


Census asks locals for assistance

The U.S. Census Bureau calls them “Trusted Voices.” You know them better as your friends and neighbors and community leaders, people you respect and trust.

Many of the names are famil-iar: Linda Magers, director of the Fairmount Public Library; Joselyn Whitticker, a retired school ad-ministrator and long-time NAACP leader; Bud and Carol Bence, re-tired Indiana Wesleyan University professors; Dennis Banks, retired Gas City banker and now Mill Township Trustee; Mike Cline, a retired journalist and current Marion City Council member; Kayla Johnson, coordinator of the

Justice delayed: a three-part series

The dilemma of pre-trial incarceration

Part two of three

Three out of five people in local jails across the United States have not been convicted of the crime for which they are incarcerated. This series looks at the Grant County jail system in an attempt to shed light on the circumstances affecting pretrial detention. In last week’s segment, we reported that 88 percent of Grant County jail inmates as of October 2019 were awaiting trial. With the jail at capacity, the series explored the burden that overcrowd-ing places on taxpayers and jail personnel.

National trends indicate that pretrial detention increases the likelihood of repeat offenders and negatively affects an offend-er’s sentence.

While the public may presume

that those awaiting trial are inno-cent—and they are, legally—many have actually committed the crime.

“There is a game that inmates play,” Sheriff Reggie Nevels said, “They get a court-appointed attorney but they don’t like that attorney—because they don’t like what that attorney has offered them. So they fire that attorney. Then the court will appoint them another attorney, because that is their right. That will start the whole process over again, either going to a jury trial or accepting the plea, [and] they will keep playing the game until they de-cide they get the right plea.”

Pretrial detention has many causes, and many times they are not always straight-forward.

Before being sentenced and transferred to the Indiana Depart-ment of Corrections in Novem-ber 2019, Kyle Lamar Johnson was held at the Grant County Jail for charges placed against him in 2017. Lamar had filed several motions for a continuance before his sentence, which most likely contributed to the delay in his trial.

Jerad Marks, Grant County deputy prosecutor, said that the premise that pretrial detention undermines the chances of a fair trial is not true, in his experience. “It is not the policy of the Grant County Prosecutor’s Office to request continued detention as a punishment prior to a trial,”

Ballots set for primary on May 5

Five Re-publicans who currently hold elective office in Grant County will face chal-lenges from members of their own party in the May 5 primary elec-tion. By way of contrast, Demo-crats will have only one name on the ballot for 10 county offices.

Filing ended Friday for can-didates seek-ing their party’s nominations for superior court 1 judge, supe-rior court 3 judge, county recorder, county treasurer, county surveyor, two county commissioners and three at-large members of the county council.

Robert a “Bobbie” Solms is challeng-ing incumbent county recorder Kathy Foy, and Richard A. Jar-vis III is challenging incumbent treasurer Tiffany N. Griffith. Both Foy and Griffith were appointed to their current jobs and are seeking election to their first four-year term.

Chuck Pol-ing and Chris Tarlton are chal-lenging incum-

# If you have right thinking, you don't have to be right

*Philippians 4:1-7*

Getting a good start to the New Year is always important to me. Knowing that there is a target to hit, a goal that has been set, helps me press on. This year's focus is right thinking. In two previous articles we have elaborated on Paul's mental pattern in Philippians 2:5-8, that gave us an idea of where we are, and how Jesus thought. The three things we left you with last week were humility, love, and self-sacrifice. Today we will delve into chapter four of Paul's teaching.

As this study unfolds, there are two notable thoughts. One, the book of Philippians deals with Christian experience. Two, we are working our way to verse 13, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengthens me." This is a powerful verse that brings great hope and confidence to the reader, but how does the believer get to that point?

