IWU will reshuffle programs, shut down radio, TV stations

Tucker will also act as leasing agent for the seven-story tower, according to a press release. The building will have both commercial space and residential apartments.

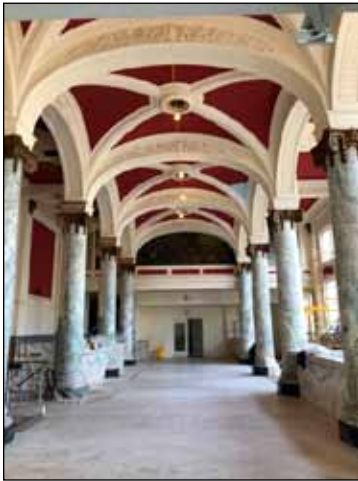

Abbey Carpet closes doors after 40 years

As proclamations go, the one that Marion Mayor Jess Alumbaugh presented to Mike and Becci Frantz on August 29 may have set a record for use of the word "whereas."

"Whereas" is a conjunction used by proclamation authors to detail the list of contributions that people have made to their communities. For the husband-and-wife owners of Abbey Carpet in Marion, that list is long, indeed.

For example, one "whereas" in the mayor's proclamation lists more than 20 local charities that the Frantzes have supported consistently over the years.

"I often wondered how many times local businesspeople got hit up for donations," Alumbaugh said. "Obviously, Mike and Becci had a hard time saying no."

Mike Frantz began working at Carpet Discount Store of Marion

45 years ago, and he and Becci bought the store five years later. In 1993, the couple bought an Abbey Carpet franchise--the first in Indiana--and changed the name of the store.

The original store was located just across the parking lot from the current location, near 14th Street and Western Avenue.

"Although we were primarily a local carpet store, the first one in Marion, at various times we installed floor coverings as far away as Maryland and New York," he said. "At one time, we did a lot of Verizon stores around the country."

The last day of business for the store was August 29, which also was the Frantzes' 49th wedding anniversary. Store employees celebrated both events with a surprise open house, which more resembled a family reunion after former and current employees said they always felt more like family members than employees.

Some employees had worked at Abbey Carpet for more than 30 years.

"Although Abbey Carpet is officially closed, we have jobs scheduled through the end of October, and we have to honor those commitments," Frantz said. "We will probably leave the front door unlocked for people who may want to stop in to buy what inven-

tory we still have."

Somewhat ironically, Mike Frantz said one of the biggest changes over the past four decades in what primarily was a carpet business was a declining interest in carpet.

"At one time this entire store from end to end would have been filled with nothing but carpet stacked two or three rolls high," he said. "Now more people want luxury tiles and woods."

So far as trying to find a buyer for the store, Frantz said that has become increasingly difficult for small, family-owned businesses. "It's awful to say, but it's hard to find anyone who wants to work anymore," he said. "And the people who do apply often can't pass a drug test. It's really scary."

The smartest idea Mike and Becci Frantz ever came up with? Writing their own commercials, many of which featured their five granddaughters.

"One of the first things customers asked was if they could meet our granddaughters. We always felt a little silly explaining that the girls didn't live at the store; that they went to school just like other children," he said.

"I wrote all of our radio, TV and newspaper ads for at least 30 years because I never liked what anyone else wrote. When people thought about carpet, I wanted them to think first about Abbey Carpet. I guessed it worked for us."

Marion grad to give fundraising concert

Will commemorate '69 football team at Walton Center

The late F. Ritchie Walton would no doubt be proud of what is happening Saturday at the Marion High School performing arts center that is named in his honor. Reid LeFavour, a 1970 Marion graduate and a former student of Walton's, is presenting a concert at the arts center to honor the Marion football team and marching band, which had banner seasons 50 years ago.

The football team finished the season undefeated, and the band brought home the Indiana State Fair championship during LeFavour's senior year. Proceeds from the concert will go to the current Marion marching band and football team for equipment needs.

The concert begins at 7 pm Saturday. Tickets are \$10 and may be purchased at the door or in advance at Tree of Life Bookstore.

Walton, who died in 2000, literally launched LeFavour's singing career.

"When I was in the sixth grade at Emerson School, Marion High was preparing to present 'The Music

Man,' and Ritchie Walton was scouting the elementary schools for someone to play the role of Winthrop," LeFavour said. "He came to Emerson to audition me, and fortunately I got the part. It was so exciting to sing with an orchestra and chorus, which began my love of music."

