Henderson will run for mayor as Republican

In front of a small crowd at McCarthy Hall last Tuesday evening, Republican Steve Henderson announced his intentions to run for mayor of Marion in the upcoming election, which will take place in November 2019.

Henderson will look to unseat incumbent Democrat Jess Alumbaugh, who has held the position since 2015.

A devout Christian who comes from a church background, Henderson first felt the itch to run for mayor after spending time with Marion's inner city children. Each Sunday, he would drive a bus to pick the kids up and bring them to Liberty Baptist Church in Sweetser. He got to know many of them through that ministry, and after seeing how they lived, Henderson felt that it was time for a more positive change in the city.

"I am running on faith that God will back the changes we need for Marion, whether it's through me or whether it's through somebody else," Henderson said.

Roger Bainbridge, Grant County auditor and Henderson's campaign treasurer, has worked with Henderson over the past three years. The two men have talked frequently about issues in the city of Marion and how they can fix it. As he has come to know Henderson on a deeper level, Bainbridge is confident that he is the right man for the job.

"It's an honor to be a part of this campaign," Bainbridge said. "As somebody who has felt the call of

Lindsay speaks at Lions' 87th annual Old Folks Day

When listening to Blake Lindsay speak at the 87th annual Old Folks Day at the AMVETS in Marion last Thursday, it was difficult to not be moved by his message.

The younger brother of Marion Community Schools Superintendent Brad Lindsay, Blake Lindsay has been blind for most of his life. He was born with retinoblastoma, which is a dangerous cancer that forms from the immature cells of the retina, and his eyes had to be removed.

For some, blindness can be crippling and tough to deal with, but not for Blake Lindsay. Throughout his life, he has lived it to the fullest. He has ridden a motorcycle, gotten married, graduated from college, and settled into a career as a motivational speaker and the communications director for the Dallas Lighthouse for the Blind.

His main goal is to help people from all over the country find their purpose through life's challenges.

"I've gotten the opportunity to really realize over the past several years that being blind has been a gift to me," Lindsay said during his address. "God has given me a gift to inspire people to give life their very best and to eliminate the excuses."

As a child, he played piano at the Westfield Friends Church, and patrons were amazed at how well he played despite being blind. At that moment, he made the decision not to let his affliction become a crutch.

"I realized at that time that being blind was not a bad deal at all," Lindsay said. "It's not as bad as people think. In fact, there are a lot of things that we can do differently and uniquely that really inspire people."

He told another story about a trip to Quaker Haven in 1973, where, at nine years old, he befriended a mother and her young daughter. The mother could not believe that, even though Lindsay was completely blind, he lived life just like



DOING GOOD

Each week, The News Herald prepares news of the good being done by individuals and organizations in Grant County for broadcast on WBAT. Here is an adaptation of the transcript of that broadcast.—Ed.

First, let’s acknowledge the good academic performance of several students at Marion High School on the Advanced Placement tests that they took at the end of their AP classes last semester. The College Board organization scores AP exams on a scale of one to five. A score of three typically earns the student college credit, although some colleges demand a four or even a five before they will award students credit towards their degree.

This year the College Board recognized Zoe Case and Elizabeth Wuertley, two members of Marion’s class of 2018,

as National AP Scholars, the Board’s highest honor, for earning scores of four or better on eight or more exams, with an average score of at least four on all the exams they took. Good job, Zoe and Elizabeth.

Let’s also give a pat on the back to Marion 2018 graduates Joshua Kelley and Kaylynn Scher, who earned the title of AP Scholars with Distinction for scoring three or higher on five or more exams, with an average score of at least 3.5 on all the exams they have taken. Good job, Joshua and Kaylynn.

By the way, 64 Marion students passed at least one AP exam, and at least one passed in 15 different classes. That’s good.