As Paul begins chapter four, he addresses the "brethren," "dearly beloved," which signifies holy union and a great bond with them. Paul was really impressed with these folks and he wanted them to know it. Now, let's not forget, when Paul was writing this letter he was in a dungeon in Rome. He could have been feeling sorry for himself, but he was reflecting on better days, which was "right thinking." He was writing to thank his fellow believers for the financial support they had sent him. Paul's joy was only found in the Lord Jesus Christ and the Philippians bore witness to that joy. Their spiritual condition was Paul's joy in a time of sorrow. However, he never gave in to circumstances.

Paul then addresses a problem in this great church, which was a heavy burden to him. There are two women, Eudia and Syntyche, who had a falling out. These two women had been a big part of Paul's missionary success while he was in Philippi. They were down in the trenches with Paul, working to see soul's saved. These two women were not trouble-makers, nor were they a burden to the fellowship. They were well-grounded, prominent women in and out of the church. Paul had a close relationship with them and a solid bond. Relationships are important in ministry, and we all need them.

The Scripture isn't specific, but the problem with these two women was either they had been influenced by false teachers, or they were in danger of it. That time in history is no different than the day we live in. There have always been false teachers, and nothing will ever change. Paul warned the people in II Timothy 3:1-7 about those who creep in and lead people astray. Paul addressed these women who needed reproof because they were still a great asset to the work of the Lord. Every individual is worth the effort to salvage. They needed help, and he wanted to be sure they received it.

The help those women needed had to come from the entire church body. The believers at Philippi had to try and re-direct Eudia and Syntyche to what was

important. It is easy in any organization to lose sight of what is important. This had to be done in love (I Corinthians 13). This love had to be a gentle, compassionate love that would draw them back. There also had to be a

steadfastness about this task. They had to be fixed on the mission of restoration. It made no difference who was right and who was wrong. They had to focus on the fix. They had to exhibit great unity, also. Those ladies didn't need people choosing sides. They were one in Christ.

It seems as though the study is not moving fast, but next week our thoughts will continue on the formula for right thinking. That is my prayer for each and every one of us.

Marks said, "but it is sometimes necessary to request detention to ensure that a fair trial will take place and the alleged victim will not be harmed/harassed prior to the trial."

Pretrial detention is a common practice used to ensure public safety and to get individuals to show up to their trials. Individuals who are charged with a

crime are detained if they cannot post bail, if they pose a flight risk, or if they are considered a danger to society.

"If the judge has decided to require bail, then it is more than likely that the defendant has a history of failing to appear, that the charges are so heinous that release would endanger the community, and/or a history of reoffending while on pretrial release, bond, probation, and/or parole,"

Marks said.

In Indiana, a defendant has the right to request a fast and speedy trial. The Indiana Rules of Criminal Procedure's rule four states that a defendant must be brought to trial or discharged within 70 days, unless the defendant files motion of continuance or there was not sufficient time to hold the trial, or if the court calendar is full.

"Indiana, and, more broadly, the United States,

has a criminal justice system that constantly evolves to be as fair to the defendant as possible, even if pretrial detention is deemed necessary," Marks said.

While pretrial detention is not an act of injustice itself, it has statistically increased the likelihood of repeat offenders. According to the Vera Institute of Justice, people detained for more extended periods are more likely to be convicted and receive harsher sentences than people who pay the required bail and are released, or who are never required to pay bail in the first place.

David Glickfield, a Grant County public defender, has served as a defense attorney

for 30 years. Glickfield said that he has seen pretrial detention negatively affect the outcome of cases as long as he has been practicing. "The national trends are correct. It's not an indictment on anyone in particular. Still, prosecutors want to keep them in jail because they know that they will plea and eventually get out," Glickfield said. "It's wrong."

Although Glickfield has seen pretrial detention negatively affect the outcome of cases throughout his career, he said the system is still fair. "All of our judges are, they all have bought into the same policy, they are all very uniform, and how they address things, they are very fair," Glick-

field said. "They ensure that a person's constitutional rights are protected. It's all geared towards ensuring people are treated fairly but also protecting public safety."

Marion Neighborhood Associations.

