County hunkers down

Cold shuts schools, businesses, government

While Indiana does have its fair share of cold weather, snow, and ice in the winter months, the frigid temperatures that the state endured on Wednesday and Thursday of the past week were of historic proportion.

January 30 was the coldest day in Indiana since 1994, with wind chills of up to -50. Frostbite can occur anywhere from five to 30 minutes in that kind of cold, while pipes will freeze and cars will have trouble starting. Because of these dangerous weather conditions, multiple schools, businesses, and government agencies closed in Marion on those two days.

Michael Burton could not remember many occasions where the Grant County Commissioners actually closed their doors on a business day, but made the decision on Wednesday and Thursday to do so for the sake of his workers' safety. "We wanted to be sure

that our employees coming to and from work were safe, and we just felt that because of the brutal cold wind chill factors that we should shut down," Burton said. "We just felt this was the best thing to do."

Marion Community Schools Superintendent Brad Lindsay tracked the weather over the course of several days. With having a plethora of students that commute to their respective schools in a variety of different ways, the decision was made to cancel school on Wednesday and Thursday. "When it gets to be -20 wind chill, then -30 wind chill, then -40 wind chill, if your skin is exposed, it just doesn't take very long [to display frostbite,]" Lindsay said. "When you talk about children, there are walkers. There are bus stops. There are cars that may or may not start or have problems. It just wasn't worth the risk."

Rain or shine, hospitals remain open 24/7 to take care of patients

at any point of the day or night. However, while Marion General Hospital did not close, several areas were not in operation. "We looked at the service line, which is our Wound Clinic, our Pulmonary Clinic, our Pulmonary Physicians, and Diabetes," nurse Cindy Futrell said. "Those people should not be out in the cold. We were very selective when we made the decision on what units we would shut down for the day."

For the hospital, doctors and nurses were concerned that patients being out in kind of weather for a sustained period time could develop even more serious health issues. "When you have lung issues, the cold makes it much harder for them to breathe," nurse Tammy Cornelius said. "When you have a wound and your circulation isn't very good, being in the cold complicates that even more. Diabetes patients, same thing."

Despite the cold weather, however, many people managed to make it on time to their appointments. Those who did not re-scheduled their checkups for another day. "We saw over 220 patients on the coldest day of the year," Futrell said. "Patients made sure they got to their appointments if they needed them."

Even the City of Marion administrative offices closed on Wednesday and Thursday, as Mayor Jess Alumbaugh urged the residents of Marion to stay inside unless it was absolutely neces-

Kenneth B. Hill, 83, of Marion, died Saturday, February 2, 2019. Hill was the founder and owner of the Sports Hotline of Grant County. He published the weekly paper for 44 years, never missing a week from 1971 until retirement in 2015. Prior to starting the Sports Hotline, Ken was employed by the Chronicle-Tribune as a sports writer. He moved to Grant County from Illinois and previously Michigan. Ken was born in Lexington, Kentucky to the late Arthur and Sophie (Rogers) Hill in 1935. He graduated from Henry Clay High School Class of 1953 in Lexington. He received a BA in Journalism from the University of Kentucky in 1958 where he was a star right-handed pitcher for the baseball team.—from Ken Hill's obituary.

The beauty of Ken's paper wasn't the story on the Marion Giants, or the update on Oak Hill, Ole Miss, Eastbrook or Madison-Grant. It was the story on the 90-year-old lady breaking 50 for nine holes of golf. It was the story on the five-year-old boy breaking 100 at the Crest Lanes Bowling Center.

It was the update on every Grant County student athlete playing college sports somewhere in this country. It was the Faces in the Crowd pictures, where anyone at any game could find his or her face in Ken's weekly paper.

It was a weekly paper that people read not only in Mari-

on, but in many states around the country. If you wanted to know what was going on with your school, you subscribed to the Sports Hotline. It came once a week by mail and you could spend up to an hour each week catching up on sports in Grant County.