LeFavour continued to be involved in music at McCulloch Junior High School and Marion High School, with the exception of his senior year when he focused on athletics as a member of the track and football teams.

"I couldn't do both music and sports because the schedules often conflicted, so I chose sports," LeFavour said. His interest in both continued when he enrolled at Ball State University.

"I graduated from Ball State in 1975 with a major in physical education and a minor in music," he said. "I decided while doing my student teaching that I did not want to be a physical education teacher the rest of my life, so my focus shifted to music."

Over the next four de-

cades, LeFavour primarily taught music at schools in northern Indiana. He took a couple breaks from teaching to perform professionally and to direct church music programs, including five years at Sunnycrest Baptist Church in Marion.

"In 2012, my world was rocked when my wife, Diane, was diagnosed with lung cancer and died seven months later," LeFavour said. "I was lost, but knew I had to keep moving."

Two years ago, LeFavour's journey led him to Southern California to be closer to two of his children. He found comfort and encouragement in a singles group at Saddleback Church in Orange County and joined the church choir.

He credits Rick Warren, senior pastor of the church, for saving him from bouts with depression. Warren is the author of "The Purpose Driven Life," which was published in 2002 and has sold 32 million copies.

LeFavour also met a voice coach at the church who encouraged him to resume his career as a professional sing-

er. He auditioned for and became a member of the West Coast Professional Talent Showcase, which led him to several bookings in California and Las Vegas.

"So that is how the ball started rolling for my current singing career," he said. "In addition to being active in the music ministry at Saddleback Church, I sing at country clubs, private parties, Italian restaurants and senior communities." His genre is tunes from artists such as Frank Sinatra, Michael Buble, Tony Bennett and Johnny Mathis."

He still will be Reid LeFavour when he steps on the stage at the Walton Performing Arts Center, but he now performs on the West Coast under the stage name of Tony Calabrese.

"My voice coach convinced me that an Italian-sounding stage name was more marketable than Reid LeFavour, at least in California," he said. "My mother wept when I told her about the name I chose. Calabrese is the Italian spelling of her maiden name, which was Calobrace."

More on this small world business in a minute, but first to the breaking news story of day during the visit to the land of the dreaded New England Patriots. Have you heard that Andrew Luck has retired, will

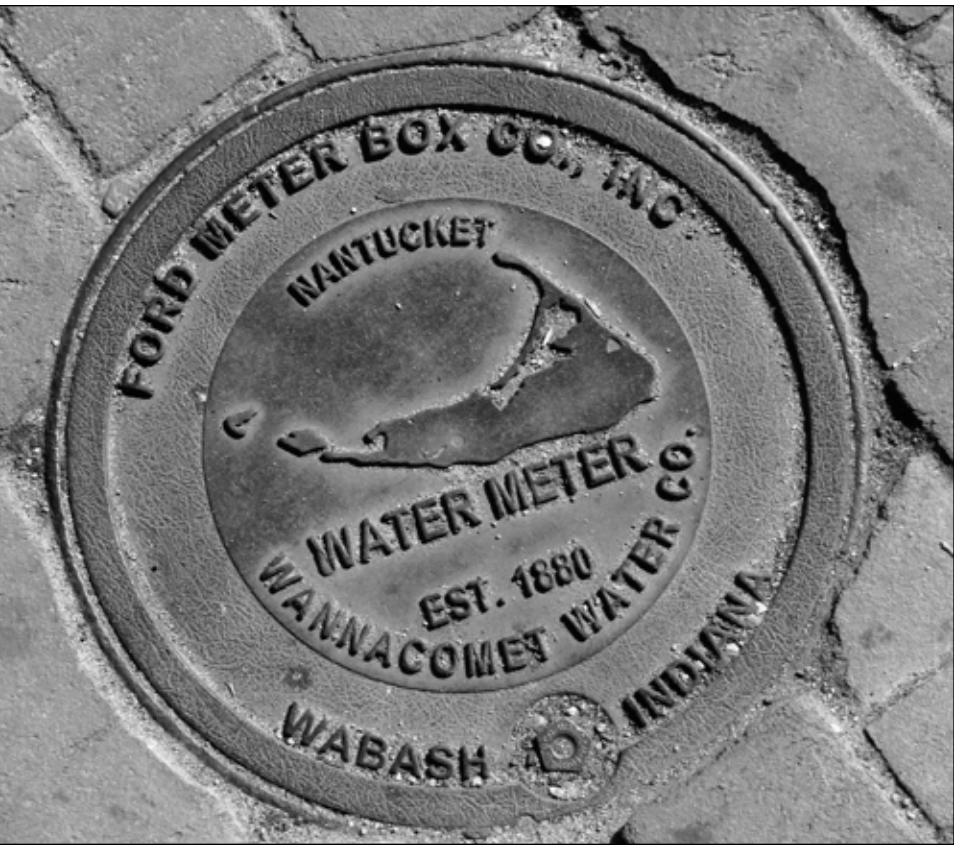

Logan Airport in Boston, the car rental place, the gift shop on Cape Cod, the motel in Maine, the seafood restaurant on York Beach. Anyplace where I had to tell 'em who I was and where I was from--the credit card, you know--