About 30 of those Trusted Voices, representing a cross-section of the Grant County community, gathered at the Marion Public Library Monday to learn ways they can help assure that the county gets an accurate count in the 2020 census.

It is no secret that segments of our population distrust and are suspicious about the federal government gathering information about their lives, Jacqueline Beverly, a Census Bureau Partnership Specialist, told the group.

"That's why it's important that we find these Trusted Voices in local communities to help us spread the word that the census is very important, and that strict federal laws protect census responses," she said.

The Marion Public Library stepped forward last fall to play a leadership role in assembling what the Census Bureau calls a complete count committee for each county.

"Libraries are becoming more active in our communities because we are seen as neutral conveners. We

just want to bring people together," said Mary Eckerle, director of the library. "After Kylie Jackson, Alicia Hazelwood and I met last fall with Jackie Beverly, I stepped forward and said, 'What can the library do to help?' I talked to the library board, and they agreed we should be involved."

Eckerle agreed to serve as director of the complete count committee. Working with her are Jackson, who is president and CEO of the Marion-Grant County Chamber of Commerce; Alicia Hazelwood, who is executive director of United Way of Grant County, and Elizabeth Adams, who is marketing manager of the Gas City Area Chamber of Commerce.

"We are begging for additional members for the complete count committee," Eckerle said.

Every 10 years, the federal government conducts a population count of everyone in the United States. Data from the census provide the basis for distributing more than \$675 billion in federal funds annually to communities across the country to support vital programs-impacting housing, education, transportation, employment, health

care and public policy.

The numbers also are used to redraw the boundaries of congressional and state legislative districts and accurately determine the number of congressional seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Beverly said studies indicate that only about 72 percent of Indiana's population was counted in the 2010 census. The state also lost two seats in Congress.

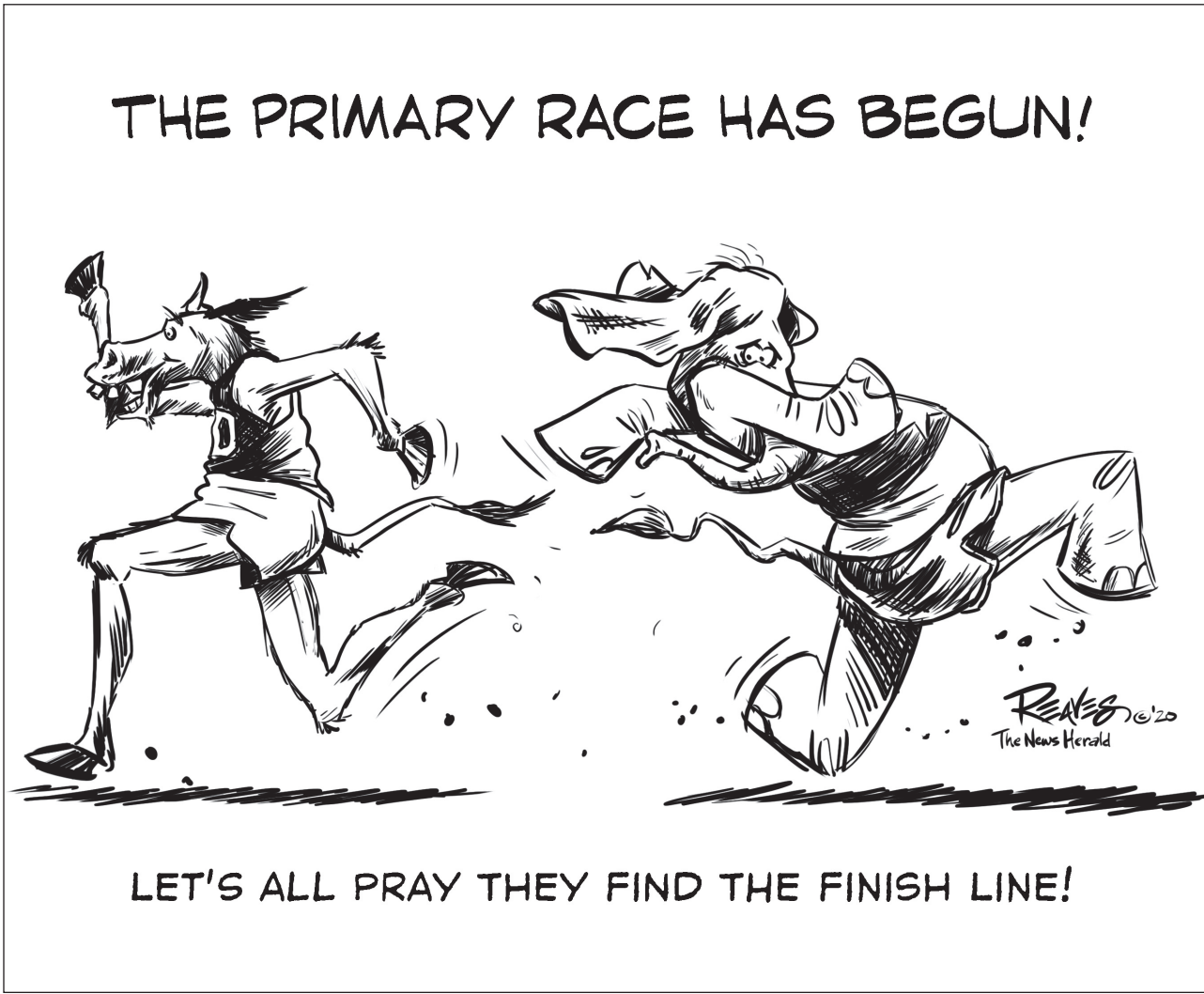
"States leave a lot of money on the table when everyone is not counted in the census," she said. "This year, Indiana could lose \$1,671 for every person not counted correctly."