If you ever wanted to know just how much Ken put into the paper, it took one trip to his house to drop off a picture or some information. His house was filled with his job. Every inch of Ken's home was covered with sports papers, pictures, and information on Grant County sports.

Scott Hunt, sports editor of the Chronicle-Tribune, reminded me this week of how Ken would stop by the Marion Giants' game and get some pictures, then head out to Oak Hill to shoot a second-quarter

picture. Then he would hit the Eastbrook vs. Madison-Grant game for some third-quarter info., and, finally, shoot the winning shot at Ole Miss to wrap up his evening.

No one could ever attempt to do what Ken Hill did for Grant County sports. Many of us in the business feel that what he did for four decades helped make Grant County the special place it always will be for sports.

Recently I looked at the sports pictures all over my house, and I realized just how many came from Ken's camera.

Speaking for all of Grant County may I say thank you to Ken Hill, and may the greatest man who ever covered sports in the county rest in peace.

Dining upscale at Ruth's Chris in the Summit City

Can you remember the last time you left a restaurant thinking, "Wow, that was a great meal"? Our recent visit to the newest steak house in downtown Fort Wayne left us with that very impression. Our friends Joe and Chris invited us to try out this new restaurant as their guests, and we were very excited to experience this new Summit City establishment.

Ruth's Chris is located in the Skyline Tower, Fort Wayne's newest mixed-use downtown development. The Skyline houses offices as well as residential apartments. For those who want to be downtown, this is the place to be. An attached parking garage right off of Wayne Street makes parking free and convenient. We were politely greeted by the hostess whose desk is in the vestibule entrance which features a high ceiling featuring a beautiful crystal chandelier. We had the distinct feeling that this was a first class establishment.

As we walked through the bar area to our corner table, we were impressed with the restaurant's décor and ambiance. The floor-to-ceiling windows allow generous amounts of light to filter into the restaurant. I had the distinct impression that I was visiting a high-end restaurant in New York City rather than the Summit City. As we perused the menu, I again felt like I was in the Big Apple. Ruth's Chris items are all ala

carte: appetizers, side dishes, entrées, desserts are priced individually, and are expensive, so be forewarned.

We started off our meal with a couple of cocktails. The bar service at Ruth's Chris is quite extensive. The bartenders pride themselves on their craft cocktails and signature drinks. There is a separate menu for wine aficionados and features practically every wine region on earth from which to choose. The list is also impressive. We started our meal with the shrimp cocktail which featured four extra-large shrimp and their signature spicy "New Orleans" cocktail sauce. We found the sauce to be palatable, unlike that of St. Elmo's which makes my nose run. The appetizer list included a variety of seafood items such as crab, calamari, ahi tuna, and their chilled seafood tower. They also offer crab-stuffed mushrooms and veal-stuffed ravioli that sounded intriguing.

The second course was the soup and salad offering. Ruth's Chris offers several different salads, such as a wedge salad with blue cheese, Caesar, chopped, and a tomato heirloom salad. The homemade lobster bisque features a creamy-buttery base with huge chunks of lobster. Jeannie and I split a wedge salad and we were glad to do so as the half-size serving was perfect for us.

Finally it was time to pick an entrée, which was ex-

tremely difficult due to the delicious offerings on the menu. The specialty of the house is, of course, their steaks. Ruth's Chris only uses USDA Prime beef, which ensures the highest quality of steak for their customers. They also use a special procedure to prepare their beef that is unique to Ruth's Chris. The steaks are seasoned then broiled in an 1800-degree F infrared oven that sears in the juices. The steaks are then placed on plates that are heated to 500-degree F and finished off with butter and parsley. This procedure ensures that your steaks are succulent and tender. I ordered a petite, eight-ounce filet served with crabmeat and asparagus. The steak was perfectly prepared and the crab added an extra yumminess to the meal.

