Area businessman promotes Marion, hosts lecture series

Bill Reece has not lived in Marion for 35 years, so some may find it ironic that he is on a mission to convince people that his hometown has a great future as a place to live and make a living.

At a recent lecture, arranged by Reece, he said, among other things:

- “Our goal is to highlight the amazing things that can happen in Grant County from finance to the arts.”
- “I came back to Marion for a lot of reasons, but primarily because I think Marion has so much opportunity in terms of economic growth.”
- “Marion already has a global impact through the missions of Taylor University and Indiana Wesleyan University to send out great professionals around the globe.”
- “I think our city is really getting its feet under itself again. Marion is really coming back.”

After graduating from Marion High School in 1984, Reece followed a path taken by too many of Marion’s best and brightest. He left town, attended Purdue University and has spent the last 35 years living on the East Coast--25 years in Boston, and, more recently, in Miami, Florida.

Since returning to Marion in 2017, Reece has been practicing what he has been preaching. He has started two businesses and bought one of Marion’s newer

Gerry Dick on Grant County

Gerry Dick compared leadership to a three-legged stool, involving the public, private and academic sectors.

“Grant County has a substantial component here with both Indiana Wesleyan University and Taylor University in your backyard. Those institutions add great fuel to the entrepreneurial ecosystem in this part of the state,” Dick said.

Dick praised Reece for sponsoring the lecture series, which he said was an ideal way to get the three sectors together.

“All three need to start rowing the boat together, and I see evidence of that beginning to happen in Grant County,” he said. “People working together to discuss their futures are what’s happening in successful communities.”

Dick also praised Marion and Grant County for being on the forefront of a statewide movement to provide co-working spaces for start-up businesses and for recent renovations of buildings on the courthouse square.

In response to a question from Ed Breen, who served as moderator for the discussion, Dick said political and business leaders in the metropolitan Indianapolis “donut hole” do not understand that many Hoosier communities are struggling.

“They may say they do, but they don’t understand the depth of those struggles,” Dick said. “One of the biggest concerns for the state is rural economic development.”

Local leaders need to find ways to deliver that message, he said.

downtown buildings, the former Old National Bank Building, which originally was built as an office for Indiana Michigan Power, at First and Washington Streets.

His hydroponics business on Branson Street is a few months away from producing three tons of lettuce a month, and enrollment is running well ahead of projections in his yoga studio in the former bank building.


On February 13, Reece launched what will be a 12-month series of lectures on “Innovation,

Investment and Impact.” The lectures, titled @100 South, are being held in the yoga studio.

The first lecture featured Gerry Dick, a former Indianapolis news anchor, who has been the host of Inside INdiana Business since 2000. The more than 60 people who attended the lecture, all of them invited personally by Reece, represented a cross section of Grant County’s public, private and academic sectors.

Rep. Cook pushing hate crimes bill

For the past several years, there has been an increase in the number of bias-motivated crimes reported throughout the country. Because of these growing numbers, a statewide hate crimes statute is in high demand from businesses and religious groups. In an effort to protect all Hoosiers from criminals who may target them for who they are, I authored House Bill 1020 to increase penalties for these crimes.

Motivation and intent are already considered in criminal trials. A bias crimes bill would

adding another tool for judges to use when sentencing. This proposal for a new law would not criminalize any speech, no matter how shocking. It is only when the hatred that fuels that speech turns into criminal action, such as assault, that a bias crime law would be applied as an aggravating circumstance and lengthen a criminal sentence. Hate crimes target specific groups based on real or perceived traits like race, religion, disability, gender identity and sexual orientation. Discrimination targeting these characteristics happens every day. The Indiana Civil Rights Commission received 2,874 cases of discrimination in 2017. Not only is passing a hate crimes law the right thing to do, it is the smart thing to do. Having specific protected groups would help attract economic development from other states and countries. By having a law that clearly protects specific characteristics of individuals, businesses will know Indiana is a welcoming state. As one of only five states without hate crime legislation, I believe it is time for a change. More specifically, Indiana needs a bias crime law with unambiguous protected classes in order to defend Hoosiers who are more likely to be victims of hateful attacks. I have heard from many constituents on this topic as I have refined this bill, and I encourage you to share your thoughts and opinions with me on this matter by emailing me at h32@iga.in.gov or calling at (317) 232-9863.