Anything that helps fight cancer is good, if you ask me, so I was pleased to learn that Marion General Hospital has invested in a machine that will take

three-dimensional mammograms in an effort to discover breast cancer earlier in the disease’s progression and thereby save lives.

MGH calls the system “the latest breakthrough in mammography technology in over 50 years,” and says the new equipment offers physicians and radiologists “almost endless diagnostic possibilities.”

That sounds good, and good for you, MGH, for making that investment on the community’s behalf. If you would like to learn more about this new system, call 765-660-6222.

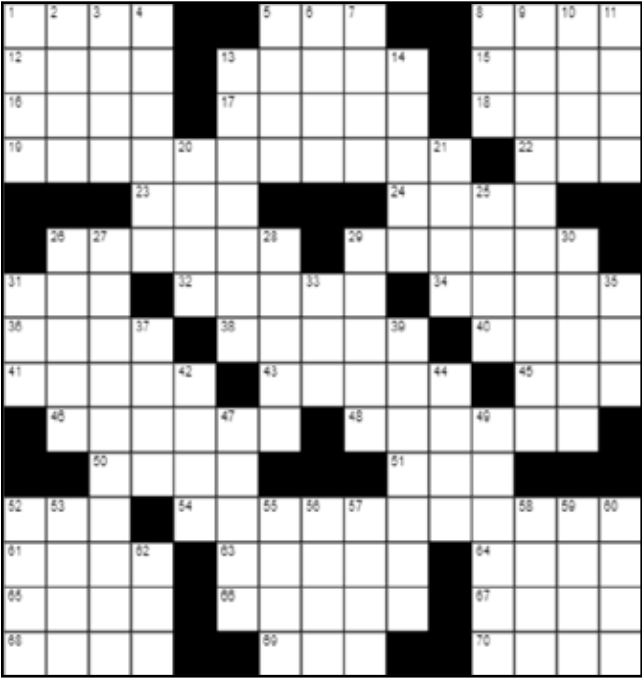

Taking a look at the life of a man named Saul

Acts 9: 1-9

It is always challenging and refreshing to study the Scripture for the preparation of a sermon. I would have to categorize myself as a non-traditionalist in method and style. I have taken the required courses in homiletics (the preparation of sermons), but the style, technique, or mannerisms of other preachers has never worked for me. I like to study different characters in the Bible because we can learn much from another's life.

One of the greatest conversions ever recorded in the New Testament was that of Saul of Tarsus. Scripture tells us that Saul must have come from a family that had considerable means. He was one of the few that had the

privilege of a formal education. He went to the School of Tarsus where he studied philosophy and poetry of the Greeks. He had also studied divinity and Jewish law at the University of Jerusalem. His tutor was Gamaliel, an eminent Pharisee. His education would be considered second to none, it was the best.

Saul was not an idle man. He was on a mission to destroy Christianity. He could best be described as "one bad dude." Scripture tells us that he was in a rage against Christianity. What, you might be wondering, would bring him to this point? Christ's teachings of hope, joy, love, and blessing were foreign to the law that Saul had studied.

We learn that he went to

the high priest to receive orders to go to Damascus and round up the disciples of Christ and bring them back to Jerusalem where they could be punished. There is no doubt the Christians that had fled to Damascus knew that Saul was on his way. However, there is an important principle to be considered at this point. Our Lord is fully aware of every issue that comes our way. In the Gospels, Jesus shared that any attack on His people may as well be an attack on Jesus himself. He knew all about Saul and his people.

As Saul neared Damascus, a great light shined upon him and his followers. Saul fell to the ground. It was at that time that Jesus personally spoke to Saul and said, "Why are you persecuting

me?" For the first time Saul realized he was in the presence of a holy and righteous Savior. This was no ordinary visit. It was a moment of miraculous conversion. That day on the road to Damascus Saul realized for the first time that he was a sinner. He knew he had no hope without Christ. He confessed Christ as his Lord and Savior. We might wonder, how could something like this happen so quickly? It is in situations like this that God really reveals His grace and power. Don't ever think that God doesn't know what we face. He is always working for our good.