The steak offerings are quite extensive. Diners can choose from the small eight-ounce filet to the exceptional 40-ounce (yes that's 2.5 pounds!) Tomahawk Ribeye for two. In addition they offer New York strips, Porterhouse, and T-bone steaks. They also offer extra thick lamb chops that are marinated overnight and broiled to perfection. As if that wasn't enough to choose from, Ruth's Chris does have nightly seafood specials such as salmon, swordfish, and Chilean sea bass for those who prefer seafood over steaks.

If you still have enough room to consider a side dish or two, you won't be disap-



pointed with the selections. Ruth's Chris offers vegetables such as Brussel sprouts, asparagus, fire-roasted corn, and broccoli. You can also choose lobster mac-n-cheese, roasted mushrooms, sweet potato casserole, and a variety of potato dishes. Joe chose the potatoes au gratin for the table to share, which was more than enough for the four of us.

We had such a good time at dinner that we barely had room to consider dessert, but, since this was a special occasion, we splurged and ordered the blackberry sorbet to top off our meal. Chris and Joe enjoyed the crème brûlée. We promised to try the chocolate duo—chocolate cake coupled with chocolate mousse and

topped with sweet crème and fresh berries—the next time we visited.

Joe and Chris are hopeful that the Summit City will support Ruth's Chris' upscale offerings. The restaurant caters to high-end clientele and corporate customers. They have several private dining areas for small gatherings or private meetings complete with high-end televisions and private servers who will cater to your every whim. The restaurant is open for dinner Monday through Thursday starting at 4 pm. It is only open for lunch on Friday from 11 am-4 pm, followed by happy hour from 4-6 pm, and dinner service until 11 pm. On Saturdays they are open for dinner 4-11 pm, and on Sundays from 4-9 pm. Chris told us that they are trying to attract the millennial crowd that enjoys going out in the later evenings with specials that are served from the bar. Perhaps the next time we are downtown at night for a baseball game or a concert we will test this out.

As we drove away from Ruth's Chris we continued to rave about the meal. The service was excellent, the décor was beautiful and the food was exceptional. We were extremely thankful to Joe and Chris for sharing this experience with us (and paying for it!). I believe Ruth's Chris has elevated the culinary scene of the Summit City. I gave Ruth's Chris 5 stars on TripAdvisor.

sary. "With this severe cold that was coming, it wasn't that difficult a decision," Alumbaugh said. "The cold was significant enough that it could take a life, and we didn't want anybody to be out in the community. The weather people sometimes miss how much snow and rain we'll get, but they are usually spot-on with temperatures."

While looking to protect his citizens, Alumbaugh was also looking to make life easier for the first responders, who still had jobs to do despite the incredibly low temperatures.

"The other reason I felt it was time to shut down was for the safety of our police and fire department," Alumbaugh said. "I wanted to eliminate as much drama for them as we could under the severe weather. We didn't want them out when they didn't need to be. There are some things that are unavoidable, but we wanted to remove obstacles that were avoidable, so we were just really urging people to stay home."

After two brutally cold days, it finally warmed up on Friday. Every place that was closed reopened their doors, and it was business as usual throughout the city of Marion heading into the weekend.

Marking the building of the Lincoln monument

In a few days--next Tuesday, February 12--we'll mark the 210th birthday anniversary of America's secular saint, Abraham Lincoln, although it can be hard to separate it from the car, furniture, carpet and indoor spa sales that have somehow become barnacles on the birthday cake.

We Hoosiers, along with the Illini to the west and the Kentuckians across the river can, and will, once again squabble over who made the man who saved the United States. I once put together a panel program to answer the absurd question of whether Mr. Lincoln became Mr. Lincoln "because of" or "in spite of" his rural Midwestern beginnings. One of the real irritations in my life is that Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky continue this divisive born-here-grew-up-there quibbling rather than harmonizing on the riff that we all are in and of Lincoln country.

