After 2,100 plastic, yellow ducks floated around a pre-determined track, the top 10 finishers received cash and other prizes.

Lara Davison, who finished 10th, won four season passes for Taylor University football, while ninth place winner Lara Clark received two tickets to a Celtic Thunder concert. Leap Managed IT, which placed eighth, won two passes to King's Island, while Cory Johnson and Lois Watkins won free rounds of golf at Arbor Trace.

The top five winners each won cash, ranging from \$100 to \$1,000. Ruth Madisongale placed fifth and won \$100, while Dawn Brown received \$200 for her fourth place finish. Leap Managed IT had another duck finish in third place, giving them \$300 to go along with their

## Ivy Tech celebrates campus' 10 years with free summer bash

On Saturday, during the 4th Annual Summer Bash, the Ivy Tech Community College campus in Marion celebrated its 10-year anniversary, looking back on Ivy Tech's commitment to helping their students achieve a higher education, as well as fulfill their goals and dreams commitment to helping students achieve a higher education, as well as fulfill their goals and dreams.

The free event included food from Jefferson St. BBQ, cupcakes, snow cones, karaoke, a bungee-cord run, zorb balls, and other games and activities. Furthermore, the affair offered Express Enrollment, in which potential students could complete all

the steps to register for classes.

Since the early 1970s, Ivy Tech—founded as Indiana Vocational Technical College in 1963 and no Indiana's full-fledged community college—has been located in Marion, originally in the old Tucker building. The community petitioned for their own building, and the state of Indiana provided the money needed to complete the first campus specifically built for Ivy Tech in 2008.

"This is our 10th anniversary, and that is what this bash is all about—celebrating our students, celebrating our campus, and celebrating the community," Lonnie Peek, event

organizer, said.

The school focused on technical and vocational education in its early days but has since grown rapidly, now offering more than 150 programs, including cybersecurity, supply chain management logistics, industrial technology and maintenance, transitional nursing, radiology, health care services, general education, and many more.

"Ivy Tech is the community college for the state of Indiana," Alex Huskey, chancellor for the Marion campus, said. "Being a community college, we make sure we have programs that are teaching things that are needed in the work force, but

TIP OF THE HAT...to Upland. The small town in southeast Grant County was the subject of this month's Public Broadcasting show "Now Entering..." which premiered June 23 on WIPB-TV, the fourth in a series of programs highlighting small Indiana towns. The show is described as "a video scrapbook of the people, places and history of towns as seen through the eyes of its residents."

"Upland [is] our biggest 'Now Entering...' program to date," said WIPB Community Engagement Coordinator Michelle Kinsey. "We had more than 30 commu-

nity members sign up to tell stories about the town they love." The WIPB production team traveled to Upland to record interviews at the beautiful former United Methodist Church.

Stories included the Upland Garden Club; the wildly popular "Silent Night" basketball tradition; Light rider Ministries and its beginnings as Wandering Wheels; traveling the Upland Greenways; Ivanhoe's; how Taylor University came to be in Upland; and the history of the Barton Reese Pogue Poetry & Arts Festival. ## DOING GOOD

Each week, The News Herald prepares news of the good being done by individuals and organizations in Grant County for broadcast on WBAT. Here is an adaptation of the transcript of that broadcast.—Ed.

The Community Foundation of Grant County, does some very good things for our community, both through its various donor funds and through its general endowment. Recently, the Foundation announced that it has made grants to three local entities.

These three grants were especially good because they were the Foundation's first-ever Crowdfunding Grants. That means that the organizations that received them were required

to raise a predetermined amount equal to the grant itself within 60 days.

The Community Foundation website tracked all the charitable contributions made by donors for each of the three projects. The first was the Quilter's Hall of Fame, which said it would raise \$4,500 for maintenance of the exterior of the Marie Webster House. The Hall of Fame surpassed their goal by \$1,000, the Foundation granted them the \$4,500 and the quilters received a grand total of \$10,000.

The second project was to raise money for a monument to veterans in downtown Gas City. The public raised more than \$54,000 towards that project, to which the Foundation added \$15,000 for a total of almost \$60,000.

The third and final good

grant went to the Marion High School Alumni Association to buy uniforms for the Giant marching band. They raised \$20,725 and the Foundation kicked in another \$20,000.

All three grants came from the Foundation's Community Impact Fund, which is doing good things for Grant County. The really good news? The Foundation will be making more challenge grants in its August cycle. Your organization can apply on the Foundation's web site: [GiveToGrant.org](http://GiveToGrant.org).

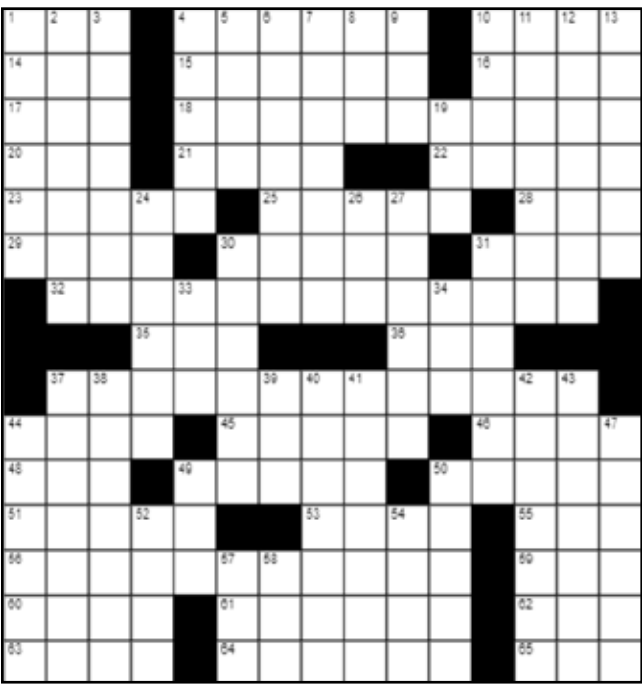

that the people we serve need support, and they help us give them the support they need every single day.”

also, we have those degree programs where individuals can complete an associate’s degree and transfer it to a four-year institution.”