Saul was a captive audience and what he heard and saw was awakening. Saul's life was transformed that day, never to be the same.

the Lord in my life to [pursue] public service, it is really refreshing and an honor to be associated with somebody who has felt the same call to this life. We know that Steve [at the helm], there is a lot to look forward to."

Campaign Chairman David Day, a Marion police sergeant, appreciates that Henderson is willing to lean on those around him for help

and guidance rather than thinking he can do it all on his own. "I have seen a lot of administrations come and go—some good and some not so good," Day said. "I feel like we can do better. I know that with proper leadership and properly trained individuals in leadership positions, we can do better than we have been doing."

As he looks around the city and sees what goes on within it, Henderson believes that Marion is at a crossroads. If elected as mayor, he plans to

once again make Marion a great place for residents, their children, and their children's children to live in, he said.

"Growing up here, I have watched our city fall apart brick by brick, and it breaks my heart," Henderson said. "The question that needs to be asked is: are we going to keep roaming the desert? Or do we seek to find the promised land that we have here? There are some things that are going to be hard to carry out, but my team and I are ready for the challenge."

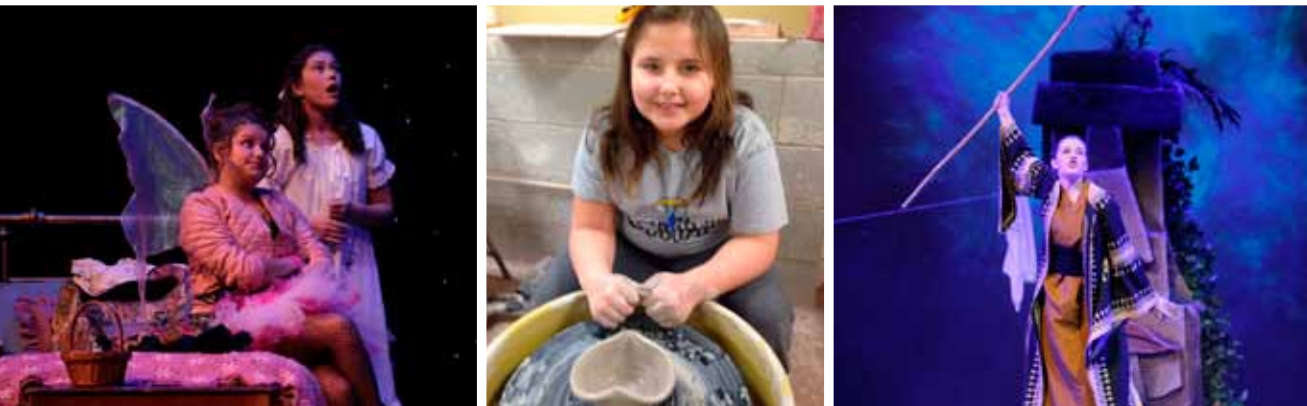

The county auditor and county treasurer will apply on or after 08/27/2018 for a court judgment against the tracts or real property for an amount that is not less than the amount set out below and for an order to sell the tracts or real property at public auction to the highest bidder, subject to the right of redemption. Any defense to the application for judgment must be filed with the Grant County Superior 1 Court and served on the county auditor and treasurer before 08/27/2018. The court will set a date for a hearing at least seven (7) days before the advertised date of sale and the court will determine any defenses to the application for judgment at the hearing. The county auditor and the county treasurer are entitled to receive all pleadings, motions, petitions, and other filings related to the defense to the application for judgment.

Such sale will be held on 09/13/2018 at the County Complex, Council Chambers and that sale will continue until all tracts and real property have been offered for sale.

