County remembers those who gave their all

A brief break in the weather, a great outpouring of volunteers and a traditional cause came together Saturday morning at the Marion National Cemetery as volunteers positioned thousands of American flags at the burial plots of nearly 12,000 men and women who have served in the United States military.

The placing of the flags at the grave markers was in preparation for Monday's Memorial Day observance on the grounds of the cemetery along East 38th Street in southeast Marion.

More than 100 volunteers--men, women, children, young, old--assembled near the entrance at 9 am Saturday and received their instructions from Tom Kulich, assistant director of the National Cemetery in Marion.

Marion area Scout and Cub Scout troops distributed flags, in bundles

While the final weekend in May is all about the Indianapolis 500 in the state of Indiana, it is coupled with one of the most important and reflective days of the entire calendar year. Every Memorial Day weekend, people from all over the United States of America remember those who paid the ultimate sacrifice to ensure the safety of our people, our values, and most of all, our freedom.

On Sunday, at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Captain Mary Horner, together with 600 other members of the Indiana National Guard, was honored for answering the call to action in a brief, poignant ceremony before the 103rd running of the 500.

The soldiers all gathered outside of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum, where they were blessed, prayed for, and praised for their sacrifice by mul-

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Four things that God had in mind for women

Titus 2:1-5
I am a firm believer that timing is everything. Everything that our Heavenly Father does, He does in His time. On the other hand, I can't always say that about me. It seems that I am always a day late and a dollar short. By the time I do it, it has already passed me by. However, not so with God. His timing is perfect.

When our Lord created this world, He did it all in six days. Of all that He did, He saved the best for last. I am convinced that creating woman was an act of beauty. He knew that man wasn't complete, and he wouldn't be complete, so He gave man a helpmeet. It was woman, the completer, not the competer. God's purpose was to give man everything

he needed, and woman was the icing on the cake. God not only had a purpose, but He had a plan as well. Part of the plan is found in Titus 2:1-5. As you read this text, there is a good chance you read right over a "key" word that makes the entire passage come to life. Verse one tells us, "But speak thou the things which become sound doctrine." The word, "become" means that woman beautifies sound doctrine. A woman of God does exactly what this text says, she beautifies God's Word by her life. Now, this isn't a reference to the exterior, but rather the entire being, inside and out. She is one which adorns, becomes, and beautifies the work of God. A spiritual woman catches the eye of the world.

As this passage unfolds, there are four things that God had in mind for woman:

1. Her Mandate (verses: 3,4)

The Word tells us that the older (mature) women are to be an example to the younger women. The thought is that the mature women have already experienced the seasoning of life. Experience is a tremendous teacher. As they learn these various life-lessons, they need to be passed along. The mature women share life, and the younger women are supposed to listen and learn.

2. Her Motive (verse: 5)
"That the Word of God be not blasphemed." The meaning of this passage is

a simple one that is of vital importance. Simply put, woman is to help build a strong home life. I am convinced marriage is the most important institution. As the home goes, so goes the church, the world, and everything else. Our dilemma today is the foundation of the home is being destroyed, brick by brick. If our society is going to get better, the home is the key.

3. Her Manner of Life (verse: 3)

"As becometh holiness." This talks about behavior. A woman's behavior should have a fragrance that smells good. There is an aura, a glow about a Godly woman, the beauty of Christ radiates from her life.

4. Her Message (verses: 4,5)

Women are to teach, but what are they to teach? They must teach God's Word, not just by speak-

ing, but most of all by their actions. They are to be serious-minded, level-headed and able to make good decisions. They are to run the household well. We get a larger example of this in Proverbs 31.

I am thankful that I know a lot of women who exemplify these great characteristics. When God created woman, He knew what He was doing, and He knew what we needed. Life would not be the same without woman.



tiple high-ranking officers and by Governor Eric Holcomb.

"It was a very special event," Horner said after the ceremony had concluded. "It is wonderful to see the love and support from the 500 and Indiana."

Horner and her team will be heading to Kuwait, where she will work as a Space Operations officer for the next year.

A Grant County resident all of her life, Horner grew up in Upland, graduating from Eastbrook in 2002. Her family eventually moved to Marion, and during the summer months she worked with her fa-

ther Verlin at their family business, Horner's Butcher Block. Horner loved spending her formative years in Marion, stating that she enjoyed how close knit the community was.

After her high school graduation, Horner attended Indiana University for one year, but, in 2003, she enlisted in the National Guard, and has served in the United States military ever since. Her first tour of duty came in 2009-2010, when she was deployed to Iraq. Upon her return, she went to Officer Candidate School, where she was commissioned as an intelligence officer in 2012.

After serving for 16 years in the National Guard, Horner was recently promoted to the rank of

captain, and when she was called again to service, she was ready for the next challenge. For Horner, the military has become a career, and she is willing to serve her country in any capacity.

While in Kuwait, Horner and her team will serve in a support role, working closely with other American forces, as well as their allies, to help bring about long-term stability in the Middle East.

"It is a privilege to represent the State of Indiana and the US Army," Horner said. "I take great pride in our service and am glad that we can have a positive effect locally and globally."

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
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There’s a Hoosier connection to ‘Ball Game’

What with this being Memorial Day week and the unofficial start of the summer season, we can afford a little fun today.

