## Walkers brave cold to help Mission

It was cold—10 degrees and it got no warmer through the morning—but that did not seem to deter participants in the Grant County Rescue Mission's "walk a mile in the shoes of the homeless" Saturday morning in downtown Marion. It was the 14th time that the rescue mission organization has used winter weather to both raise money and drive home the reality of the lives of the homeless and destitute in the Marion and Grant County area.

A total of 360 men, women and children—according to Rick Berberia, director of the Rescue Mission—donned their winter clothing and made the roundtrip walk from the Grant County Family YMCA to the Rescue Mission building at Fifth and Gallatin streets and back to the YMCA. The circle route is about one mile.

The day began with registrations and briefing and stocking up on some snacks at the YMCA before the walk across the Washington Street Bridge officially launched the trek that has become

a centerpiece for wintertime social activities in Marion.

Several organizations work in conjunction with the rescue mission staff to provide the necessary volunteers for the event. Among them Saturday were several Indiana Wesleyan University students and members of the New Life Community Church. The church

volunteers staged the breakfast available to walkers at the end of the event.

Linda Johnson, a women's shelter director, said participation is a way for more fortunate people to get a glimpse into the lives of the homeless.

"Homelessness does not discriminate," she said.



## Fauser publishes Burt book

Mark Fauser has written a book about Burt Reynold's generosity and the impact the legend made merely by paying his good fortune forward. Reynolds died on September 6 at age 82—one month before he was to start work with writer, filmmaker, and actor Quentin Tarantino.

Fauser held a book release party at The Mill in Marion on Reynold's birthday, February 11. He said: "I write about faith a lot; how things seem insurmountable but you have to have faith to overcome them and fight through them. Then, when

# Better outcomes for our most vulnerable

House lawmakers are working to improve the outcomes of children in the welfare system. A six-month assessment of the Department of Child Services found that Indiana has a very high rate of children in out-of-home care, with more than half of the removals related to parental substance abuse. Proposed legislation I support would implement recom-

mendations based off this independent evaluation of DCS by the Child Welfare Policy and Practice Group, and findings from the House Interim Study Committee on Courts and the Judiciary. Under this bill, treatment options would be offered to families struggling with substance abuse. To curb unnecessary child removals, this legislation would more clearly define when a

child is in need of services. To help ensure the best future for those children in need, we aim to keep families together whenever possible. As determined by the assessment, nearly 45 percent of family case managers have caseloads above the state standard. Reconfiguring the workload structure is essential so children in need can receive the adequate care and attention they deserve,

and workers can handle their important duties. DCS reports show that nearly 1,800 case managers have resigned since 2016. This legislation would require smaller caseloads to help case workers manage their workload more efficiently and effectively. The proposed bill would also extend the time-frame for assessments to be completed by caseworkers from 30 days to 45 days, to provide adequate time for employees to do their work.

Under this proposed legislation, youths in the foster care system would receive collaborative care services through 21 years of age. These services assist with housing, employment and education. Permanency is crucial when creating a stable living environment. By offering collaborative care services to those in their early 20s, they will have greater success in adulthood. While Indiana’s child welfare system has strengths, there are challenges that must be addressed so that those in need have better outcomes. With DCS imple-