Property will not be sold for an amount which is less than the sum of:
(1) the delinquent taxes and special assessments on each tract or item of real property; and
(2) the taxes and special assessments on the real property that are due and payable in the year of the sale, whether or not they are delinquent; and
(3) all penalties due on the delinquencies; and
(4) an amount prescribed by the county auditor that equals the sum of:
(1) thirty-five dollars (\$35) for postage and publication costs; and
(2) any other costs incurred by the county that are directly attributable to the tax sale; and
(3) any unpaid costs due under IC 6-1.1-24-2(c) from a prior tax sale.

No property listed below shall be sold if, at any time before the sale, the Total Amount for Judgment is paid in full. If the real property is sold in the tax sale, the amount required to redeem such property will be 110% of the minimum bid for which the tract or real property was offered at the time of sale, if redeemed not more than six (6) months after the date of sale, or 115% of the minimum bid for which the tract or real property was offered at the time of sale, if redeemed more than six (6) months after the date of sale, plus the amount by which the purchase price exceeds the minimum bid on the real property plus five percent (5%) per annum interest on the amount by which the purchase price exceeds the minimum bid on the property. All taxes and special assessments upon the property paid by the purchaser subsequent to the sale, plus five percent (5%) per annum interest on those taxes and special assessments, will also be required to be paid to redeem such property.

In addition, IC 6-1.1-25-2 (e) states the total amount required for redemption may include the following costs incurred and paid by the purchaser or the pur-

chaser's assignee or the county before redemption: (1) The attorney's fees and cost of giving notice under IC 6-1.1-25-4.5; (2) The costs of title search or examining and update the abstract of title for the tract or item of real property. The period of redemption shall expire on Friday, September 13, 2019 for certificates sold in the tax sale. For certificates struck to the county, the period of redemption may expire Friday, January 11, 2019.

If the tract or item of real property is sold for an amount more than the minimum bid and the property is not redeemed, the owner of record of the property who is divested of ownership at the time the tax deed is issued may have a right to the tax sale surplus.

The Auditor and Treasurer specifically reserve the right to withhold from the sale any parcel which has been listed in error, or which otherwise becomes ineligible for sale either prior to 09/13/2018 or during the duration of the sale.

This notice of real property tax sale, and the tax sale itself are undertaken and will be conducted pursuant to the requirements of the laws of the State of Indiana which regulate the sale of land for delinquent taxes, pursuant to I.C. 6-1.1-24-1 et seq.

The County does not warrant the accuracy of the street address or common description of the property, and a misstatement in the key number or street address does not invalidate an otherwise valid sale.

Minimum bid amounts are prescribed by law and are subject to change prior to the auction date.

OLD GLORY

For 241 years it has been the iconic American emblem: The stars and stripes of the flag, in all its varieties and variations. The star field has gone from circular to rows and the number of stars has grown as states have been added, most recently in 1958 when Alaska and Hawaii joined the union. It was a 16-year-old Lancaster, OH, high school student who gave the flag its present design. In 1958, a history teacher assigned Robert G. Heft and his Ohio classmates to each redesign the national banner to recognize Alaska and Hawaii, both nearing statehood. Heft crafted a new flag from an old 48-star flag and \$2.87 worth of blue cloth and white iron-on material. Heft's teacher gave him an A after Heft's flag was sent to Washington, DC, and selected by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. Heft died in 2009, but the flag and its presence border on eternal. It is used in every way, shape and form, including a few of questionable patriotic value. Here's a look at some from Marion, across Indiana and the Midwest over the past several months.

