## County remembers those who gave their all

A brief break in the weather, a great outpouring of volunteers and a traditional cause came together Saturday morning at the Marion National Cemetery as volunteers positioned thousands of American flags at the burial plots of nearly 12,000 men and women who have served in the United States military.

The placing of the flags at the grave markers was in preparation for Monday's Memorial Day observance on the grounds of the cemetery along East 38th Street in southeast Marion.

More than 100 volunteers--men, women, children, young, old--assembled near the entrance at 9 am Saturday and received their instructions from Tom Kulich, assistant director of the National Cemetery in Marion.







## There's a Hoosier connection to 'Ball Game'

rial Day week and the unofficial start of the summer season, we can afford a little fun today.

So start with this: Who has made the most atrocious of all recordings of one of America's mostbeloved songs of summer and what is the name of

The singer, if you can call him that, is, of course, Harry Caray, and the song is "Take Me Out to the Ballgame," the perennial seventh inning stretch crowd pleaser at Wrigley Field and a lot of other ballparks around America.

The late Mr. Carav's rendition came from the press box in the upper deck at Wrigley Field during all those years when the seventh inning stretch could be the highlight of the afternoon, and often was.

But the song goes back to 1908, and, as you might expect, is Hoosier, or at least has Hoosier all over its DNA. The story goes

A lyricist and songwriter from Philadelphia named Jack Norworth was riding a New York subway train back in the early 1900s. He had been working on a ditty about a girl name Katie Casey, but was struggling. From the train

Later that year, it moved to the big leagues and was played during Game 4 of the 1934 World Series between the St. Louis Cardinals and the Detroit Tigers.



# Golden Eagles take regional title in T&F

first fell in love with track and field here in Indiana as a student at Ft. Wayne Concordia High School.

The city of Ft. Wayne in the late 1960s was loaded with track and field talent and every year a summit city team either won the state title or was in major contention. The radio stations in Ft. Wayne even covered the state finals on a regular basis.

So fast forward to last Thursday night at Marion High School and you can imagine what was going through my mind as Oak Hill High School was competing event by event with the big boys from Ft. Wayne.

Coach Paige Brunner (fill disclosure: Paige is Jim's son--Ed.) had athlete after athlete not just score points but totally exceed what they were expected to do.

I had already seeded the event and I thought that, on a perfect night, Oak Hill had a shot at second, which would be incredible. But as the evening went on it became apparent that every Eagle on the track was blowing away his predicted finish.

Dillon Mitchell, Colin Harts, Sol B'blenis and Jacob Winger, seeded ninth, came in a strong seventh to bag two points for the team. Tahj Johnson ran with the top sprinters and got fourth in the 200 to score five big points

for Oak Hill. He then did what he had hoped to do and stayed unbeaten this season in the 400 to score 10 more points for the Eagles.

Maybe the event of the night for Oak Hill came in the 110 hurdles, where Sammy Sommers came in third, and, shockingly, Gabe Overmyer came in fifth to score 10 more points for Oak Hill. Sammy then came back with a super run and got second in the 300 hurdles to put eight more points on the board

The pole vault was huge for Oak Hill, with Gavin Holz getting second and state diving champion Caiden Lake pulling off a seventhplace finish. That's 10 more points for Oak Hill. Then the long jump put Oak Hill in team contention when Sommers got first and Johnson pulled off a third-place finish. Do the math, Eagle fans: 16 big points for Oak Hill.

Travis Dowling had already scored three points for finishing sixth in the discus and now here he was in the final field event, pulling off a seventh-place finish for two huge points.

We did the math and figured out that state powerhouse Ft. Wayne Carroll had to finish first in the 4 X 400 relay to win the meet; anything else and Oak Hill would shock the world with a regional title.

Thanks to Ft. Wayne South Side holding off Carroll, it happened.

Oak Hill 66, Carroll 65. A regional title for the ages for Oak Hill. Since we went to class sports, the first regional title ever for a 1A or 2A school.

Six Eagles now get to go to the state meet, but the big story is the regional title stolen from the track powerhouse that is Ft. Wayne, Indiana.

he Oak Hill Golden Eagles boys track and field team made a little history on Thursday evening at the Marion Regional.

With three athletes recording top-three finishes in five events, the Golden Eagles won their first regional track and field championship since 1977, edging heavy favorite Carroll by one point, as well as defeating other high-profile programs such as Homestead, Fort Wayne Snider, and Fort Wayne South Side.

Sammy Sommers qualified for the state meet in three events. He placed third in the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 14.94, second in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 39.31, and first in the long jump with a distance of 23-10, a new Oak Hill school record.

After finishing as the state runner-up in the 400 last year, Tahj Johnson will be competing for a state championship once again this season. He finished first in the regional with a time of 48.93. Johnson also advanced in the long jump, placing third with a distance of 22-5.

Gavin Holz rounds out the group, placing second in the pole vault at 15-0.

All of the other four Grant County schools will have at least one representative in Bloomington next weekend. Eastbrook's Clay Dalton advanced after placing third in the shot put with a distance of 48-11<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>, while Marion's Zaimar Burnett will run in the 200 after finishing in second with a time of 22.30. Mississinewa's Brennan Butche advanced in the 1600 and 3200, placing third in the 1600 with a time of 4:20.20 and fourth in the 3200 with a time of 9:33.86.

At the Kokomo regional, Madison-Grant's AJ Jones also punched his ticket to Bloomington, finishing second in the shot put with a distance of 52-93/4.

Competing against some of the top-ranked programs and runners, two Grant County athletes proved their merit on Tuesday evening.

In the IWU regional, Mississinewa's Beth Lucas, who has dominated the 300-meter hurdles event all season long, made history, becoming just the second Lady Indian to advance to the IHSAA State Finals. Lucas placed third in the event with a time of 46.13.

In the Warsaw regional, Madison-Grant's Payton Freel also punched her ticket to the state meet, placing third in the shot put with a distance of 39-06.

The IHSAA State Finals will be held on Saturday, June 1 at the Robert C. Haugh Track & Field Complex in Bloomington, and is set to begin at 3 pm.