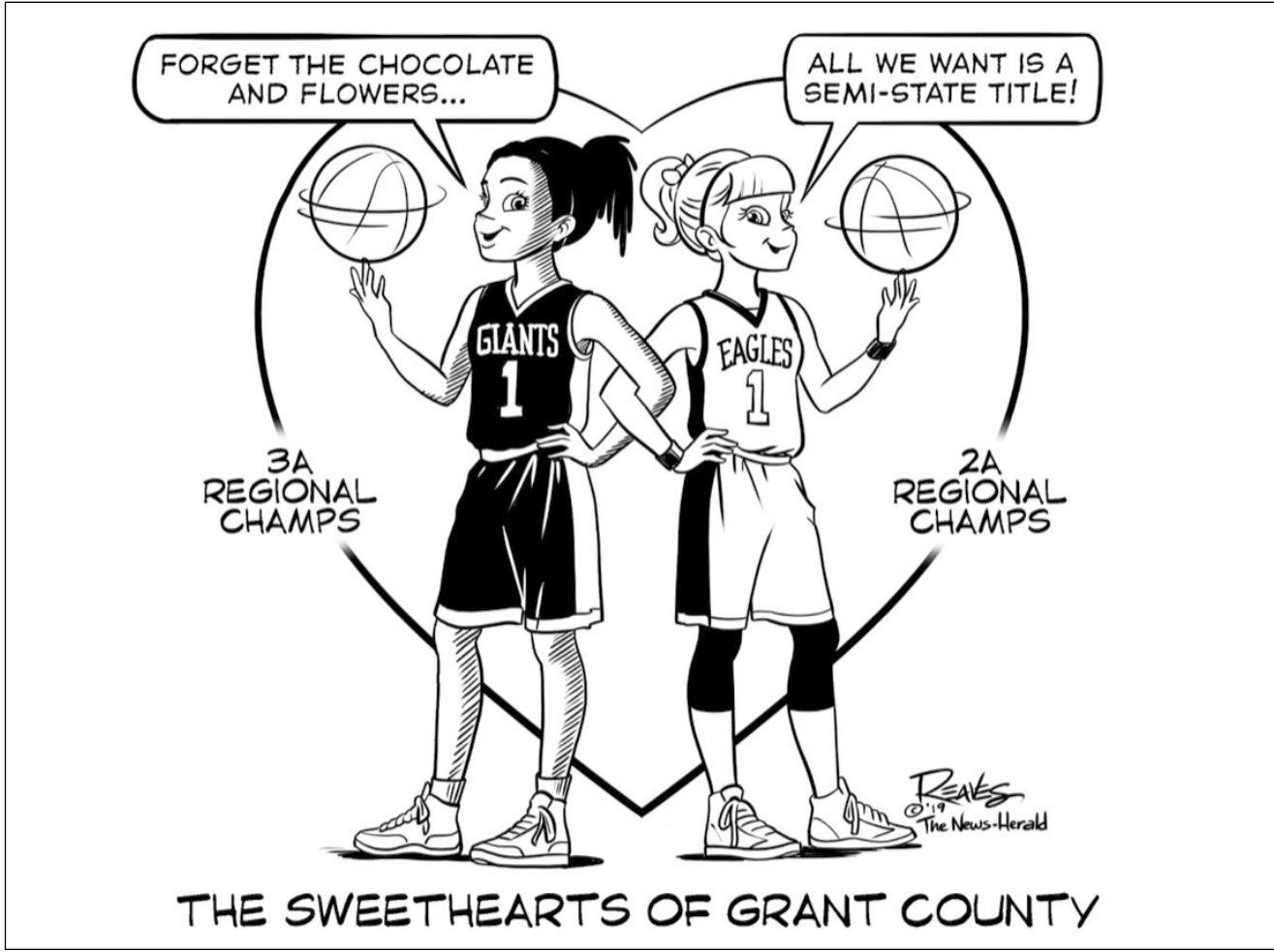

you make it through, it is all about finding a way to pay it forward.”

T. Graham Brown, of Nashville, TN, performed at the celebration because he wanted to be there for the event. Reynolds helped Brown and others host a fundraiser through Dream Makers for terminally ill children. “He was a sweet man,” said Brown.

Fauser said Reynolds never called attention to his actions,

but Fauser felt compelled to share more insight into the legendary actor. He remembers the moment he found out that Reynolds had passed. “I was at the Gardens of Matter Park doing a show. My phone started lighting up. Everyone was contacting me. I got real emotional, and I thought I need to go home. And, it was almost as if I could sense him, feel him literally say – ‘hey putz, I taught you better than this. The show must go on. We will deal with this later.’ ... We did the show.”

After some time, Fauser

started writing posts on Facebook to honor Reynolds. Shortly after clicking publish on his first post, he began receiving encouragement to write a book. “I never thought about writing a book about Burt before, but I decided to commit to doing that—to talk about his generous heart and how blessed I was because of Burt’s generous heart, and all of the things that happened because of him.”

His book, Because of Burt, is not just about Reynolds. It’s also about one man’s kindness, and belief in others brought life-changing happiness to a great many people.