# Savoring the moment: Willie Nelson in concert

Many things we could—maybe should—discuss today, but we shall not. We shall instead savor that moment the other night when a very old man strolled onto the stage and something like 20,000 people, all much younger than he, stood as one and welcomed him as an old and dear friend, a friend they all called by his first name: Willie.

It was at the Ruoff Home Mortgage Music Center in Noblesville. (Permit a moment of digression here. That’s the place we knew for years as Deer Creek, 203 acres of parking, pavilion and lawn tucked in along 146th Street at I-69 on the northeast side of Indianapolis. It is owned by Live Nation, a promoter of all things musical and fairly pricey tickets.)

Since it opened back in 1989 it has had a fitful life. It’s going to close, it’s not going to close, it’s going to be renamed. First it was Deer Creek, then Verizon Music Center, then Klipsch, now Ruoff. It is, frankly, a beautiful place on a warm summer evening and most of us recall it as Deer Creek. So here is a modest proposal: Let’s call it Deer Creek, once and for all, and the sponsor – the company to whom the naming rights are sold – becomes the second

line. “Deer Creek, brought to you by Cracker Jack, or Oldsmobile, or whomever.” Now back to the stage.)

Eighty-five-year-old Willie Nelson was the headliner last Saturday at a four-hour concert that included a lot of other big names, but it was Willie that the folks had come to see just one more time.

Willie Hugh Nelson of Abbott, TX, has been doing

this all his life. He writes songs that tear your heart out and then he sings them, along with some help from his sister Bobbie on piano, a drummer named Paul English, a harmonica player named Michael Siegfried Raphael—he goes by Mickey—and a lot of other musicians who have hung out with Willie over the years, Waylon Jennings and Merle Haggard among them. Most

of that crowd is gone now and Willie took note of that when his first songs the other nights were tributes to Waylon and Merle.

It is his own songs, though, that have endeared him to millions of fans that transcend the country music crowd. He’s performed at the White House, about every honky-tonk saloon in America, the Kennedy Center, the Library of Congress and Carnegie Hall. For a long time he hung out at a place called the Armadillo World Headquarters, a mildly unsavory joint in Austin, TX, and he wrote the classic song “Crazy” while sitting at Tootsie’s Orchid Lounge in Nashville.

That was not long before the night when his first wife, sick of his late-night antics, wrapped him up in a wet bedsheet and left him out in the street to sober up.

That’s Willie. He’s squabbled with record companies, ex-wives, other musicians and the IRS over the years. He owns his own golf course and when asked what par is on the course, Willie said simply, “what-

ever I want it to be.”

Now he is an old man. He looked old even when he wasn’t and the miles have not been easy, but there has always been the music. “Crazy,” “On the Road Again,” “Funny How Time Slips Away,” “Angel Flying Too Close to the Ground,” “Bloody Mary Morning,” “Hello Walls,” “Night Life”—337 of them, according to his biography, and two recent additions that address where he is in life right now: “Roll Me Up and Smoke Me When I Die,” and “I Woke Up Still Not Dead Again Today.”

He sang both in his 45-minute set that wound up the program Saturday. Those and a song that Toby Keith made famous for him, “Whiskey for My Men and Beer for my Horses.”

But consider this: When the old man and his beat-up old acoustic guitar walked out on that stage and broke into “Whiskey River, Take my Mind” as the Texas flag unfurled behind him, 20,000 men and women sang along with him. Every word.

I wondered, what must it

be like to sing up there and know that everybody out there has memorized every word you wrote down sitting in the booth at Tootsie’s and all those other places all those years ago?

It almost makes getting very old very worthwhile.

“I’m happy with it. The time was my best. It was probably 95 degrees on the track. The heat rises up from the track and it really was hot.”

Oak Hill’s Alan Thomas was talking about his fourth place finish out of eight runners in the 1600 meters last Saturday afternoon in the Midwest Meet of Champions at the IUPUI track stadium in Indianapolis.

It was the fourth straight time, starting with the sectional, that Thomas has broken the school record.

His time last Saturday was 4:16.2.

Cliff Dwelle of Lake Orion in Michigan won the 1600 meters in 4:13.80.

Another Michigan runner was second and Indiana’s John Van Soest of Kankakee Valley got third in 4:15.9.

After Thomas in fourth came two Illinois runners in fifth and sixth. Two Ohio runners finished seventh and eighth.

“I made sure I stayed with the leaders. I think I was last one time. That was about the middle of the second lap. I was fourth most of the time. I was maybe second on the first lap but not for long. You don’t feel the heat so bad until 15 or 20 minutes after you stop running. Once you stop, your feet begin to burn.”

Unofficially, Thomas had a time of 66 seconds for the first lap. He was at 2:09 at the half-way mark and 3:14 after the third lap.