Imagine the tourist dollars rolling in from a cooperative tour of Lincoln Land that began in Hardin County then moved on to Spencer County and over to the banks of the Sangamon River--and, no, you do not need a passport.

Not everyone agrees on the merits of Mr. Lincoln himself. I once knew a fellow who was a serious Lincoln scholar who, deep in his soul, believed that (his words) "assassination was a good career move for him." A harsh judgment, but probably more correct than most of us like to think. He won the war but could he have won the peace? Don't know. Never will. In many ways, we aren't there yet, are we?

There are those, however, who point out that, prior to the Civil War, we said "The United States are...." and only after the war did it become "The United States is..." Mission accomplished.

Millions of gallons of blood shed, but he held the place together.

He continues to fascinate. Someone did the research and found that more books have been written about Abraham Lincoln than any other person except Jesus Christ: 15,000 and counting. I have three new ones on the table not yet unwrapped.

To get a sense of Mr. Lincoln deep in your soul, in your gut, somewhere that you never went back in history class, you need to visit the Lincoln Memorial at the far west end of the National Mall in Washington, DC.

The massive marble edifice will be getting renewed attention in the next couple of years as it approaches its centennial: 100 years since it was completed and dedicated on May 30, 1922, 57 years after the death of the man it celebrates.

Glorious, somber, elegant, imposing, reverent, America's finest tribute to one of its own. The marble statue of the seated

in stone.

We stand there, transfixed. We look up at Mr. Lincoln's marble face, which seems somehow animated, alive, all of its three feet and seven inches from chin to brow motionless.

It is, even in this most secular of cities and places, a religious experience.

Ed Breen, co-host of "Good Morning Grant County" on WBAT radio, has been reporting on life in Indiana for more than 50 years. In 2016 he was inducted into the Indiana Journalism Hall of Fame.

Marion and Oak Hill girls claim sectional titles

Throughout the season, RaShaya Kyle's and Jazmyn Turner's success on the court has been well documented, and with good reason. The dynamic duo has done it all for the Giants. Turner has been a steady force on both ends of the floor. Kyle is a double-double machine, capable of taking over any game.

But on Monday, in the Class 3A Sectional 23 final, it was a total team effort that proved to be the difference, as the Giants won their second straight championship with a thrilling 46-44 victory over the Belmont Squaws.

Facing a lineup that included senior Grace Hunter and talented post players Morgan Shifferly and Kenzie McMahon, the Giants faced a tough test, and the Squaws showed throughout the first half why they were one of the top teams in the state all year long.

After the Giants opened the game with a 5-4 lead, Belmont hit three of their final five shots to build a 13-10 first quarter advantage. Hunter scored five points in the frame for the Squaws, while Ayanna Harvey scored four for the Giants.

Hunter and Carrie Scott began the second stanza with back-to-back triples, and Belmont extended their lead to eight points on three separate occasions. Along with their excellent three-point shooting, Belmont found a lot of success in transition, scoring several easy baskets in the second quarter.

The Squaws' defense was equally tough, keeping Kyle and Turner contained and allowing just six points between the two in the first half. Trailing 27-19, Marion Head Coach Lawrence Jordan reminded his team to keep their composure because there was a lot of game left.

"What I talked to the girls about [was that] the game was 32 minutes, not 16 minutes," Jordan said. "[Though]

we fell down, I felt like we were still playing okay. I felt a couple of times Grace [Hunter] got free, and we didn't want that because she is very talented. But we didn't panic. We kept calm, and...I told the girls to keep fighting, and that's what ended up happening. We didn't panic."

Marion opened the second half on an 8-0 run to tie the game, but Belmont responded with a surge of its own, scoring seven straight to take a 34-27 advantage.

With the Squaws holding all of the momentum, the Giants needed a spark, and Olivia Aguilar provided it. "I was thinking that I needed to come off the bench and put a couple of shots up for my team," Aguilar said. "We were trailing big, and I was glad I could do that for them."