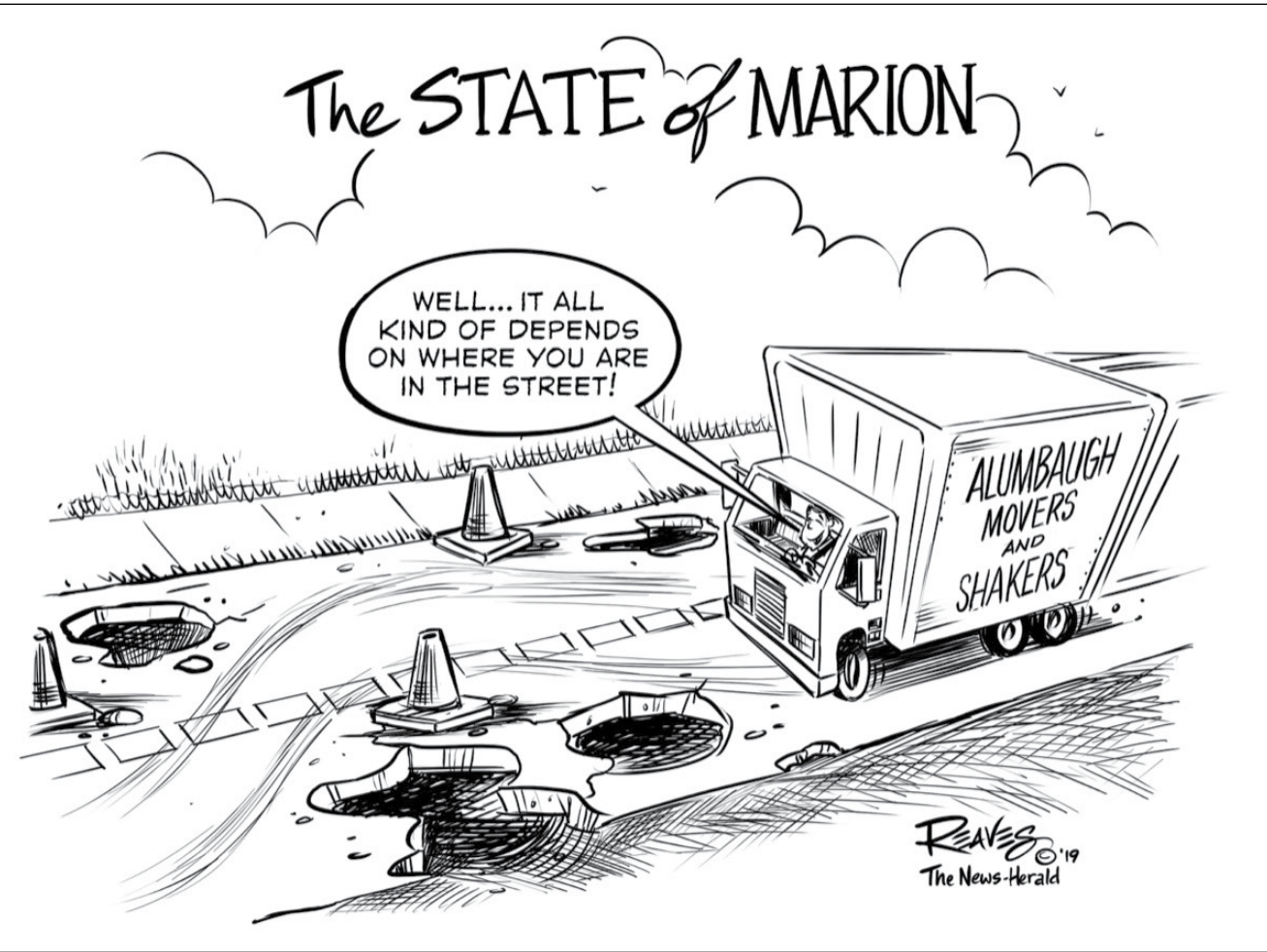

Heading into Saturday's Class 2A Northern Semi-State clash against defending state champion and No. 1-ranked Central Noble, the Golden Eagles were the top defensive team in the state of Indiana, allowing just 27.9 points per game.

That defensive prowess led them to 18 wins in the regular season. It lifted them to their third sectional championship in three seasons. It played a huge role in their dominant victory over Tip-ton in the regional final.

Last Saturday, in the Golden Eagles' toughest test of the year, in front of a raucous crowd at the Berry Bowl, against a team that had a 27-0 record coming in, the Oak Hill defense held the Cougars to just 36 points.

Their offense also scored the most that any team had managed against Central Noble all season, and so, for the second time in three seasons, Oak Hill is heading back to Bankers Life Field-house for a chance at a 2A state championship, after defeating the Cougars by a score of 53-36.

"It feels great, obviously," Oak Hill Head Coach Todd Law said. "You're looking at a group of girls who have worked so hard [and] a coaching staff that has just given absolutely everything they can for four years. So, as a coach, you always want to make sure...[that] you put them in a position to be able to realize those dreams. We feel like we've got a chance now."

In the first quarter neither team led by more than three points. Central Noble star guard and Ball State com-

mit Sydney Freeman found some success, scoring seven points, while a buzzer-beating field goal from Bridgette Gray gave the Cougars a 12-10 lead after the first frame.