April 1 is officially Census Day, when the count begins, but people will receive mailed notices in mid-March that they can begin responding online to the 2020 census. This is the first census that households will have the option of responding online or by phone.

People will continue to receive mailed notices through the end of April. If they do not respond, census takers will begin following up in person. People who would like to work as census takers can apply online at 2020census.gov/jobs.

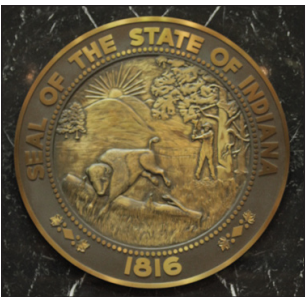
# Vermilion has proposed a bill to combat distracted driving

With nearly nine Americans killed and more than 1,000 injured each day as a result of distracted driving, steps must be taken to combat this problem. State law currently prohibits texting when driving. However, Hoosiers use their hand-held devices in various ways, making this law hard to enforce. This session, Indiana House lawmakers are working to combat distracted driving to save lives and prevent injuries.

Distracted driving is driving while doing another activity that takes attention away from the road. It significantly increases the chance of a motor vehicle crash.

When people hear the term “distracted driving,” many may first think of texting. However, dialing a phone to make a call can cause a driver to be six times more likely to crash. Drivers around the state continue to be distracted by their devices, whether making phone calls, taking pictures, scrolling through social media or playing games.

Legislation I supported would strengthen current state law by making it illegal for drivers in Indiana

to hold cell phones or other electronic communication devices when behind the wheel. Motorists could still use their devices to make calls in hands-free mode or in place of a GPS on the dash of their vehicle as long as the device is not in the driver’s hand. If passed, organizations around the state have committed to creating public awareness campaigns about hands-free driving and staying alert on the road.

# A trip to see a widowed parent

It seems there is always one sibling in every family who stays local to care for their aging parents. Neither my husband nor I have that responsibility. In fact, both of us are hundreds of miles away from our aging mothers, and the older our mothers get, the harder it is to be so far away.

So a recent trip to Minnesota to spend a few days with Larry’s mom Lydia just seemed important.