Aguilar's second three cut the Belmont lead to four. In the final seconds of the stanza, Hunter nailed her fourth trey of the contest to put the Squaws up by five, but Aguilar's shot at the buzzer found the bottom of the net, setting the stage for what would be an exciting conclusion.

"They were just leaving her open," Kyle said after the game. "O [Olivia] had been working on her shot in practice. She hit some really clutch shots that we needed to put us up and get us back in the game."

After knocking down the final shot of the third quarter, Aguilar started the fourth with her fourth triple of the game, giving the Giants a lead they would not relinquish. "Once you get hot, you let it go and you know it's going in," Aguilar said. "I knew that one was going in."

Five straight points from Turner gave the Giants a 45-42 lead with 4:18 to go, and after one free throw from Ellie Vermilion, the Giants held a two-possession advantage. Then, as has been the case all season, the Giants' defense

shut the door in crunch time. Marion allowed just two points in the final 4:18, both of which came on free throws from Hunter, and despite giving up two offensive rebounds in the final five seconds, they did not allow Bellmont to score, securing their second straight sectional championship.

They gave up the wide open shot, and Olivia took care of it and knocked some big ones down for us.”

Turner and Kyle finished with 11 and 10, respectively, but every Giant who touched the floor made a contribution. Vermilion scored seven points and ran the offense. Harvey came away with six tough points and some crucial rebounds, while Markeisha Jackson played tough defense, particularly in the second half on Hunter.

In other words, everybody played a role in Marion’s triumph.

“RaShaya and Jazmyn get all the credit, but there are times when other people do stuff that doesn’t show up on the scoreboard or in the scorebook,” Jordan said. “Markeisha, Ayanna, and Ellie, all season, have done things that don’t show up in the scorebook, but they are huge parts of our team. You can’t do it with [just] two people.”

Hunter led the Squaws with 18 points, while Shifferly finished with 12 and McMahon nine.

The Giants are heading back to the regional round, where the West Noble Chargers await them this coming Saturday. Jordan is happy with a sectional title, but knows that his team is capable of much more.

“We’re not done,” Jordan concluded. “We feel like we have bigger fish to fry. We feel like we’ve got one of the most talented teams in this area, and we are going up there to win the regionals.”

Golden Eagles win third straight sectional title with rout of Manchester

Throughout the course of the 2018-2019 campaign, the Oak Hill Golden Eagles’ defensive play has been outstanding. In the sectional tournament, it’s been even

better, and in the Class 2A Sectional 37 final, the Golden Eagles saved their best defensive performance for the championship match.

Oak Hill dominated from start to finish, recording its third straight sectional title with a 48-16 triumph over host Manchester on Monday night.

“First of all, I’m just really proud of the kids,” Oak Hill Head Coach Todd Law said. “It’s hard enough to win one sectional, to win three in a row is just a phenomenal achievement...They really achieved something really special, winning three conference championships in a row, going 21-0 in the conference over three years—I’m just really proud of them.”

After giving up just 23 points to North Miami in the sectional opener and 21 to Wabash in the semifinal, Oak Hill’s defense allowed just five points in the opening 16 minutes.

“We came out really well,” Law said. “At the start, we were playing really, really well defensively, holding them to two in the first quarter. We jumped out 9-0 before they scored.”

Oak Hill’s dominance continued in the third quarter; they used a big scoring surge to put the contest out of reach for the Squires. “I really liked our start again in the second half,” Law said. “We talked in the locker room that we had a choice to make. We can either let them back right here or you can go out and take it away from them. We came out on a 20-2 run to start the third quarter to take total control of the game.”

Brittany McCorkle was excellent on Monday, leading the Golden Eagles with 15 points. “They didn’t guard her,” Law said. “They took her man and went down and doubled Taylor with her and just left her flat-out wide open. She buried three out of four threes [and] was six-of-10 from the field. She just stepped up to that challenge and really made them pay for it. I was really proud of her play.”