any other kid would. More recently, Lindsay went sky diving, something he had never done before, to challenge himself. He jumped from 13,500 feet, and loved every second of it. These three stories just scratched the surface, but all demonstrated a common theme—a man living his best life despite what many might view as a difficult situation. “Entering the unknown zone was one of the best moments of my life,” Lindsay said. “When we are diving into a challenge that we have never met before, we are going to enter the unknown zone. We don’t know what to expect, but we know that there is victory on the other side.” When it comes to being blind, there are always good days and bad days, but throughout his life, Lindsay has thrived due to his positive outlook. “If you’re giving it your all, you will be amazed at the doors that will open,” Lindsay said. “It’s not about me, it’s about what I can do for others. There are going to be times that it’s not fun to be blind, obviously, but mostly, you get people to tell you what things look like and you get to see things through their eyes and their point of view. It’s all good.” At the conclusion of his speech, Lindsay left everyone with a challenge of his own—be there for one another and love your life despite the circumstances. “Today is the first day of the rest of our lives,” Lindsay said. “So let’s get out there and inspire each other to be our very best, enjoy this part of your life, and turn your success into significance.”



With mid-terms coming, it's time to get to work


A couple of take-aways from politics over the past couple of years: First is, if you're angry, motivated and dedicated, you can get your candidate elected, sometimes without benefit of the majority of America agreeing with you. Second—and more important—is this: If you are not engaged, if you are not involved in the political process, even if it's only voting, well, you deserve what you get. It was TR—Teddy Roosevelt—back in 1883 who told us that “the people who say that they have not time to attend to politics are simply saying that they are unfit to live in a free community. Their place is under a despotism.” He went on: “The first duty of an American citizen, then, is that he shall work in politics.” Used to be, that was a fairly easy sell. The Prohibition years, for and against, are an example. So, too, with women's right to vote, and a lot of other issues, right up through the tragic Vietnam years. Still, except for the passionate outburst of about a third of the voters back in 2016, we're pretty docile, if divided, these days. Oh, we grouse and grumble, but an awful lot of people want nothing to do with politics or politicians...and that is both a shame and a disaster. In large measure that brought us what we have right now. If you are least willing to reconsider your estrangement from politics, here's a thought. It comes from a teacher I had a good many years. Said he to all of us, “politics is the art of determining who gets what and when and how.” A little different slant, isn't it? Not a mention there of greed or crime or slime or swamp or any of those things we now associate with politics, going back—for my generation at least—to the days of Watergate and Vietnam. Lee Hamilton, that most gracious and elegant of Hoosier politicians, has written an article on all this, including a brief little users guide on getting into the game. Hamilton, who represented Indiana in the Congress for 34 years and is now 87 years old and pretty darn robust and living in Bloomington, has done a lot. Among other things, he was co-chair of the committee that reported to America what went wrong on 9/11. He writes regularly on what's right and wrong with his country, and last week he told his readers it's time to get off the bench and into the game. “A lot of people these days,” he writes, “intuitively grasp that our system needs our involvement if we're to safeguard it. So, what should we do—es-

pecially if politics has to share space in our lives with family and jobs? “The first step is easy: Look around your community and ask yourself what needs fixing or what can be done better,” he advises. “I don't care where you live, but 10 minutes' thought and you'll come up with a healthy list of issues to tackle. This is how a lot of people get started; they see an issue they want to do something about. So, they enter the fray, and often come to recognize that they have more political power than they thought. “Of course, your chances of effecting change grow as you learn. You have to inform yourself about the issue: Listen carefully as you talk to your neighbors and friends, and pay attention to what politicians, commentators and those involved with the issue have to say. Participate, if you will, in the dialogue of democracy. “It's perfectly fine to personalize the issue as you seek to persuade others, but to be effective you've got to know what others think, too,” the Hoosier politician said. So, with what the pundits call the “mid-terms” coming up in 90 days and all of Congress and a bunch of state and local offices

on the ballot...and with candidates already queuing up for next year's city elections, including mayor, maybe it's time to think about what the old Rough Rider told us a century ago: Part of our job as Americans is to work in politics.

Grant County volleyball teams preparing for season

Eastbrook

Last season, Kelly Arnold (now Kelly Rupert) was fresh out of college and looking to lay the foundation of a successful program at Eastbrook High School. While the team finished with a 7-18 record last year, the Panthers showed glimpses of real potential throughout the season and Rupert hopes they will take the next step in 2018. Heading into year two of her coaching tenure, Rupert is feeling much more at ease than she did a year ago. With two excellent assistants in Bailey Havens and Leah Selk, she believes that practices, workouts, and games will run much smoother.