Some might wonder: why go to Minnesota in the winter, but since Larry is a golf course superintendent, traveling in the summer is not an option. So, to the winter wonderland we headed. It had been a couple years since we had been there.

Since Lydia has lived alone after the death of her husband in 2012, Larry encouraged his mom to put together a “honey-do” list for him. After receiving the list, Larry packed the appropriate tools, along with an air compressor, and, of course, our suitcases.

Lydia also let me now that she had been doing some cleaning and had about 20 quilts and blankets she wanted to donate to the Flannery-Keal Home, along with about 35 handmade hygiene bags she had sewn for the clients staying at the domestic violence home.

Lydia has fared well living on her own. Unlike my dad’s sudden death, Larry’s dad’s health declined over the course of a few years. He had been diagnosed with the same small cell cancer as my dad, and it took Larry’s dad’s life three months later, on Reformation Sunday.

Like my quick trip to Nebraska to try and see my dad one last time before he died, I still remember when I got the call from Larry that his sister had called him and he needed to get to Minnesota as quickly as possible. It just so happened I was in a meeting in Indianapolis that day and Larry was picking up our daughters, along with some friends, for a Friday night sleepover.

As soon as I was able to

get back to Marion, Larry took off for Waconia, MN, arriving in time to be the last person to have a lucid conversation with his dad.

But I digress.

When we first arrived in Waconia on Wednesday evening, Lydia was excited to see us. She had shared with everyone that her son was coming to visit. She said she proudly shared with her pastor that her son was even staying for church on Super Bowl Sunday before heading back on the 10-hour trek. It is the small things in life that mean so much—like a son leaving a little later and missing the first half of the Super Bowl to go to church with his mom so she can show him off to all her church friends.

It was certainly different going to visit Larry’s mom than it had been on our recent visit to Nebraska to see my mom.

Naturally, since my mother-in-law has been widowed for seven years now, her loss is not so close to the surface. There are still signs that she misses her husband—like the clothes that are still in his dresser drawers and closets. She had several ties hanging on the door to our bedroom when we got there, just in case Larry wanted any of them. There were the books in the basement and in the hallway that Lydia once again asked if either of us wanted. She also commented that possibly Larry would want to take

some of the books back to our church for our pastor (Larry’s dad was a Missouri Synod Lutheran pastor for more than 37 years).

At 85, Lydia still volunteers twice a month at a local thrift store about 30 minutes from her house. She received a 60 percent-off coupon as a Christmas thank you, so she took me to the store where I found all kinds of treasures for myself and our three daughters.

She also bought a few things for herself and a wooden toy that needs to be assembled for her great-grandson, who is 2 years old. As she tucked the toy away in the basement, she commented to me that she hopes she is still around to see her great-grandson put the toy together, since the box indicates you must be 5 to use the toy. She asked me to remember that the toy was for him, in case she is not able to remember.

Lydia still gardens and keeps herself very busy with her church. She gave up the flower gardening there two years ago, but still assists with funeral dinners, various Bible studies, and, of course, card playing and games whenever the opportunity arises.

I see signs of her slowing down, though.

She walks hunched over after wrenching her back a few years ago as she tried to haul the Christmas tree up from the basement by herself. She also commented about arthritis taking its toll: her one hip is bone on bone, although the doctor says he doesn’t want to do surgery on her hip until it affects her leg. Her stamina is also lower; she wore out quickly the second day we were there.

It was wonderful to see Lydia and Larry’s siblings. It also makes me sad. Even in this day and age of technology, nothing compares to those in-person visits and conversations.

# Maybe it’s time to put aside party labels for local elections

Marion Mayor Jess Alumbaugh would be an ideal poster child for nonpartisan municipal elections. Alumbaugh, who resigned as a Republican precinct committeeman in 2015 to run for mayor as a Democrat, is a Republicrat.

Alumbaugh was elected mayor with 61 percent of the vote in 2015 and 62 percent of the vote in 2019. His lopsided wins had virtually zero impact on his Democrat running mates, who were seeking nine city council seats.

