Flag Day: overlooked holiday is this week

The Stars and Stripes originated as a result of a resolution adopted by the Marine Committee of the Second Continental Congress at Philadelphia on June 14, 1777. The resolution read: "Resolved, that the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

Nestled between Memorial Day and Independence Day, Flag Day

on June 14 is often overlooked as a holiday. Banks and government offices do not close, mail is still delivered. There are no special greeting cards and the only decorating expected is the patriotic display of the Stars and Stripes—our American flag.

Flag Day is our flag's birthday. The first celebration was held in 1877 on the 100th anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 (see above). The first annual recogni-

The News Herald has learned that the Juneteenth celebration, scheduled for June 19, has been cancelled.

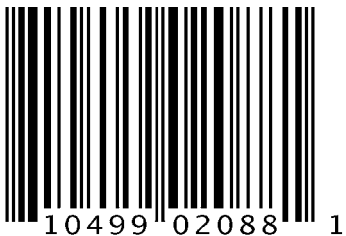
Organizers for the event were contacted, but phone calls were not readily returned.

Juneteenth commemorates the abolition of slavery, and is recognized as a national holiday in 45 states. Though President Abraham Lincoln ended the practice with the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, it did not become official until June 19, 1865, when Union Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, and announced that the war was over and that all former slaves were now free men and women.

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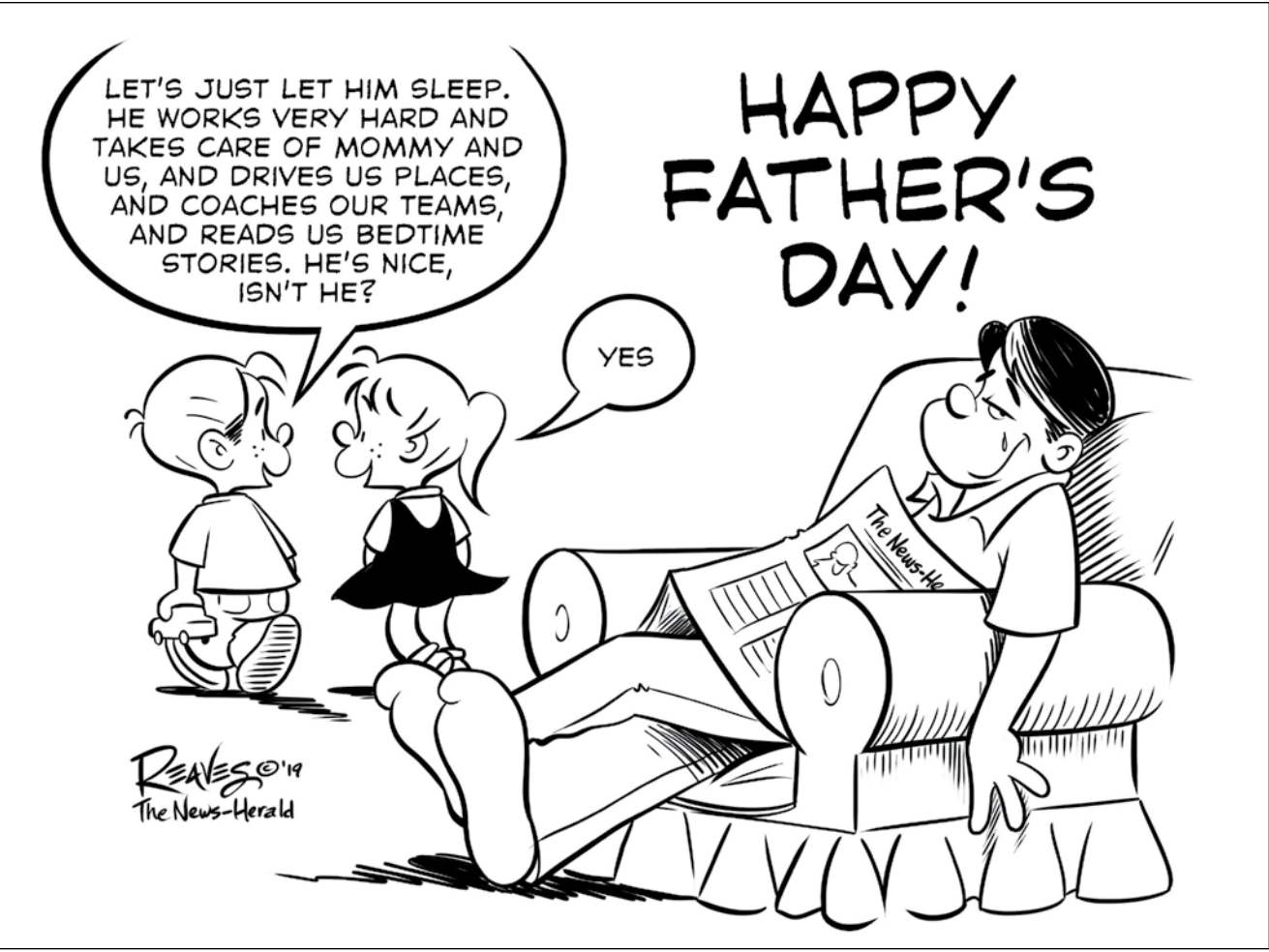