"The second quarter was really our quarter," Oak Hill point guard Brittany McCorkle said. "We knew that, [after that,] we only had 16 minutes left to play, and we really wanted it. So, we decided to step up our defensive game a little bit."

After Central Noble opened the quarter with a field goal, the Golden Eagles dominated. Oak Hill forced eight Central Noble turnovers and scored 10 points off of those giveaways, ending the first half on a 13-2 run.

"We came out in the second [quarter] a lot harder [and] a lot stronger," Oak Hill center Taylor Westgate said. "We worked on this all week and I am so glad of the outcome."

After allowing Freeman to shoot three-for-four in the first quarter, the Golden Eagles held her scoreless in the second as they built a 23-16 halftime lead.

"I think a lot of it was just calming down and getting back into what the gameplan was--really trying to seal up gaps so Freeman couldn't drive," Law said. "She's so good, and she still got plenty of opportunities in there, but our kids did a good job of trying to keep her on the perimeter. We always had somebody on her, within two or three feet of her."

While Oak Hill's guards took care of Freeman, Westgate and Andrea Wilk did an excellent job of guarding Meleah Leatherman. In

nearly 13 minutes of playing time in the first half, Leatherman was ineffective, failing to score any points before being forced to the bench with two fouls.

"Our posts did a great job of bringing down help to try and cover Leatherman down inside," Law said. "We felt like if we could limit her touches, and then especially when shots went up for them, we could really block her out."

Oak Hill added to their lead early in the third quarter, opening the frame with a 9-2 run to increase their advantage to 15. A 7-0 response by the Cougars cut the Oak Hill lead back down to single digits, but an Adrianna Trexler bucket in the waning moments put the Golden Eagles up 35-25 heading into the final quarter.

Oak Hill led by double digits the rest of the way, never trailing by any less than 11 points in the final eight minutes.

"I'm so incredibly happy for my team and the community," Oak Hill guard Jenessa Hasty said. "We felt no pressure, honestly, because they were the No. 1-ranked team and they had the better record, but I think that's what really pushed us through."

Oak Hill's defense forced

to help put the game away.

"I'm ready to go to Indy right now and I'm ready to play," Trexler said with a big grin on her face. "I'm fired up. It was a heck of a game. I love playing with this team so much. They mean the world to me."

McCorkle played her best game in an Oak Hill uniform, scoring nine points and leading the team with five steals. Her defensive play at the top of the key against one of the best players in the state played a huge role in Oak Hill's semi-state championship.

"A couple of those [steals] especially were at very pivotal points where momentum maybe had changed a little bit," Law said. "And she was able to sneak in there and get them."

"I feel like I did my role tonight," McCorkle added. "Coach always talks about doing your job, and I feel like I did that tonight."

Hasty finished with eight points in the contest, while Westgate also collected eight points together with nine rebounds.

"I don't think we had a

player that didn't play well today," Law said. "That says a lot for those kids. When you step on this stage with this atmosphere...and [have] everyone play well, that's great."

Freeman led the Cougars with 16 points on seven-of-16 shooting from the floor, while Gray added 10 and Leatherman finished with eight.

Northwestern tops Marion

The Marion Lady Giants were playing in their first semi-state game since 1986. The Northwestern Tigers were playing in their second straight semi-state contest after winning the 3A state championship a season ago. The disparity in experience was evident.

Behind a 27-point effort from star point guard Madison Layden, the Tigers advanced to their second straight Class 3A state final with a 59-31 triumph over the Giants in the Logansport Berry Bowl.

The Giants struggled with ball control from the onset, turning the ball over

six times in the first quarter against an effective Northwestern press.

"You can credit their defense," Marion Head Coach Lawrence Jordan said. "It was a huge moment for us, and sometimes...the moment can be too big for you. I just felt like at the beginning of the game, we threw the ball away four, five, six times to allow them to get into their flow, get into their rhythm, and get some easy baskets."

Northwestern shot six-for-13 in the first quarter, while the Giants attempted just three shots in the opening frame as the Tigers took a 14-5 lead.

"We were trying to be ready to play, and the nerves just took over," Marion center RaShaya Kyle said. "It was all nerves."

The Giants did not fare much better in the second quarter, scoring just seven points and turning the ball over five more times. Layden had 11 points and four assists at halftime, while Michigan State commit Kendall Bostic came away with eight points and five rebounds in the first 16 minutes.

"We wanted to pressure them," Northwestern Head Coach Kathie Layden said. "Obviously that was our gameplan coming in. We wanted Kendall to make sure she was in front of Kyle at all times, and then we wanted to pressure their guards so they couldn't make an easy pass in."

The Tigers have been in this position before. They know how to win big games, and they know how to handle raucous environments like the Berry Bowl.