“I feel a lot more confident,” Rupert said. “We have a good coaching staff this year, so that will be really great to have the three of us as a team and as a unit. Last year we just had two, so it was a little difficult with running practices, tournaments, stats, and all of that stuff. So having three of us will take a lot of pressure off of one individual.”

Along with that, Rupert has a better knowledge of her players, which has also helped her confidence heading into 2018. “Last year at this point, we were still getting to know each other,” Rupert said. “Now, it feels so much better going into the year knowing my seniors really well.”

One of the biggest issues for the Panthers was team chemistry. In a game like volleyball, playing as one unit, rather than as individual players, is crucial to a team’s success. Throughout the offseason, along with working on playing with more control and improving their mental toughness, Rupert and her staff have concentrated quite a bit on improving that harmony, and it has yielded positive results.

Helaina is a great all-around player, and I think the girls really look up to her for a lot of things. She’s volleyball smart, and I think she will be really great. With Schelly, Josalyn, Marissa, and Ariel, it’s been fun to see them all take a leadership role this summer. I hope they continue to do that throughout the season.”

With the season just around the corner, Rupert hopes that her team will play at the highest level against the other teams from Grant County.

At this point, it is still a work in progress. “We’ve had quite a lot of emphasis on all three of those positions,” Holloway said. “So right now, we are just trying to figure it out on the fly. We have a lot of questions marks and a lot of positions wide open, so we are just trying to figure out who fits where.”

Brooke Butcher looks to be

the leading candidate at setter, according to Holloway, while Mia Stewart, Sloane’s sister, is expected to take a big step forward on the front line. Carley Bramel has shown potential playing on the back line, while McKenna Lugar and Kayla Comer are also in the mix as outside hitters.

Together with girls coming up from the JV ranks, Holloway has quite a few options to consider. “It’s going to be an interesting year,” Holloway said. “We have anywhere from one to 16 or 17 players that can play at the varsity level.”

Heading into the 2018 season, Holloway is not looking for a certain number of wins or a sectional title or a berth in the state finals. Rather, he wants his team to love the game and perform to the best of their ability throughout the course of the campaign.

“Generally, I have only two goals,” Holloway concluded. “I don’t know how long a work in progress we are going to be, but they need to play the best that they can and they need to enjoy playing volleyball.”

Marion

The Marion Lady Giants head into the 2018 season with new leadership at the helm, as Larry Hinshaw, a veteran of 15-plus years at both the high school and collegiate level, was hired as the team’s head coach in April.

A Marion High School graduate, Hinshaw had previously served as an assistant coach at both Indiana Wesleyan University and Taylor University, as well as directed volleyball clubs in Indiana and Missouri. Now, he looks to bring his volleyball expertise to a team that, at times last year, showed great potential.

The Giants went 16-17 a year ago with a strong senior lineup and some excellent play from their underclassmen. The roster will look vastly different this year.

the Giants with 247 kills last season, did not return to the team this year. Emily Lindsay, who had 568 assists, and Jo’ya Johnson, who was Marion’s second-leading attacking player with 140 kills, both graduated. Leilanu Jackson also chose not to come back, electing to focus on her academics.

So, with a team full of youth and inexperience, Hinshaw has taken it back to square one. “Our biggest focus has been the basics,” Hinshaw said. “We’ve been working on refining the basic skills of volleyball so that we can be more efficient and successful. We are returning youth. We do not have a starter [from last year] returning for varsity, and we have two or three that saw very little playing time that were moved from JV. We are going to be really young.”

Several players are starting to make significant strides. Sophomore Lucia Persinger has established herself as the team’s primary setter heading into this coming season, while junior outside hitter Kaliyah Jones has shown a lot of promise throughout the summer.