Adrianna Trexler was second on the team with 11 points, while Kaela Robey scored eight and Taylor Westgate added six.

“Obviously, we’ve got a short week, so we’re down a day,” Law said. “To be quite honest, most of the way is going to be continuing to shoot the ball a lot in practice, and then it’s going to be focusing in on LCC and the things that they do and what we are going to have to be able to do to try and contain that. We are going to need a good week of preparation to get ready for Saturday.”

Then, in the second quarter, we stayed in our man-to-man, tightened it up a little bit, and did a better job of keeping them off the glass. We were able to hit some shots from the perimeter in the second quarter and

extended it out.”

“In the third quarter, we switched it up to a trapping 1-2-2 half court zone, and we turned them over numerous times and got easy layups out of it,” Liddick said. “We went on a 13-0 run there in the third quarter and got up 20 points, and it stayed that way most of the way.”

Foulk led the Panthers with 15 points, while Standfest and Martinez each finished with nine. Naomi Diller was excellent in her limited minutes, scoring four points and coming away with several crucial turnovers in the Panthers’ triumph.

Panthers battle to the end, but fall to Tipton in sectional final

In Monday night’s Class 2A Sectional 39 final against the No. 9 team in the state in Class 2A, the Panthers gave it everything they had, but ultimately fell to the Tipton Blue Devils by a score of 61-45.

Eastbrook’s defense, which has been a strength all year long, was at its best in the opening 16 minutes, holding Tipton’s dangerous trio of Cassidy Crawford, Kelsey Mitchell, and Gracie Phillips mostly in check.

“We had a great gameplan going in,” Eastbrook Head Coach Jeff Liddick said. “We were going to congest the paint and make it tough for Crawford to get her points, and at the same time, know where Mitchell and Phillips were at on the three-point line because they are such great shooters. In the first half, we did a great job defensively with both of those things. They took 35 shots in the first half and were only able to connect on nine of them, and a big part of that was an all-out effort on defense.”

Meanwhile, the Eastbrook offense, which has had its ups and downs recently, was excellent in the first half, knocking down 50 percent of their shots from the field and 50 percent from beyond the arc.

However, Tipton made some halftime adjustments, and the Blue Devils were able to seize control in the third stanza, outscoring the Panthers 19-8.

“The girls never quit,” Liddick said. “Tipton went up 11 at the end of the third quarter, and I could tell that they still believed that we had a chance to win it and continued to battle. But, [Tipton] outscored us 18-11 in the fourth. Mitchell hit five straight threes in the

In the first game of their sectional title defense, the Giants, after blowing a double-digit lead in the fourth quarter, kept their composure and made several key plays down the stretch to secure a 50-41 triumph over the Fort Wayne Bishop Luers Knights.

“I’m going to give credit to Bishop Luers’ defense, but a little bit on our side was fatigue,” Marion Head Coach Lawrence Jordan said. “We’ve been off since last Friday, and didn’t really get a chance to play like we wanted to. But, we fought through, and the most important thing was we survived and we advanced and we get to play again tomorrow.”

Poor shooting starts by both teams led to a low-scoring first quarter, but the Giants’ defense made life miserable for the Luers’ offense, holding them to two-of-13 shooting from the floor. Meanwhile, RaShaya Kyle began to enforce her will early, tallying four points and four rebounds in the opening frame as the Giants built an 11-5 lead.

The Giants’ defense continued to play at a high level in the second quarter, holding the Knights to just two-of-seven shooting in the stanza while taking a 19-13 lead into the intermission. Kyle, who towered above the entire Luers’ lineup, established her underneath the basket and made the most of her opportunities, scoring nine points and recording six rebounds in the opening 16 minutes.

Marion’s offense found their scoring touch in the third quarter, knocking down five of their eight shots to lead 34-24 heading into the final quarter.