"I think our girls came in determined," Kathie Layden said. "You know, I don't think there was a lot of excitement coming into this game because I think our girls came in with one goal in mind. Because we've been here, I think it was easy for them to focus more on the goal rather than the atmosphere."

Northwestern continued to increase their lead in the third quarter, outscoring the Giants 18-7 to take a 47-19 lead, before cruising in the final frame to a 28-point victory.

Along with Layden's 27 points, Bostic finished the game with 12 points and six rebounds, while Klair Merrell added 10 points, including two triples.

Along with that, the Tigers did an excellent job of sharing the basketball, coming away with 15 assists on 20 made field goals.

"These girls have played together for a long time, and I think it does show," Layden said. "They are all so willing to make extra passes, and they're not satisfied with a good shot, they are constantly looking for a great shot."

Kyle led the Giants with 11 points and six rebounds, while Jazmyn Turner finished with nine points. Turnovers were the biggest factor in Marion's season-ending

loss, as they turned the ball over 21 times throughout the course of the contest.

"They're a good team. We're a good team. But you can't give another good team an extra 20 opportunities to beat you," Jordan said. "We had way too many unforced turnovers. They had a press, but it wasn't aggressive like Angola's press. It was simply us being a little bit nervous and not being ready to play for whatever reason."

While Marion's season ended just short of a state final berth, the Giants' 2018-2019 campaign was a rousing success. They repeated as sectional champions, while winning their first regional crown in 33 seasons.

"It was tough losing," Marion forward Jazmyn Turner said. "But I'm still happy with what we accomplished."

In just two seasons, Jordan took a team that won five games and molded them into a state final contender. Now, he is already looking forward to next season.

"It was just a buy-in with the girls," Jordan said. "They listened and they received the coaching. We bought in, we got that zone clicking, and we still won 23 games playing with only six girls. That's a lot of credit to our girls. They worked their butts off and they all had great attitudes. We were sad to see it end, but at the same time, we had a great season, and the girls worked hard. We have to get ready to rebuild for next year."

Politics at work in the city council, mayor's race

Only last week, just a few days ago, we gave you a scorecard for the mayoral race in Marion: Three Republicans, four Democrats and probably a stray independent to enter the fray later on.

Within hours--literally in less than 48 hours--this thing, this May 7 primary election, descended into accusation, innuendo, inference, investigation, insult and insinuation. All elements that we do not need in a local election in small-town America, particularly this town at this time.

We have pawns and moles. We have lawyers and prosecutors and auditors. We have stolen e-mails and

hushed conversations in halls and out-of-the-way places.

We have casualties, with the promise of more.

What we do not have is thought or ideas or plans or proposals for the future of a town that has taken its lumps in the past two decades.

We have people who still want the previous mayor--that's the mayor from four years back--to go to jail. We have people who believe that the present mayor has done either too much or too little to fix the mess he inherited.

We have veiled accusation of misdeeds.

We have just plain politics in a large enough dosage

that it threatens dismemberment of the police and fire departments.

What we do not have is thoughtful discussion about the management of the place where we live.

While the rumor mill is running three shifts and overtime, we'll leave all that alone because, quite simply, the facts and the fictions haven't been sorted.

But one manufactured crisis in particular is threatening, without good reason, to blow up the command structure of the police and fire departments. It has already led to the resignation of an assistant police chief and will likely do more damage if good judgment does not prevail.

We'll give you the Readers' Digest version: Chiefs and assistant chiefs of the police and fire departments are, as you would expect, outside of the unions which represent police and fire fighters in contract talks with the city. Yet for years (and no one knows how many; maybe 30 years) they have received the benefits package--holiday pay, sick pay, vacations--identical to the unionized ranks. No one seems to know how this happened.

In a recent and routine audit, the State Board of Accounts said this needs to be fixed. Can't do it this way, they said. Nothing wrong with giving the benefits, but it needs to be made clear

in budgets and ordinances that these men and women are not part of the bargaining unit. Fix the language and budget the money and move on. The language is complicated and the money is about \$25,000 a year in total.

Now, we shall not get bogged down in he-said/she-said here. Bottom line is that the brass in the two departments have been stripped of their benefits and the city council won't budge. No money for this until 2020, they say. They're squabbling with the mayor over who is to write the language and what it is to say.

Of critical importance here: Four members of the council--Steve Henderson, Dave Homer, Lynn Johnson and Henry Smith--are running for mayor. Each has a reason to be obstructionist, although Homer, who was a recipient of these benefits when he was police chief, seems to be the leader of the pack.

(We need to point out that all these council shenanigans are going on in secrecy because the council has somehow convinced itself that it's legal. It isn't, but that's for another day.)

So the pawns are in place: Police Chief Angela Haley, two assistant chiefs, Fire Chief Geoff Williams and his assistant. One has fallen, others probably will. Why would they not?

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Are there any adults left in the room?