Three Democrats were elected to the city council in 2015 and two Democrats were elected in 2019, both from wards that have elected Democrat council members for at least the past quarter century.

It’s not that Alumbaugh had short coattails; he had no coattails at all. Alumbaugh and the Democratic council candidates went their separate ways, not even pretending to run as a team in either 2015 or 2019.

It took some behind-the-scenes coercion by a Democrat party peacemaker last November to even get Alumbaugh and the other Democrat candidates to spend election night together as they awaited returns.

Even though we’ve never heard Alumbaugh

specifically suggest we take a look at non-partisan elections, he has said often that political party affiliations don’t tell you much about candidates’ qualifications in municipal elections. “We’d be better off if we got rid of the R’s and D’s in city elections,” he says.

Alumbaugh has made a believer of Terry Stodghill, chairman of the Grant County Democratic Party, who is frustrated at his inability to find Democratic candidates for the May 5 primary election.

“The only conclusion I have is that there is too much politics in local government,” Stodghill said in a recent interview. “I think Jess said it best when he said, ‘We need to get rid of the R’s and D’s on the ballot.’ But that’s just the

way it is.”

Non-partisan municipal elections are not a radical idea. In fact, 23 of the largest cities in American currently have non-partisan city elections, according to the National League of Cities (NLC).

In February of 2019, 14 non-partisan mayoral candidates—a record for the City of Chicago—were on what is called the general election ballot. In April, the two top vote getters in the general election faced off in what is called the run-off election.

Other cities use different names for the two-phases of the nonpartisan election process, but the model is basically the same.

Proponents of non-partisan ballots suggest that political parties are irrelevant to providing municipal services and that cooperation between elected officials belonging to different parties is more likely, according to the NLC.

The NLC lists three arguments raised by proponents of partisan elections:

The absence of party labels confuses voters. A voter who must choose from among a group of candidates whom he or she knows nothing about will have no meaningful basis in casting a ballot.

In the absence of a party ballot, voters will turn to whatever cue is available,

which often turns out to be the ethnicity of a candidate’s name.

Non-partisanship tends to produce elected officials more representative of the upper socioeconomic strata than of the general populace and aggravates the class bias in voting turnout, because in true nonpartisan systems there are no organizations of local party workers to bring lower-class citizens to the polls on election day.

Whatever election model you choose, partisan or nonpartisan, ideology still counts, according to Paul Fuld, founder of The Campaign Workshop, a Washington, DC-based political consulting firm. He has some advice for candidates.

“Define where you are on the ideological spectrum in nonpartisan elections before your opponent or an outside group does it for you,” Fuld wrote in a 2018 article.

“Make it clear to folks that you’re engaged by showing up for the issues you care about at community forums, club meetings, coffees and beyond. When you are running for office at the local level, your neighbors will want to hear about the local change you hope to make in their day-to-day lives,” Fuld said.

# County sets commission to explore idea of voting centers

A 12-member advisory commission has begun exploring the possibility of creating vote centers throughout Grant County for future elections. Time will not allow the new voting system to be in place by the May 5 primary election, but the transition could take place for the general election on November 3.

Nearly half of Indiana’s 92 counties have established vote centers to replace the historic system that requires voters to cast ballots in the precinct where they are registered. Grant County has not done so yet, but voters do have

the option of voting early in a central location: the Grant County Courthouse.

At one time, each precinct in Grant County had its own voting site, but over the past several years, the county’s 63 precincts have been consolidated into 32 voting sites.

A first priority for the advisory commission is to study how many vote centers would be required and where they would be located. Once established, any voter in the county could vote at any of the centers.

Republican Party Chair Darren Reese and Democratic Party Chair Terry Stodghill will co-chair the

nonpartisan commission, which was convened by county clerk Pam Harris.

Any plan to establish vote centers would have to be approved by the Grant County Council, Grant County Commissioners, Grant County Election Board and the Indiana Secretary of State’s Election Division.