Normally, the fourth quarter is where the Giants shine, as they’ve shown a knack for closing out games all season long, but in Friday’s game the Knights gave the Giants

Bishop Luers switched to a full-court press defense, which in turn threw the Giants’ offense out of sync. After Marion’s third turnover of the quarter, Luers’ Lydia Reimbold converted an and-one to cut Marion’s lead to 38-30. After Reimbold’s big play, the Knights went on an 11-4 run, which included three Delaney Bailey triples, trimming Marion’s advantage to 42-41 and sending the Luers’ crowd into a frenzy.

“They’ve got some streaky shooters, I talked about that in our pregame,” Jordan said. “At the end of the game, we had a couple of players that didn’t get in their spots, which allowed that girl [Bailey] to make a couple of threes and make it a little more interesting than we wanted it to be.”

However, with their season on the line, the Giants did not panic. On the following possession, Turner converted an and-one opportunity of her own, which jumpstarted a game-ending 8-0 surge that punched Marion’s ticket to the sectional semifinal.

Turner led the way with 16 points and six rebounds, while Kyle recorded a double-double with 15 points and 10 rebounds in the Giants’ victory.

The Marion Giants had to stave off a furious Fort Wayne Bishop Luers comeback to advance to the Class 3A Sectional 23 semifinal, but on Saturday, there was no drama, just another impressive win for the Giants in their quest for a second straight sectional title.

Three girls finished in double figures and the defensive effort was outstanding once again, as Marion defeated the Columbia City Eagles by score of 59-44. The Giants’ win on Saturday avenged their 54-37 loss to the Eagles back on November 16, one of just four defeats that Marion had suffered all year up to that point.

Alex Baker led the Panthers with a career-high 16 points, while Dylan Bragg finished with 13 and Garrett Holder 10. Justin Singer, the Panthers’ defensive specialist, chipped in seven points, including two triples, in the loss.

Madison-Grant Argyls climb over .500

After a heartbreaking weekend which saw the Madison-Grant Argyls drop two hardfought games to Oak Hill and Lapel, Head Coach Brian Trout and his team were looking for an excellent comeback effort.

On Saturday afternoon in Fairmont, the Argyls found themselves back in the win column, using a tremendous second half effort to come away with an 80-54 victory over the Taylor Titans. “We played really well,” Madison-Grant Head Coach Brian Trout said. “We got off to a better start than we did [in the games] last weekend, and that was a real focus today—just having a sense of urgency from the beginning [and] not waiting until we get down.”

Marion edges Muncie

Whenever the Marion Giants and the Muncie Central Bearcats compete against each other, it is always a battle, and Thursday’s contest at the Bill Green Arena was no different. For 32 minutes, these two longtime rivals, both of whom have won

eight boys basketball state championships, went toe-to-toe with one another, engaging in a physical affair that went right down to the wire.

In the end, the Giants proved to be the tougher team, and for the eighth time in the last nine games, Marion emerged victorious. Jalen Blackmon was sensational once again, Quran Howard played one of his best games of the season, and the Giants improved to 5-2 in the NCC with an 80-79 win over the Bearcats.

Marion came out a little sluggish on both ends at the start, and Muncie Central took full advantage. Victor Young scored nine points in the frame, which included six in the opening two minutes, to help the Bearcats take an 18-12 lead after one quarter of play. Muncie Central shot 50 percent from the field in the first stanza, while the Giants struggled to find any offensive consistency.

The Bearcats found success in their transition offense, making crisp, clean passes up the floor on their way to easy baskets in the paint. That offensive efficiency helped Muncie Central increase their lead to double digits midway through the second quarter. But the Giants kept their composure throughout the frame, and were able to cut the Muncie lead to six at halftime. Trailing 36-26, freshman Rasheed Jones knocked down a huge triple, and Blackmon scored four of the Giants’ final six points to make it a 41-35 Bearcats lead at the intermission.