and that's what I heard. Uncaring, unadulterated glee, followed by some reference to Tom Brady and how, by god, he's tough and going to play until he's 97, or some such nonsense. Twenty-two Super Bowls.

I swear the Luck thing was a bigger story in Boston than in Indy. Well, maybe not.

Well, of course I asked. Can't be around Indiana newspapers for 50 years and not know every ink-stained wretch who passed through here.

"His name is Joe Gelarden," the clerk said.

You're kidding. No, you aren't. Of course I know him. Used to be a hotshot at the Indianapolis Star. Certainly drank a beer with him at some sort of newspaper thing back then. She had his phone number, and I gave her mine. Haven't made the call yet, but I will. Maybe next time I'm in Boothbay...

In Portland, ME, the guy who is giving the tour at poet William Wadsworth Longfellow's 18th-century house is a college history prof. in his day job and he has made several trips to the Midwest.

We compare notes. He was fascinated by hundreds of miles of cornfields. I'm fascinated by hundreds of miles of ocean. Walk into the water a block east of here and you swim all the way to Portugal.

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have been faithful, committed faculty members, and we are committed to supporting them as they pursue their next position."

In addition to the faculty positions, the university will be shutting down the Fortress radio station and the WIWU television station at the end of the semester. The university will instead "focus on the growing audience accessing IWU media through online streaming," according to the press release. The school says it will continue to stream university sporting events and community-based programming online, and in cooperation with ESPN.

"We want to leverage the skills of our brilliant production staff to help meet the need of student learning and content delivery in emerging and innovative ways," said David Wright, IWU president, in the press

release.

Randall King, director of WIWU-TV and one of the professors whose positions will be eliminated, released a statement of his own to the local media. "The TV station is a professional learning laboratory for our communication students yet also serves the entire university and Grant County community through local programming," King wrote, "In the financial analysis of the past year, IWU's leaders apparently decided the costs associated with the TV and radio stations are not sustainable in this current economic environment. I want our viewers and the public to know I disagree with this decision."

The university plans to expand graduate degree programs in social work and marriage and family therapy. For undergraduate students, IWU will be

launching a new degree program in multi-media storytelling, with an emphasis in film, broadcast media, and journalism. The school says new undergraduate programs also are coming in engineering and cybersecurity.

Additionally, some existing programs will be modified and/or eliminated due to changing enrollment trends, according to the school. Programs being eliminated include: physical health education, church music, and adolescent ministries. For students currently enrolled in these majors, the university says it will provide a pathway for completion.

"We are working hard to be proactive in addressing the changing needs of our students," the press release quotes Wright, "I fully support these creative and wise changes that better equip us for the future."

Giants trounced by Lawrence N., Tribe only co. team to win

Playing on the road against the 6A No. 10-ranked Lawrence North Wildcats, the 4A No. 1-ranked Marion Giants certainly had their chances. Four times in the first half, and twice after halftime, the Giants drove the ball inside the Wildcats' 35-yard line--and they scored just once. Four turnovers, together with several crucial mistakes throughout the contest, proved costly, as the Giants lost their first regular season game since October 13, 2017, a 35-8 loss to the Wildcats on Friday night. Marion fumbled the ball

away three times. Two of those came in the red zone, and one of them was returned for a touchdown. The other turnover came off a JK Thomas interception. The night started off well for the Giants, who forced a turnover of their own on Lawrence North's first possession, but they were unable to capitalize, as an 11-play, 49-yard drive ended with a turnover on downs. The Wildcats came into the game with a pair of 6-7 tackles in Ethan Water and Christian Anderson; an interior group of linemen in Drayton Travis, Markus