tion is attributed to Wisconsin teacher—and the "father of Flag Day"—BJ Cigrand in 1885, who advocated for years to have June 14 designated as Flag Day.

For more than 30 years Flag Day remained a state or local celebration. Then, in 1916, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the Flag Resolution of 1777 a nationally observed event. It wasn't until 1949 when an Act of Congress designated June 14 as National Flag Day. It is a day to preserve the traditions, history, pride and respect due to our national symbol, Old Glory.

Owning and displaying the Stars and Stripes on June 14, or any day, comes with

responsibility. If you need to brush up on your flag etiquette, look no further than the 30-foot by 50-foot American flag flying from the 130-foot flagpole near 10th street and the Bypass. Beneath that flag you will find the headquarters and retail shop for Collins Flags. Shelly Brown, general manager, has been with Collins for 17 years and blissfully shares stories about the many custom flags Collins Flags has designed, including one for Dixie the Praying Dog and another for a parachutist who unfurls his flag as he jumps from the plane.

Manufactured in the USA, their American flags can be seen on the big screen in movies like 2017's Last Flag Flying and TV shows like Lifetime's Army Wives. According to Brown, many

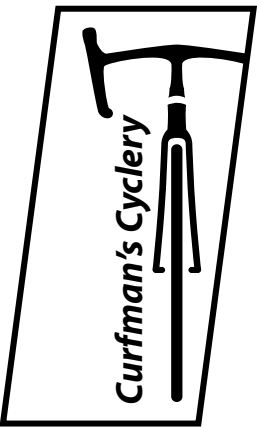
customers seek guidance on caring for and displaying their flag. "We hear lots of questions" states Brown, "and we are here to help." The company's website, collinsflags.com, includes links to U.S. flag etiquette and the Federal Flag Code. A "dos and don'ts" list can be found at military.com.

When your flag is worn, contact a local American Legion or VFW post. Most have a member or a committee that carry out flag retirements, often assisted by Boy Scouts from the area, to ensure the flags are retired per code and with dignity and reverence. As I was recently reminded by a veteran, our flag should be displayed in public, but retired in private.

Fly your American flag proudly on June 14.

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Are we open to ideas about the Supremes?

There is something vaguely unnerving about any suggestion of tampering with the construction of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Even when President Roosevelt tried to do it—court packing is what they called it back in the 1930s—and was doing it for the right reasons, it was disquieting, and it failed to happen. Even when Marion’s contribution to the court, Justice Willis Van Devanter, resigned from the court as the first of the “nine old men” to depart, it was a bit distasteful, considering the circumstances.

Now, I will grant you, not a lot of folks spend time fretting over the court, much less how many old men and women are up there, but the simple fact is: There is nothing more important in our public life than these human hunks of Gorilla Glue who hold it together, who bind the fragile pieces of the Constitution of the United States, because it is the only document that stands between us and tyranny, between we Americans and the apocalypse.

Every president, at one time or another, has been irritated or frustrated or scolded by the court. Remember the Pentagon Papers or Nixon’s tapes?

Tampering with the court is not unheard of, either. The Constitution itself says nothing about how many judges—“justices,” they are called—should interpret its meaning. They left that up to the Congress. In 1866, the Senate trimmed the court from 10 justices to seven as a swipe at President Andrew Johnson, then boosted it back to nine when Ulysses Grant replaced Johnson. Politics is politics.

So when so bright a young man as Mayor Pete—South Bend mayor and Presidential candidate Pete Buttigieg—casts a wary eye at the population of the court, I get curious. Just what is he thinking and why?