“Our biggest goal is for the girls to give their best and to get better each day,” Hinshaw said. “We are trying to make Marion volleyball something that people want to come watch and want to talk about. Basically, we want to make the program respectable at all levels and one that the community can be proud of.”

Mississinewa

Jody Bolser is back home in Grant County.

After several years of coaching volleyball and softball at both Plainfield High School and North Miami High School, Bolser is now the head coach at Mississinewa High School, taking over for the recently departed Hope Coons.

Bolser was a multi-sport athlete at both Madison-Grant High School and the University of Saint Francis, where she played both volleyball and softball. When the head coaching job opened up at Mississinewa, Bolser seized the opportunity, moving with her four daughters to Gas City to lead the Indians’ volleyball program to the next level.

“I am super excited to coach this group of Mississinewa

girls,” Bolser said. “I am passionate about the sport of volleyball and I love the passion and intensity that these athletes bring to the court.”

The Indians finished 23-7 a year ago, and while they lost Erika Foy to graduation, they have several top players, and some key newcomers, looking to lead the team in 2018. Two of Bolser’s daughters—Cailyn and Caily—will add to an already talented lineup. Cailyn will form a formidable middle with returning junior Kirsten Lockwood, who finished with 184 kills last season, while Caily will work as a right outside hitter with Jenna Berrhill, Madison Stanley and Halle Planck, who finished with the second-most kills last season at 229, will play on the left side.

Playing hard on every play

While Jordan Langs will serve as IWU’s first football coach in school history, he will also be the defensive coordinator, and, if his body of work at Wheaton College is any indication, IWU’s defense will be in good hands.

In his last three years in Illinois, the Thunder won two College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (CCIW) titles and compiled a 33-4 record. His defense ranked 12th in the nation with 262.5 yards per game and was ranked in the top 10 nationally in defensive touchdowns, red zone defense, scoring defense, interceptions, and third-down conversions.

With the Wildcats, Langs will run a 3-4 scheme with multiple coverage options in the back. In its most basic definition, a 3-4 defense is three defensive lineman and four linebackers with the secondary playing in man coverage, zone coverage, or a combination of the two, depending on what the opposing offense runs.

Langs was happy with the progress his team made throughout the off-season, and plans to have his players hit the books hard during training camp. “I was really pleased with the spring we had and with the growth our players showed,” Langs said. “We



had a few opportunities over the summer to talk defense with our players, but most of the implementation will take place over the next month.”

Many former Grant County players, including Eastbrook’s Zac Ketrang, Marion’s Xavier Fuller, and Oak Hill’s Owen Perkins are all vying for significant playing time on defense this coming season.

Overall, Langs has been impressed with what he has seen from all of his sophomores and juniors. “I am very pleased with the growth of each one of our returners,” Langs said. “The effort they have put into their strength and conditioning has really paid off, and we are excited about the ways they can contribute to our team as a whole.”

Much like IWU’s offensive unit, no defensive position groups are set in stone as of yet, as Langs is giving every player a

chance to prove that he belongs on the field.

“All the positions are still up for grabs,” Langs said. “Returners will obviously have a solid head start, but we are very excited about the class of newcomers and expect them to develop and contribute quickly.”

With IWU’s first football game taking place in less than a month’s time, the buzz around campus has been at a near fever pitch.

“I think all the players and coaches are very excited about making history on September 1,” Langs said. “Everyone realizes they are a part of something special. The key will be to make sure that we have a great training camp and keep a level head as the first game gets closer.”

As the Wildcats head into their inaugural campaign, Langs is looking for every position group on defense--the line, linebackers, and secondary--to play at the highest level from start to finish. “My expectation is for our defense to play disciplined, with great technique, while playing extremely hard on every play,” Langs concluded. “Regardless of the outcomes, those three things can be controlled every time we step out on the field.”