Fauser shared a story about a struggling street artist that Reynolds appreciated. “His artwork was beautiful. Reynolds told him: ‘I want you to dress up, clean up, and come to my house on Friday.’ The artist said okay, and he showed up to see Sammy Davis, Jr.; Frank Sinatra; Dean Martin, and all these wealthy people. Burt has this spontaneous auction, and the guy becomes a millionaire overnight.”

Fauser went to school to study acting with Reynolds. He became a professional actor under Reynolds’s guidance. Fauser attributes much of his life to Reynolds: “Be-

cause of Burt, I met my wife. Because of Burt, I have a beautiful family. Because of Burt, I was acting on Evening Shade. Because of Burt, I was his personal assistant for two years. Because of Burt, I was a writer on the show (Evening Shade). Because of Burt, I wrote a show with Reba McIntyre, and I met Billy Bob Thornton, who was in Waking Up in Reno.”

Fauser gives Reynolds credit for the success of the Community School of Arts in Marion. “I asked him, ‘Why are you doing all of these great things for me?’ He said: ‘Because Jimmy Stewart did this for me and someday you will do it for other people.’” Reynolds visited the school and even took part in a few productions. “It was neat for him to come back and see what we accomplished. He loved it,” said Fauser.

Dawn Darga designed the book cover, and Jamy Bechler produced the project. It includes stories about people from Hollywood to Grant County. The softback is available on Amazon or from Fauser directly, at markfauser.com. It is currently the top selling book on Amazon in its category.

United States in hosting the Night to Shine prom. A project of the Tim Tebow Foundation, the event is centered on giving those with special needs, age 14 and up, a special night. Guests attend for free. While the church budgets for half of the cost of the prom, the rest is made up from community partners and sponsors.

This year 136 guests arrived to applause and a walk on the red carpet. After checking their coats, the ladies enjoy time in hair and make-up while the gentleman have a shoe shine. ## Marion and Oak Hill girls claim regional titles

The last time that the Marion Lady Giants had won a regional championship—until last Saturday night—was 1986. In a thrilling finish, the Giants, who were down six with less than a minute to go, forced overtime then went on to win 55-52 over the Angola Hornets.

Marion led 16-7 after the first quarter of play and took a 20-14 lead into the half-time break.

The Hornets came charging back in the third quarter, cutting Marion's lead to 27-26 and finishing the quarter trailing the Giants 32-29. Angola asserted control in the fourth frame, and, with 37 seconds to go, held a 46-40 lead.

Marion's Jazmyn Turner buried a huge corner three to make it a one-possession game, and, after Angola missed free throws on the other end, Ellie Vermilion was fouled on a three-point shot with seven seconds to go. The junior guard calmly knocked down all three free throws to send the contest to overtime.

Marion had a one-point lead with 7.3 seconds left in the extra session when Turner was fouled. She missed both free throws, but she got her own rebound and put it back in, sealing a dramatic victory that puts Marion one win away from a trip to Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

"We played two tough

games today," Marion Head Lawrence Jordan said. "We kept fighting, and we are regional champions for the first time in the last 33 years. It feels really good to be a part of that."

#### Semifinal: Giants 52-46 West Noble

The Giants used a big game from Ayanna Harvey along with some solid defense down the stretch to come away with a 52-46 victory over West Noble in the regional semifinal.

Marion shot 12-for 15 in the opening two quarters to take a 30-21 lead at halftime. With West Noble diverting their attention to Rashaya Kyle and Jazmyn Turner, Ayanna Harvey was left alone, and she took advantage, scoring 12 points.

The Giants pushed their lead to 13 in the early stages of the third quarter, but unforced turnovers led to a West Noble run that cut the lead to four heading into the final quarter.

The Giants kept their composure. West Noble cut the Giants' advantage to a single possession on multiple occasions, but Marion always had an answer, grinding out the six-point triumph. Harvey played one of her best games of the season, leading the Giants with 20 points, while Turner finished with 13 and Kyle seven.



#### A year later

A year ago, in the regional final on the same floor, the Oak Hill Golden Eagles were stunned by Frankton in one of the biggest upsets of the season.