So start with this: Who has made the most atrocious of all recordings of one of America’s most-beloved songs of summer and what is the name of that song?

The singer, if you can call him that, is, of course, Harry Caray, and the song is “Take Me Out to the Ballgame,” the perennial seventh inning stretch crowd pleaser at Wrigley Field and a lot of other ballparks around America.

The late Mr. Caray’s rendition came from the press box in the upper deck at Wrigley Field during all those years when the seventh inning stretch could be the highlight of the afternoon, and often was.

But the song goes back to 1908, and, as you might expect, is Hoosier, or at least has Hoosier all over its DNA. The story goes like this:

A lyricist and songwriter from Philadelphia named Jack Norworth was riding a New York subway train back in the early 1900s. He had been working on a ditty about a girl named Katie Casey, but was struggling. From the train

he saw a sign that read “Baseball Today—Polo Grounds,” which back then was the home of the New York Giants.

He put words to paper: Katie Casey was baseball mad, Had the fever and had it bad. Just to root for the home town crew, Every cent Katie blew. On a Saturday her young beau Called to see if she’d like to go To see a show, but Miss Kate said “No, I’ll tell you what you can do:”

And that segued into the chorus:

Take me out to the ball game, Take me out with the crowd; Buy me some peanuts and Cracker Jack I don’t care if I never get back. Let me root, root, root for the home team, If they don’t win, it’s a shame. For it’s one, two, three strikes, you’re out, At the old ball game.

Now this is where the Hoosier connection comes. Norworth, more wordsmith than composer, got with Albert VonTilzer, an Indianapolis musician, to

put the words to music and what we have today is very close to what Norworth and VonTilzer crafted 111 years ago.

VonTilzer, born in Indianapolis in 1878, was the younger brother of another songwriter, Harry VonTilzer. They were the children of Polish Jewish immigrants and very early got into the music writing and publishing business.

All of them—the Von Tilzers and Northworth—were part of the era known as Tin Pan Alley.

The song was first sung by Norworth’s then-wife Nora Bayes and later popularized by many other vaudeville acts. It was played at a ballpark for the first time, so far as we know, in 1934, at a high school game in Los Angeles. Later that year, it moved to the big leagues and was played during Game 4 of the 1934 World Series between the St. Louis Cardinals and the Detroit Tigers.

The first recorded version was by a fellow named Edward Meeker. His recording was selected by the Library of Congress as a 2010 addition to the National Recording Registry which picks recordings each year that are “culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant,” and it came in number

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

for Oak Hill. He then did what he had hoped to do and stayed unbeaten this season in the 400 to score 10 more points for the Eagles.

Maybe the event of the night for Oak Hill came in the 110 hurdles, where Sammy Sommers came in third, and, shockingly, Gabe Overmyer came in fifth to score 10 more points for Oak Hill. Sammy then came back with a super run and got

Oak Hill 66, Carroll 65. A regional title for the ages for Oak Hill. Since we went to class sports, the first regional title ever for a 1A or 2A school.

Six Eagles now get to go to the state meet, but the big story is the regional title stolen from the track powerhouse that is Ft. Wayne, Indiana.

The Oak Hill Golden Eagles boys track and field team made a little history on Thursday evening at the Marion Regional.

With three athletes recording top-three finishes in five events, the Golden Eagles won their first regional track and field championship since 1977, edging heavy favorite Carroll by one point, as well as defeating other high-profile programs such as Homestead, Fort Wayne Snider, and Fort Wayne South Side.

Sammy Sommers qualified for the state meet in three events. He placed third in the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 14.94, second in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 39.31, and first in the long jump with a distance of 23-10, a new Oak Hill school record.

After finishing as the state runner-up in the 400 last year, Tahj Johnson will be competing for a state

championship once again this season. He finished first in the regional with a time of 48.93. Johnson also advanced in the long jump, placing third with a distance of 22-5.

Gavin Holz rounds out the group, placing second in the pole vault at 15-0.

All of the other four Grant County schools will have at least one representative in Bloomington next weekend. Eastbrook's Clay Dalton advanced after placing third in the shot put with a distance of 48-11¼, while Marion's Zaimar Burnett will run in the 200 after finishing in second with a time of 22.30. Mississinewa's Brennan Butche advanced in the 1600 and 3200, placing third in the 1600 with a time of 4:20.20 and fourth in the 3200 with a time of 9:33.86.

At the Kokomo regional, Madison-Grant's AJ Jones also punched his ticket to Bloomington, finishing sec-

ond in the shot put with a distance of 52-9¾.

Competing against some of the top-ranked programs and runners, two Grant County athletes proved their merit on Tuesday evening.

In the IWU regional, Mississinewa's Beth Lucas, who has dominated the 300-meter hurdles event all season long, made history, becoming just the second Lady Indian to advance to the IHSAA State Finals. Lucas placed third in the event with a time of 46.13.

In the Warsaw regional, Madison-Grant's Payton Freel also punched her ticket to the state meet, placing third in the shot put with a distance of 39-06.

The IHSAA State Finals will be held on Saturday, June 1 at the Robert C. Haugh Track & Field Complex in Bloomington, and is set to begin at 3 pm.
