Ivy Tech celebrates campus' 10 years with free summer bash

On Saturday, during the 4th Annual Summer Bash, the Ivy Tech Community College campus in Marion celebrated its 10-year anniversary, looking back on Ivy Tech's commitment to helping their students achieve a higher education, as well as fulfill their goals and dreams commitment to helping students achieve a higher education, as well as fulfill their goals and dreams.

The free event included food from Jefferson St. BBQ, cupcakes, snow cones, karaoke, a bungie-cord run, zorb balls, and other games and activities. Furthermore, the affair offered Express Enrollment, in which potential students could complete all

the steps to register for classes.

Since the early 1970s, Ivy Tech—founded as Indiana Vocational Technical College in 1963 and no Indiana's full-fledged community college—has been located in Marion, originally in the old Tucker building. The community petitioned for their own building, and the state of Indiana provided the money needed to complete the first campus specifically built for Ivy Tech in 2008

"This is our 10th anniversary, and that is what this bash is all about—celebrating our students, celebrating our campus, and celebrating the community," Lonnie Peek, event

organizer, said.

The school focused on technical and vocational education in its early days but has since grown rapidly, now offering more than 150 programs, including cybersecurity, supply chain management logistics, industrial technology and maintenance, transitional nursing, radiology, health care services, general education, and many more.

"Ivy Tech is the community college for the state of Indiana," Alex Huskey, chancellor for the Marion campus, said. "Being a community college, we make sure we have programs that are teaching things that are needed in the work force, but