Oak Hill Head Coach Todd Law did not forget last year's game; neither did his players. "We've had a poster-sized [picture] of that scoreboard from last year's regional hanging in our locker room all year," Law said. "I took it down and put it right in front of them where they would see it when they walked in tonight."

At the end of the regional final with Tipton last Saturday night, the tears from a year ago were replaced with cheers. Oak Hill shut down the No. 9 team in the state and put last year's demons to rest with a 56-36 triumph over the Blue Devils, earning their way back to the semi-state for the second time in the last three years.

Tipton's Lexi Altherr opened the game with a field goal; the only time the Blue Devils led. Westgate scored five of the Golden Eagles' first seven points to give Oak Hill a 7-6 lead, and then they blew the game wide open.

Senior guard Janessa Hasty scored six straight points on three consecutive possessions, jumpstarting a 12-2 run that gave the Golden Eagles a 17-6 advantage, and a double-digit lead they would never relinquish.

Taylor Westgate scored five of the Eagles' 11 points in the second as Oak Hill took a 30-15 lead into the intermission. On the defensive end of the floor, the Golden Eagles did a masterful job of limiting of Tipton star Cassidy Crawford to just five points in the

opening 16 minutes.

"We knew we had to stop Crawford," Hasty said. "We knew that Crawford could pretty much score anywhere, so we were just trying to communicate that during the [game]."

"I was concerned because Tipton had so many come-from-behind wins," Law said. "They had two in the sectional. They had four in the regular season as well, so we talked about that, how it was going to be very important to come back out and establish things in the third quarter, so we did."

Westgate continued her dominance, scoring Oak Hill's first 12 points to help them build a 42-24 lead early in the fourth quarter. The Golden Eagles cruised the rest of the way, never allowing the Blue Devils to get closer than 14 points.

Westgate led all scorers with 24 points on eight-of-11 shooting to go along with nine rebounds. Hasty was a perfect five-for-five from the field, scoring 12 points while also recording four steals, four rebounds, and two assists. Brittany McCorkle finished with eight points on two-for-two shooting and four-for-five from the free throw line, while Kaela Robey added seven in the Golden Eagles victory.

Crawford was held to 10 points on three-of-11 shooting. As a team, the Golden Eagles held Tipton to 0-for-12 shooting from the three-point line. "What else can you say about our defense?" Law said. "We've given up 40 points or more only twice all year."

Oak Hill closed the game on a 9-3 run, which included two putbacks from Westgate and Adrianna Trexler and a few timely free throws from Kaela Robey, to make it back to the regional final. Robey finished with 13 points and six rebounds.

Westgate had 10 points and eight rebounds, while Trexler added four in the Golden Eagles' victory.

A person redeeming each tract or item of real property after the sale of the certificate must pay: (A) the amount of the minimum bid under Section 5 of IC 6-1.1-24 for which the tract or item of real property was last offered for sale; (B) ten percent (10%) of the amount for which the certificate is sold; (C) the attorney's fees and costs of giving notice under IC 6-1.1-25-4.5; (D) the costs of a title search or of examining and updating the abstract of title for the tract or item of real property; (E) all taxes and special assessments on the tract or item of real property paid by the purchaser after the sale of the certificate plus interest at the rate of ten percent (10%) per annum on the amount of taxes and special assessments paid by the purchaser on the redeemed property; and (F), all costs of sale, advertising costs, and other expenses of the county directly attributable to the sale of the certificate.

If the certificate is sold for an amount more than the minimum bid under Section 5 of IC 6-1.1-24 for which the tract or item of real property was last offered for sale and the property is not redeemed, the owner of record of the tract or item of real property who is divested of ownership at the time the tax deed is issued may have a right to the tax sale surplus.

Indiana law prohibits a person who owes delinquent taxes, special assessments, penalties, interest, or costs directly attributable to a prior tax sale, from purchasing tracts or items of real property at a tax sale. Prior to bidding at a tax sale, each bidder must affirm under the penalties for perjury that he or she does not owe delinquent taxes, special assessments, penalties, interest, costs directly attributable to a prior tax sale, amounts from a final adjudication in favor of a political subdivision in this county, any civil penalties imposed for the violation of a

building code or ordinance of this county, or any civil penalties imposed by a health department in this county. Further, each bidder must acknowledge that any successful bid made in violation of the above statement is subject to forfeiture. In the event of forfeiture, the bid amount shall be applied to the delinquent taxes, special assessments, penalties, interest, costs, judgments, or civil penalties of the ineligible bidder, and a certificate will be issued to the county executive.