“Vote centers provide added flexibility and efficiency to the voting process. In addition, early voting options would be expanded as part of vote centers,” Harris said in a news release.

Bardsley, a Republican, is the incumbent district 2 commissioner and has filed for reelection.

Both parties have until noon on June 30 to fill vacancies on the ballot for the November 3 general election.

The voter registration deadline for the primary

# Presentation of Medal of Freedom to Limbaugh a mockery

Ever since that moment last week when Melania Trump, she of the anti-bullying crusade, draped the Presidential Medal of Freedom around the neck of Rush Limbaugh, I have been trying to come up with some sort of equivalent, something so absurd, so disgusting that it might tell you how bad it has become, this business of Donald Trump making a mockery of America.

It is this: Consider the people here in Indiana that you might know or have heard of who have been awarded the Sagamore of the Wabash, the citation given by the governor to Hoosiers who have done something notable with their lives and talents. Ronald Reagan designated 102 recipients, while Barack Obama distributed 123 to men and women of distinction.

The award, first given by President Kennedy, is bestowed—and this language is important—for “especially meritorious contribution to the security or national interests of the United States, or world peace, or cultural or other significant public or private endeavors.”

Now back to the Sagamore of the Wabash for a minute. It is given for the same kinds of reasons, but more modest achievement, usually, than the Medal of Freedom. So what would you say if I suggested that we Hoosiers—some governor: Bowen, Bayh, O’Bannon, Whitcomb, Daniels, any one of them—should have given a Sagamore of the Wabash to Charles Manson? Indiana boy, certainly gained prominence, fame, recognition.

You would, of course, be outraged, and rightly so. He did nothing for the betterment of mankind.

So how is it that last week, Tuesday night, right there in the gallery of the Senate of the United States, Melania Trump, at the insistence of her husband, gave the Presidential Medal of Freedom to a man who is a racist, a bigot and a misogynist?

## Grant County girls basketball Giants win third straight; Indians’ streak snapped

Giants win third straight

The Marion Giants, behind a strong fourth quarter, came away with their third straight triumph, defeating the Muncie Central Bearcats by a score of 73-66. The two teams were neck-and-neck throughout, with neither leading by more than three points. The game was tied 15-15 after the first quarter before the Bearcats took a slight 33-32 advantage at halftime.

Muncie Central controlled the third quarter, building an eight-point lead, but the Giants stormed back, taking a 51-50 lead into the final frame.

Marion increased its advantage to 62-55 with 2:26 remaining, but the Bearcats were able to tie the game at 63-63 in the final minute. With 36.6 seconds left, Francesco Boniciolli hit the game-winning three from the corner, and the Giants held on to secure the eventual four-point triumph.

JK Thomas finished the contest with 24 points to lead the Giants, while Rasheed Jones collected 19 and Boniciolli added 12.

**Mississinewa’s streak snapped**

Coming into their contest with the Delta Eagles, the Mississinewa Indians were flying high. Since starting the season 2-2, the Indians had won 11 straight games, including a Grant Four championship, and were playing exceptional basketball on both ends of the floor. But a slow start, and an uncharacteristically poor shooting performance, and the Indians’ long win streak was snapped in a 56-37 loss to the Eagles.

“We’ve gotten complacent with some things,” Mississinewa Head Coach James Reed said. “When you are on

a winning streak, it’s hard to find those things to keep you motivated, and I think we got stuck on that a little bit.”

Delta took control of the contest early, building a 10-0 lead in the first 3:37 of the contest. Mississinewa did not score their first points of the game until the 4:23 mark, as the Eagles built a 13-6 first quarter advantage.

Mississinewa’s offense, which has been their strength all season, never got going on Saturday, in part due to the Indians’ foul trouble. Anthony Horton, Colin Yoder, and Hayden Ulerick, all starters for Mississinewa, each picked up two quick fouls in the opening period, never allowing the Indians to establish any sort of rhythm.

“We were trying to pick up the defensive energy along with being a little more aggressive offensively,” Reed said. “Very early, Anthony had two, and then Hayden and Colin got two fouls, and then we got focused on officials instead of the job that we were doing.”