No more furious battles in modern political history have been fought than those over court nominations. Carswell. Haynesworth. Clarence Thomas. More recently Gorsuch, and, of course, Brett Kavanaugh. Given the tenor of the times, there is little reason to assume kinder, gentler treatment when the time comes to anoint a successor to Ruth Bader Ginsburg or Stephen Bryer.

So what is Buttigieg thinking about?

Well, apparently he has been thinking about his plan to overhaul the Supremes since his first days as a candidate. It calls for expanding the number of justices from nine to 15: Five affiliated with Democrats, five affiliated with Republicans, and five nonpolitical justices chosen by the first 10.

The 10, the Democrats and Republicans, would remain lifetime appointments. The last five would serve one-year terms. They’d be chosen two years in advance, to prevent nominations based on anticipated cases, and if the 10 partisan justices couldn’t agree on the final five, the Supreme Court would be deemed to lack a quorum and couldn’t hear any cases that term.

At first blush, a recipe for a spectacle, but Buttigieg has said reform would be his top priority, vowing to launch a commission on depoliticizing the Supreme Court on his first day as president.

He says the 15-justice plan is “the one that I find most intriguing.” Others, including court experts, are concerned about whether it is even Constitutional, much less whether it could backfire by reinforcing the already widespread belief that there are Republican and Democratic justices. Have you listened to Donald Trump lately?

Buttigieg doesn’t shy away from theory and that probably is a good thing; certainly refreshing.

He has said he would support “whatever Supreme Court reform will depoliticize this body” and stop the court from being viewed as “an almost nakedly political institution.”

“The reform of not just expanding the number of members but doing it in a way where some of them are selected on a consensus, nonpartisan basis; it’s a very promising way to do it,” Buttigieg said.

“There may be others. But the point is, we’ve got to get out of where we are now, where any time there is an opening, there is an apocalyptic, ideological firefight. It harms the court, it harms the country and it leads to outcomes like we have right now.”

Keep listening. The young Hoosier may be onto something here.

Blackmon Jr. got MVP votes in Italy, hopes for NBA

James Blackmon, Jr. is back in the United States, and, after a successful second professional season in Italy, the former Marion and IU standout is ready for his next opportunity as he continues to work towards his ultimate goal—playing in the NBA.

After playing with both the Delaware 87ers and the Wisconsin Herd of the NBA’s G-League in the 2017-2018 season, where he averaged 14.4 points and shot 40 percent from beyond the arc, the 6-4 shooting guard signed a one-year deal with Victoria Libertas Pesaro of the Lega Basket Serie A, the top basketball league in Italy.

Blackmon Jr. had offers on the table from multiple NBA teams, including the Milwaukee Bucks, but they were of the non-guaranteed variety. Looking for more security in the future, Blackmon took his game overseas, and was glad that he did so.

“I went...where I could get a chance to be me and show what I can do,” Blackmon said. “I felt like I ended up in a good spot in Italy. I played a great season, so I am looking forward to what’s next.”

Blackmon put up excellent numbers while with VL Pesaro, averaging 19.7 points per game while shooting 50 percent overall and 34.4 percent from beyond the arc in 33.7 minutes a night. His personal numbers aside, Blackmon felt that his game improved in all facets, and believes that it will serve him well in the future.

“The major difference to me was how important each possession was over there,” Blackmon said. “It was a very physical game. It taught me a lot offensively and defensively, because guys out there knew how to execute at all levels. I definitely improved my game and a little bit of my IQ coming back here.”

Blackmon’s strong play all season long garnered some Lega Serie Basket A MVP consideration. He finished in the top five, and, while he did not win the award, he was honored to be included in the conversation with some of the top players in the league, many of whom have been there a long time.

Now back in Indiana, Blackmon is weighing his options of where he will play in his third professional season.

“I’m in the middle of a lot of offers being thrown at me from overseas, and also, trying to decide about the NBA Summer League,” Blackmon said. “I’m just trying to figure out what the next move is and find the best fit for me.”

No matter where he ends up, he believes his time in Italy helped him become a more complete player. He was grateful for the opportunity, and encourages other young NBA hopefuls to consider playing overseas as they work to hone their craft.

“The top leagues over there get you better,” Blackmon said. “The competition is pretty high over there. I feel like [I am] the player I am today...[because] I took that chance. I’m just going to keep grinding it out and doing what I have to do.”