Finley, and Robert Brooks who each weighed over 240 pounds; a stable of talented running backs in Keyshawn Smith, Bishr Jones, and Ali Richardson; and quarterback Donaven McCulley, who many think is one of the top signal callers in the Indianapolis area. On their second drive, the Wildcats made their presence known. After rushing for 64 yards on the first drive (before fumbling the ball away), Jones started Lawrence North's next possession with a 13-yard carry. Smith rushed four times for 21

yards, while Richardson tallied 20 yards on two carries, and the Wildcats' offensive line established control in the trenches. McCulley capped off the drive with a one-yard plunge, giving the Wildcats a 7-0 lead. Lawrence North forced a Marion three-and-out, and quickly went back to work on their next offensive series. After allowing a first down, the Giants' defense stiffened, holding the Wildcats on a third-and-8. On the ensuing punt, however, the Giants were flagged for running into the kicker, which

led to the drive alive. Marion forced the Wildcats into another fourth down situation four plays later, but a 16-yard completion from McCulley to wide receiver Rowland Smith once again extended the possession. A sack by Marques Smith and a delay of game penalty had the Wildcats in a second-and-22 situation, and, one more time, the Wildcats were able to escape the jam. A 20-yard completion from McCulley to Armahn Hillman made it a manageable third-and-2, and, one play later, Omar Cooper scored on a 24-yard touchdown reception to give the Wildcats a 14-0 lead.

The Giants responded with an efficient possession of their own, marching all the way down to the Lawrence North 14-yard line, but an ill-advised toss resulted in another fumble, which Trezmon Hall returned 70 yards for a Wildcats' touchdown. "We definitely started off slow, and [that play] was a backbreaker," Marion Head Coach Craig Chambers said. "You have to protect the ball. You have to take care of the ball." The Giants fumbled the

Grant County boys soccer Oak Hill edges Eastbrook, Giants over Indians

Throughout the offseason and the early part of the 2019 campaign, Oak Hill second year head coach Joel Garverick has emphasized the importance of consistency--executing and performing at a high level over the entirety of an 80-minute soccer match. Last Tuesday night against county rival Eastbrook, the Golden Eagles put together their best match of the young season, as Gavin Holz's lone goal and a solid defensive effort gave them a 1-0 victory over the Panthers.

"Eastbrook is always a solid team--a team we love to play because they are fundamentally sound and they play good soccer," Garverick said. "Been a few years since we beat them, so it's a good feeling to come out and get a win." Oak Hill established control early, creating several scoring opportunities and pressuring Eastbrook's defensive back line. In the 16th minute of the contest, the pressure paid off, as Holz was able to get around the Eastbrook defense and put one past Panthers' goalkeeper Sam Spiegel. "Gavin has done a really good job for us for a few years now," Garverick said. "His speed is something that is going to test any back line." The Panthers came on strong at the end of the first half, making better passes and recording several scoring chances of their own, but the Golden Eagles defense, along with goalkeeper Sam Boyer,

stood tall, not allowing Eastbrook to find the equalizer. One of Eastbrook's best chances to tie the game came in the first 10 minutes of the second half, but once again, Boyer was up to the task, making a great save on Eastbrook's Bryan Popoca and allowing Oak Hill to keep the lead. Much like they did in the first half, the Panthers found their offensive rhythm as the second half progressed, particularly in the final 15 minutes, but the Oak Hill defense did not break, preserving the one-goal victory.

In other action: **Panthers, Eastern in scoreless draw** Coming off their hard-fought loss to Oak Hill, the Eastbrook Panthers' offense was once again unable to find the back of the net in Thursday's matchup with Eastern. However, their defense did an excellent job shutting down Lance VanMetre and the Comets' offense, as the game finished in a 0-0 tie. "The thing I really liked coming out of that game--I like to score goals, but I'm glad they didn't score any," Eastbrook Head Coach Adam Hallis said. "Our defense played well. We were able to keep a clean sheet, and that's a big thing."

Eastbrook blanks Woodlan The Panthers played effective soccer on both ends of the pitch in a 3-0 shutout triumph over Woodlan. Bryan Popoca finished the

contest with a goal and two assists, while Collin Burman scored twice. Jacob McKim, Andrew Diller, and Ramzzy Bowser also recorded assists in Eastbrook's triumph. "We've been organized, and I think that was a big thing," Hallis said. "We played hard. We want to win those 50-50 balls, and stayed compact to get guys around the ball."

Giants beat Muncie Central Coming off shutout victories over Columbia City and Mississinewa, the Marion Giants won their fourth straight contest on Saturday afternoon, riding a strong second-half effort to a 5-1 triumph. After missing on a few scoring chances early in


