was diagnosed with an incurable blood cancer known as multiple my-

He moved to Los Angeles and worked for Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company for two years before starting work in the film industry for Warner Brothers, HBO, and Fox, on films as an actor, production assistant, and a post-production supervisor.

Karaoke was a favorite pastime with friends, and Bowlds was pulled in through the classic karaoke method: pressure from his

"Some friends of mine were into it, and they dared me to sing a song, so I did, and you know it all went from there," said Bowlds. Shortly after, he started his own business as a disc and karaoke jockey specializing in the rhythm and blues

"It was a lot of fun. I did a lot of celebrity parties because of my contacts with the studio. Those were always a lot of fun," said

hauling gear, Bowlds was immobilized. He felt a pain he never knew and was unable to move anything Several doctors visit followed before the cause of his illness was known.

"I was the person who never got sick and never really went to the hospital I worked out. I kept myself in shape and a very healthy guy. Then, suddenly, after 54 years, I had cancer, and it completely changed everything. It changed my way of thinking and way of life," said Bowlds.

His sister, Lisa Bowlds-Williams, from Marion, asked for a transfer to Los Angeles from her job when she found out about her brother's cancer and lived with him for two months. As his disease progressed, she told her brother they were returning home, and ne couldn't say no.

Williams packed up all his stuff and put it on a train to Chicago. She went up to Chicago and brought everything to her place in Marion, where she set a spot up for her brother. He speaks with another

sister, Jyl Moore, in Texas often as well. "I don't know what I'd do or where I'd be without my family. They're very supportive, very loving," said Bowlds. "They pitched in and got me through this. I went

Bowlds said, "Come to find

from weighing 230 pounds to 160 pounds, and my dad he decided we were going to go to breakfast every morning. He helped me put weight on. We got out of the habit lately, but I want to get back into it, having breakfast with dad again. It was nice. We did it every

The love and support of his family helped him the most, but he also recognizes the support of friends, old and new. During a meeting

"I also have a friend Cathy Nash, who works over there. She was always really supportive. We went to elementary and high school together," said Bowlds. "Good family support and friends in the community they were all very instrumental in keeping my spirits up and not letting me get down.

Since his return home, he has been focused on his treatments for cancer and making a full recovery. His procedures are performed at the Progressive Cancer Center. They did a procedure called a stem cell transplant, in which the doctor took stem cells, referred to as mother cells. out of his blood, before injecting him with chemoradiation treatments. After treatment, the mother cells are returned to the body to begin the healing process.

The procedure has worked. At the end of November, he received a final report that his cancer is in remission, at a count of zero. Knowing this disease typically comes back. Bowlds still seeks prayer, maintains his fitness plan, and continues to hope for the best.

"They are making all kind of breakthroughs in medicine, so hopefully I'll be the first one that beats this disease," said Bowlds.







Recalling the life of Father Solanus Casey

July 31, 1957. He was, apparently, a man who was extraordinary because he was ordinary. He is maybe best described in a few sentences from a St. Felix Center publication: "A simple man. A simple priest. Not a man of letters, although he sometimes wrote like a poet. Not a man of degrees, yet his thought reached to profound depths. In his own time he was far ahead of his time. And, like a prophet, he was a man with

a message for our times." Not to be flip here, but he looked as though he was sent from central casting

"We must be faithful to the present moment," he wrote, " or we will frustrate the plan of God for our