Heading into the third quarter, the Giants were looking for a spark, and like he has many times throughout his Marion tenure, JK Thomas answered the call.

The junior shooting guard, playing in just his second game of the season, only scored five points, but those five points changed the momentum of the contest. His lone three of the game cut the Bearcats lead to five, and a steal-and-score moments later put the Giants in striking distance.

“We started out slow...but JK sparked us in the third quarter with the three and the steal,” Jalen Blackmon said. “I really think that switched

the whole game around.”

After the Giants’ defense forced their fourth turnover of the quarter, Howard knocked down two free throws on the other end, capping off an 11-2 run that tied the game at 46-46 and set the stage for what would be an exciting finish. Neither team led by more than four points the rest of the stanza, as the Bearcats grabbed a 62-60 advantage heading into the final eight minutes.

The back-and-forth action continued throughout the fourth quarter, as the two teams continued to trade baskets. But, as is usually the case for the Giants, the game came down to Jalen Blackmon.

Three straight putbacks—two by Howard and one by Blackmon—made it a 77-76 game. And after a Dre Aguilar rebound on the other end, Blackmon capped off his 13-point quarter with the biggest trey of the contest, putting the Giants ahead by one with under a minute to go.

Muncie’s Dylan Stafford tied the game up a few seconds later with a jump shot of his own, but Thomas found Aguilar underneath the basket, and the Giants’ big power forward knocked down one of his two free throws to help Marion regain the lead.

“I thought tonight, [Jalen] did a good job trusting his teammates,” Marion Head Coach James Blackmon said. “On that last possession, I would have liked him to hold the ball a little bit longer, but it was about spacing the floor. He believed that JK could break his man down, and JK did a good job of finding Dre, and Dre made that free throw. That’s what we needed to close them out.”

In the final 23 seconds, Marion played one of their best defensive series of the year, not allowing the Bearcats to get a shot off while forcing the ball out of bounds. While Muncie Central did retain possession, they were left with just 1.3 seconds on the clock, and their final attempt fell harmlessly to the floor, securing Marion’s victory.

“It’s one of the things that I said in the timeout [before that possession]—it’s time

for us to be tough, we’ve got to communicate, [and] we’ve got to put it all together this possession,” James Blackmon said. “I thought we [had] one of the best possessions defending the ball all year.”

Blackmon led the Giants with 36 points, and has taken on the role of Bearcat killer in his first two varsity seasons. He hit the game-winning shot in overtime against Muncie Central last year, and he did so again on Thursday night.

“They’re always going to be a tough team,” Jalen Blackmon said. “Last year was a very close game too. Both teams come to play their best game, [but] the last two years, we’ve been better than them.”

Howard was nearly as remarkable, coming away with 22 points and 18 rebounds, 12 of which came in the second half. He was dominant force in the paint on both ends of the floor all evening long.

“I’ve just been coming out and trying to play with more confidence,” Howard said. “Every single day, the coaches are telling to just get better at my role. I just like to rebound and block shots and clean up the offensive glass—that’s about it.”

“If he realizes how good he can be, it makes us a better ball club,” Blackmon added. “Tonight, he demonstrated what he can be by staying out of foul trouble...he played a little smarter, he was straight up and down instead of slapping, and his rotation was a lot better.”

Young led the Bearcats with 18 points, while Kameron Jackson scored 17 and Tyrke Walker 15.

In a long and grueling season, every win is a great win. But, it’s always extra special to take down a longtime conference rival. And with the final month of the season approaching, the Giants are rounding into form at just the right time.

“We played those guys last year [and] it went to a [one] possession game,” Blackmon said. “We knew it was going to be a battle this year. We both knew that we wanted to put ourselves in the position to fight for the conference championship. We

knew what was riding on it, and we just wanted to defend our home court tonight, and I thought our guys did that.”