The Commissioners specifically reserve the right to withhold from the sale any parcel which has been listed in error, or which otherwise becomes ineligible for sale either prior to the start or during the duration of the auction. The Auditor's Office does not warrant the accuracy of the key numbers or street addresses published herein and any misstatement in the key number or street address does not invalidate an otherwise valid sale.

# The players are all in place for the mayoral race

Until midday Friday the Marion political landscape was fairly orderly, uncluttered. Two serious candidates for mayor on the Republican side and two, including incumbent Jess Alumbaugh, on the Democrat ballot.

Then, late in the morning, before the noon deadline for filing to get on the May 7 primary ballot, the surprises began.

Two leaders in the African American community in Marion, Joselyn Whitticker and Henry Smith, signed on to try to oust their Democrat

colleague Alumbaugh from the mayor's office. Political junkies of all stripes spent the weekend trying to read the tea leaves:

Has Alumbaugh, who was elected three years ago partly by solid support from the black community, lost the minority vote in the Marion? Can he retrieve it? Must he retrieve it? Why did he lose it in the first place?

Does a fractured Democrat primary help or hurt Alumbaugh? Indeed, is there a Democrat party at all? If not, would Alumbaugh have been better off to return to the Republican Party he deserted

four years ago to defeat Wayne Seybold and leave what few organized Democrats there are to squabble among themselves?

Yet another disaffected Democrat and former mayor, Bill Henry, is expected to get on the ballot this summer as an independent.

A significant number of Republicans will tell you privately they prefer an Alumbaugh second term to either Steve Henderson or Dave Homer.

(We have to say here that the presence of Raymond Glass on the ballot for the fourth time is generally ap-

plauded by all, Republicans and Democrats. Glass is a man with challenges who, most concede, sometimes makes more sense than any of his challengers. All agree he is unelectable, but applaud him simply because he exercises his right to participate.)

In the Republican camp, Dave Homer, a career government person--police officer, police chief, prosecutor's staff, two-time city councilman--probably has to be given the edge. He and Ron Mowery, the reigning patriarch in local Republican politics, have been at odds for years. Key question: Will Homer and Mowery kiss and make up, or will Mowery buddy up to Steve Henderson, an alliance that seems unlikely. Also unlikely: that Mowery will sit out the dance.

So what of Whitticker and Smith in the race? Two African Americans: Will they split the minority vote in their desire to be spoilers?

Joselyn Whitticker has been at odds with the mayor in the wake of two incidents in which Whitticker believes Marion police acted inappropriately: One, an arrest in which force was used to subdue a black man and the other an incident in which a young black woman died in a traffic collision with a police squad car. In both situations third-party investigations exonerated the police.

Whitticker is also a former member of the city council and most recently was the Democrat candidate for state auditor, a race in which she failed to win even her home county.

She also has been a member of the Board of Works throughout the Alumbaugh years, a job for which she receives no pay but which holds considerable power. Political question: Now that she is running against him, will Alumbaugh remove her from the Board of Works?

Smith is a retired teacher and a city councilman who has developed a serious dislike of the Alumbaugh administration, much of it having to do with Smith's view of Alumbaugh. When asked Friday why he is running against the incumbent, he said his reason is "this administration."

Then there is Lynn Johnson. She is on the city council. She ran for mayor against Wayne Seybold and lost decisively. She ran against Alumbaugh four years ago and came in a distant third. She has run against Republican State Rep. Kevin Mahan twice and was drubbed twice. Her city council service as a Democrat has dwelt mainly on probing of tax issues and TIF district financing. She and Republican Henderson developed a close bond on the council, but that alliance seems to have cooled in

recent months.

Going almost unnoticed in this is the reality that the Marion City Council will be entirely reshaped this year. Johnson, Smith, Homer and Henderson are all leaving to run for mayor and Councilman Alan Miller is retiring.

Plenty of time; we'll deal with that later.
