County Fair opens, names royalty

With summer now in full swing, one of the biggest events of the season, the Grant County 4-H Fair, began in earnest on Sunday evening, kicking off another year of camaraderie, delectable food and treats, and fun for the whole family.

As in years past, the first day of the fair is Royalty Day. Boys and girls from around the county are rewarded for their talents, 10-year 4-H members are announced, and to top it all off, the new 4-H royalty is crowned.

The event began with the 4-H in Revue show, where children and young adults were recognized for their efforts in the areas of dairy and beef, rabbits, poultry, goats, sheep, swine, painting, computers, sculpture, and even LEGO building, to name a few.

After 21 young men and women were honored last year for their 10 years in 4-H, 24 received their 10-year medals on Sunday evening, including several Grant County athletes. Audrey Altum, Jenna Boucher, Colten Mowat, and Josh Pluimer of Eastbrook were honored, along with Khloe Price, Kinzey Price, Andrea Wilk, Marissa Wilk, and Lizzie Wood of Oak Hill.

As is tradition, the event concluded with the crowning of the new 4-H royalty. Emily Burke was named the 2019 Duchess; Kennedy Miller, last year's Duchess, together with Wyatt Pavey, were crowned the 2019 Princess and Prince; and Haley Scott, along with Pluimer, were named the 2019 Queen and King.

When it comes to the Grant County 4-H Fair, people from all over the area partake in the fes-

tivities for a number of reasons. Some come for the pizza, the fried dough, and the funnel cakes. Others come to see the animals—cows, sheep, goats, and poultry—on display.

For most, it's about supporting their families and celebrating the youth of Grant County.

"This is our third year coming to this, and we have been able to help support our daughter who has entered a lot of different activities," Carey Services Director Jim Almbaugh said. "We are here supporting her, but [also] supporting a lot of the other kids too. We've got lots of other kids from lots of other schools that are all out here. They work super hard—lots of huge talent in this county. They are really committed to their community... and are really engaged with what is going on."

Earl Clock, a Fairmount native, has been coming to the fair for

more than 40 years. All three of his daughters were Fair Queens at one point back in the 1980s, and his family has shown beef for many years.

"I just like checking on the projects," Clock said. "We raised beef, and of course we show beef, and now, I've got grandkids showing beef. That's why I continue to come back."

Mike and Kendra Cline, much like Clock, also continue to come to the fair to support their family.

"We still have a nephew who is in 4-H, and we have another one that's just now starting this year," Kendra said.

Whatever the reason, the 4-H Fair is a time for the residents of Grant County to come together and fellowship with one another.

"You get to see the animals. You get to see the energy of the kids and

Mahan and Brooks to leave posts

U.S. Representative Susan Brooks (Republican, District 5) and State Representative Kevin Mahan (R, Dist. 31) both announced this week that they will be leaving their political posts.

Brooks said that she will not seek re-election in 2020 after having served four terms as Congresswoman for Indiana's Fifth District.

Mahan is resigning his post at the end of July to take a position with Community Health Network. He and his wife will be moving out of the district.

Mahan was elected to the General Assembly in 2010, and served as chair of the House Committee on Government and Regulatory Reform, and as a member of the House Committee on Courts and Criminal Code, and the House Committee on Insurance.

"I simply was presented with a career opportunity that will allow me to enter the next chapter in life in an executive role with a great company in the Indianapolis area, Community Health Network," Mahan said. "Serving House District 31 in the General Assembly has been an honor, and I am thankful I was given the opportunity."

"I am ready to slow down and begin a new chapter," Brooks wrote in a long letter to her supporters, "I am also a strong believer in term limits...In Indiana, we are blessed with countless gifted, intelligent, and committed Republican leader...and it is time for the fresh ideas and new energy that one of them will bring to representing the 5th District."

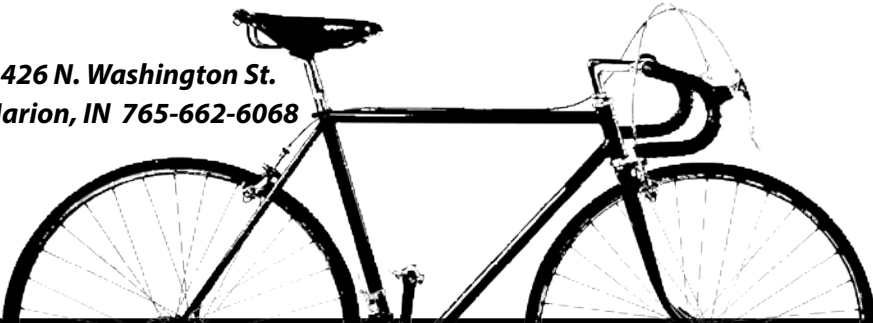

Marjorie Louise (Stone) Williams
1921-2019

There is joy in heaven today as Marjorie Louise (Stone) Williams (98) was welcomed home on Wednesday, June 12, 2019 from Colonial Oaks Health Care Center.

Marjorie was born May 31, 1921 in Madison, IN to Charles and Fayette (Broughman) Stone, the 7th of 13 children. She was raised on a farm that lay along 38th Street and Stone Road (named for her parents). Always a good student, she attended Roosevelt School and Marion High School graduating in 1938, the same year as two of her four brothers. As a student and a young woman, Marjorie took elocution lessons, preparing her well for a lifetime of presentations, readings, and programs for many groups and churches. She graduated from Indiana Business College and spent her career as an Executive Secretary, retiring in 1983 as Secretary to the Plant Manager at Anaconda

(Erickson).

