## County hunkers down

Cold shutters schools, businesses, government

While Indiana does have its fair share of cold weather, snow, and ice in the winter months, the frigid temperatures that the state endured on Wednesday and Thursday of the past week were of historic proportion.

January 30 was the coldest day in Indiana since 1994, with wind chills of up to -50. Frostbite can occur anywhere from five to 30 minutes in that kind of cold, while pipes will freeze and cars will have trouble starting. Because of these dangerous weather conditions, multiple schools, businesses, and government agencies closed in Marion on those two days.

Michael Burton could not remember many occasions where the Grant County Commissioners actually closed their doors on a business day, but made the decision on Wednesday and Thursday to do so for the sake of his workers' safety. "We wanted to be sure that our employees coming to and from work were safe, and we just felt that because of the brutal cold wind chill factors that we should shut down," Burton said. "We just felt this was the best thing to do."

Marion Community Schools Superintendent Brad Lindsay tracked the weather over the course of several days. With having a plethora of students that commute to their respective schools in a variety of different ways, the decision was made to cancel school on Wednesday and Thursday. "When it gets to be -20 wind chill, then -30 wind chill, then -40 wind chill, if your skin is exposed, it just doesn't take very long [to display frostbite,]" Lindsay said. "When you talk about children, there are walkers. There are bus stops. There are cars that may or may not start or have problems. It just wasn't worth the

Rain or shine, hospitals remain open 24/7 to take care of patients at any point of the day or night. However, while Marion General Hospital did not close, several areas were not in operation. "We looked at the service line, which is our Wound Clinic, our Pulmonary Clinic, our Pulmonary Physicians, and Diabetes," nurse Cindy Futrell said. "Those people should not be out in the cold. We were very selective when we made the decision on what units we would shut down for the day."

For the hospital, doctors and nurses were concerned that patients being out in kind of weather for a sustained period time could develop even more serious health issues. "When you have lung issues, the cold makes it much harder for them to breathe," nurse Tammy Cornelius said. "When you have a wound and your circulation isn't very good, being in the cold complicates that even more. Diabetes patients, same thing."

Despite the cold weather, however, many people managed to make it on time to their appointments. Those who did not re-scheduled their checkups for another day. "We saw over 220 patients on the coldest day of the year," Futrell said. "Patients made sure they got to their appointments if they needed them.

Even the City of Marion adminstrative offices closed on Wednesday and Thursday, as Mayor Jess Alumbaugh urged the residents of Marion to stay inside unless it was absolutely neces-

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





I once put together a panel program to answer the absurd question of whether Mr. Lincoln became Mr. Lincoln "because of" or "in spite of' his rural Midwestern irritations in my life is that Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky continue this divisive bornhere-grew-up-there quibbling rather than harmonizing on the riff that we all are in and of Lincoln country.

Imagine the tourist dollars rolling in from a cooperative tour of Lincoln Land that began in Hardin County then moved on to Spencer County and over to the banks of the Sangamon River--and, no, you do not need a passport.

Not everyone agrees on the merits of Mr. Lincoln himself. I once knew a fellow who was a serious Lincoln scholar who, deep in his soul, believed that (his words) "assassination was a good

judgment, but probably more correct than most of us like to think. He won the war but could he have won the peace? Don't know. Never will. In many ways, we aren't there yet, are we?

There are those, however, who point out that, prior to the Civil War, we said "The United States are...." and only after the war did it become "The United States is ... " Mission accomplished.

Millions of gallons of blood shed, but he held the place together.

To get a sense of Mr. Lincoln deep in your soul, in your gut, somewhere that you never went back in history class, you need to visit the Lincoln Memorial at the far west end of the National Mall in Washington, DC.

The massive marble edifice will be getting renewed attention in the next couple of years as it approaches its centennial: 100 years since it was completed and dedicated on May 30, 1922, 57 years after the death of the man it celebrates.

Glorious, somber, elegant, imposing, reverent, America's finest tribute to one of its own. The marble statue of the seated measures 19 feet high, and 19 feet wide. The base on which it rests is another 55 tons. It

draws 6 million visitors a year. Accompany me, if you will, on a visit to this place.

It is a winter night in Washington. Fresh snow (not much by our standards) on the landscape of the Mall. It is nearly 1 o'clock in the morning, We have walked along M Street and Pennsylvania Avenue to 23rd Street and past the Watergate and across Constitution Avenue. Ahead is Independence Avenue and to our left, the Washington Monument and the great dome of the Capitol in the distance. All

We are alone. No tourists. No police. No protestors. No demonstrators. Not even one of those green uniformed folks from the National Park Service in sight, although we've no doubt they are here.

We ascend the steps and enter that enormous space: 200 feet wide, 130 feet across to the other side. Banks of spotlights 60 feet above us in the ceiling are carefully directed at Daniel Chester French's breathtaking tribute

Notice is hereby given that an Ordinance Allowing for Certain Off-Road Vehicle and Golf Cart Usage on Grant County Highways was adopted at a duly held regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Grant County, Indiana, held on January 22, 2019. The ordinance will be effective after its publication herein, and the full text of the ordinance is set out below:

WHEREAS, it is determined that, Grant County, Indiana, is in need of a policy governing Off-Road Vehicles, as defined by IC§ 14-8-2-185, and Golf Carts as defined by IC§ 14-8-2-116.5, usage on county roadways;

WHEREAS, IC§ 14-I6-I-20(a) (3) authorizes a local highway department to allow Off-Road Vehicles and Golf Carts to operate on county roads, pursuant to limits imposed by state law; WHEREAS, all other applicable state traffic and other laws, in-

cluding but not limited to the following will remain in full force and effect and abiding by such laws shall remain the operator's sole re-1) All applicable speed limits -- Operators are put on notice that

No passengers are permitted on single seat Off-Road Vehicles and/or Golf Carts on Grant County Roadways, passengers on

Off-Road Vehicles and/or Golf Carts must have at least Oper ating headlights and taillights with operating brake lights and operators must use hand signals if their Off-Road Vehicles and/ or Golf Carts does not have turn signals when in operation on Grant County Roadways. Golf Carts shall display a slow moving vehicle emblem (a triangular emblem that conforms to the standards and specifications under Ind. Code Sec. 9-21-9-2). The emblem must be clearly visible and mounted to the rear with the base no lower than 3 feet nor the top higher than 5 feet from the

ground. The emblem must not be obstructed by passengers. Off-Road Vehicles and/or Golf Carts being actively used for agricultural purposes are exempt from Sections 2 through 8 of this

Failure to abide by any of the above conditions when an, Off-Road Vehicle and/or Golf Carts is in use on Grant County Highways shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.

Fines and penalties for violations of this ordinance:

1. First violation - \$25.00;

to I.C. §34-28-5.

2. Second violation - \$100.00 and a 60-day suspension from using, Off-Road Vehicles, and/or Golf Carts on Grant County

3. Third and Subsequent Violations - \$250.00 and a lifetime suspension from using Off-Road Vehicles, and/or Golf Carts on Grant County Roadways;

4. Any conviction for criminal trespass involving an Off-Road Vehicle or Golf Carts, subsequent to the passage of this ordinance, shall result in an automatic lifetime suspension from the operation of Recreational Off-Road Vehicles, and/or Golf Carts on Grant County Roadways.

5. The violation of a 60-day or lifetime suspension shall result in a \$500 fine for each offense.

6. Court costs, as set by the state schedule, shall apply to all cases contested in court.

7. All fines shall be deposited into the Grant County General 8. Enforcement of this ordinance shall be conducted pursuant