Marjorie married the love of her life, Howard Mentzer Williams on June 29, 1946 and they were married 27 years until his death on March 31, 1974. They had one daughter, Carolyn Jean and one son, Roger Howard who died in infancy. Howard lost his sight when Marjorie was 42; so from that time on, she became the sole breadwinner of the family as well as support to her blind husband as he served on the Marion City Council and later the Marion School Board as well as several other agency boards. She spent many hours weekly reading material to him to enable this service.

After her retirement, Marjorie spent years volunteering for Visiting Nurses' Hospice Organization and then as Chaplain's Assistant at Marion General Hospital. She held leadership positions in Church Women United, Marion 1st Baptist Church, ABWA and Marion Grant County Senior Center. She served on the



Board of Directors of Grant-Blackford Mental Health Center. She sang in church choirs all her life, often with ladies trios, and in the Best Years Singers, adding her strong alto voice to lead the section.

Marjorie was also well-known for her excellent pie-making, providing her one-of-a-kind butterscotch pies to many fund-raising dinners and sharing her incomparable peanut butter fudge with friends and family. When friends describe Marge, they used words like 'sweet', 'servant', 'selfless', and 'devout Christian'.

Marjorie was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Howard; son, Roger; brothers, Jim and Richard; sisters, Elizabeth, Helen, Mary Ruth, Margaret Ann, Kathryn, Frances, Jean and Christina. She is survived by her daughter, Carolyn Jean Williams of Marion; special adopted daughter, Cathy Harner of Marion; and brothers, John (Mabel) Stone of Bowling Green, KY and Robert (Lura) Stone of Ligonier, IN; many nieces and nephews; and 2 grandcats, Mozart and Rachmaninoff.

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Goodbye to three in the arena

If you are of a political bent and live among us here in Marion and Grant County, the landscape of our lives shifted dramatically last week. Consider:

Kevin Mahan said he is leaving the Indiana General Assembly to take a job in Indianapolis.

Susan Brooks, our voice in the Congress of the United States, said she shall not seek another term there next year. David Penticuff, the lightning-rod and oft-beleaguered editor of the even-more-beleaguered Chronicle Tribune newspaper was relieved of his job.

Two admissions here: I often disagreed with the positions and votes of Mr. Mahan, and—at last I shall get to say it—our Ms. Brooks, but I have both affection and respect for both, and of Mr. Penticuff: Above all, in spite of his focus that sometimes bordered on obsession, he cared enormously about the role of journalism in righting the wrongs of life in our town.

All, of course, will be replaced, succeeded. That is the way of life. But, for me, all three will leave a void on the personal horizon.

Kevin Mahan, for eight years the representative from District 31 in the Indiana House of Representatives, was one of those people identified and encouraged early on by Mitch Daniels, plucked

from relative obscurity—a two-term sheriff of Blackford County and a former auctioneer—and nurtured by Daniels: First, a state-level job and then supported in his run for the legislature.

Our relationship began tenuously. Mahan was running against Joe Pearson, a Democrat and an old friend of mine. Mahan was rightfully wary of the radio guy. But he won, and we began to understand one another.

In his announcement of departure to go to work for Community Health Network in Indianapolis, he mentions some moments in his career. One is a day a couple of years ago when he was on what he called a “listening tour” of the district. He stopped at Jackie’s restaurant in Gas City and encountered a table of first responders and EMTs who urged him to pursue a change in a law that could save a lot of money. He did, and the law got changed.

I wrote about that incident as a fine example of how real people can change real life in the world of political theater. I suspect that story will take on larger proportions for both of us if we live long enough.

Susan Brooks emerged from a roomful of candidates, including Wayne Seybold, nine years ago when Dan Burton finally departed from Congress.

She has taken her work and her elections seriously. When

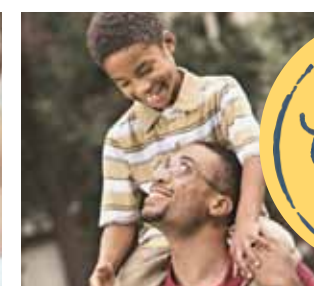


she went to Washington she was one of but two women in the Republican ranks in the Congress of the United States. While there are now 102 women in the House of Representatives, she is one of only 13 on the Republican side of the aisle. The Washington Post newspaper, in covering the announcement of departure next year, cited her as a singular force in recruiting women to the political arena.

Among other accomplishments, she is the only female member of the Congress from Indiana ever to chair a

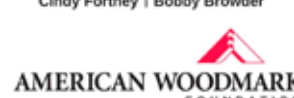

A last point: Congresswoman Brooks, in a moment of bad judgment, was once lured into recording a promotional spot for WBAT radio in which she recklessly described me as her favorite Democrat. I treasure that moment. I doubt that she does.

Then there is the news, circulated through the community but never confirmed or denied by the management of the Chronicle-Tribune, that David Penticuff is out as editor of the newspaper after a contentious decade in the job. I can tell you I once had

that job and it is difficult enough to challenge power and authority when you have both the resources and support of the folks who own the newspaper. David Penticuff had neither the resources in a shrunken newsroom nor the support of publishers who failed to understand the watchdog role that is the responsibility of the local newspaper.