The Eagles kept up their momentum in the second quarter, essentially putting the game out of reach. In the quarter, they shot six-of-11 from the field, and 6-6 from the free throw line. Furthermore, they hit their first five three-pointers of the frame, building a 28-10 advantage with 4:42 to go in the first half.

The Indians used a quick 7-0 run to trim Delta’s lead to 11, but another three from the Eagles, together with a free throw, put them up 32-17 at halftime.

The Eagles did not relinquish their double-digit lead in the second half, leading by as many as 20 before settling for the 17-point triumph.

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# Grant County boys basketball Eastbrook captures sectional; others done

From their first practice back in mid-November until Saturday night at The Panther Den, the Eastbrook Panthers have faced adversity. They lost all three of their top scorers from a season ago, and it took time for them to establish an identity.

The Panthers soon found that identity—as a team that played outstanding defense night in and night out—but they could not find consistency on offense. There were many nights where they shot under 30 percent from the floor, nights where they finished with field goal numbers in the single digits. They struggled at the free-throw line. Their confidence waned. They would build leads only to see them evaporate in the fourth quarter.

Heading into sectional play, nobody gave the Panthers much of a chance.

Even through the tough losses and rough performances, though, Head Coach Jeff Liddick made it known that he believed in his team. He pushed them, encouraged them, and challenged them, and just in time for the play-offs, the Panthers finally saw in themselves what Liddick had seen in them all along.

“The lightbulb went off last week, something clicked,” Liddick said. “They figured out they were a good basket-

ball team. We’ve been telling them all season long that this is the type of team [they] could be. Last week, they finally figured out that we weren’t lying to them.”

Coming off of their thrilling victory over Tipton in the semi-final round, Liddick and the Panthers knew they had another stern test awaiting them on Saturday night. Taylor, boasting a bevy of skilled offensive players, was the favorite to win Sectional 39. After a first round bye, they took care of business against

an improved Blackford Bruins squad, winning by 18. The Panthers had played the Titans right before Christmas, scoring just 31 points in a 15-point loss.

But the Eastbrook team that took the floor on Saturday in the Sectional 39 championship was a much different team, a more confident team, a better team, and for 36 minutes, the Panthers played with poise, assurance, and, most importantly, a belief in one another, capturing their first sectional championship since

2016 with a 35-31 overtime triumph over the Titans.

“It’s hard to describe. It means a lot,” Eastbrook shooting guard Rachel Manning said after the game. “... being here today just shows how much love and trust has grown between this group of girls.”

It wasn’t easy. Shots did not fall. The defense slipped. Leading by three late in the fourth quarter, the Panthers gave up the tying basket in the final minute of play. In overtime, they missed free throws that allowed Taylor to take the lead.

Through all of that, the Panthers kept their composure. “I told them tonight, I said, ‘You are going to face some adversity. Some bad things are going to happen. And you can respond one of two ways. You can feel sorry for yourself for that adversity, or you can stand up to it, nose to nose, and punch it back in the face,’” Liddick said. “That’s what they did all night long.”

The result was a hard-fought, and well-deserved, sectional championship.

“Words can’t describe how I feel right now,” Liddick said. “I think all season long, as a team, we haven’t been given a lot of credit. I’m just so happy for the girls...They finally figured it out.”

The Panthers opened by building a 7-0 lead, then both offenses went dry—the two teams combined for just two baskets early in the second quarter. The Panthers ended the half scoring five straight points to give take a 23-17 lead at the break.

The Panthers’ scoring ground to a halt in the third quarter, but their defense was outstanding: they held the Titans to just four points and one made field goal. McKim scored the Panthers’ only points on a three-point play, giving the Panthers a 26-21 advantage heading into the final eight minutes.

“All season long, defensively, we’ve given ourselves a chance to win basketball games,” Liddick said. “We didn’t do anything differently,

we just got after it on the defensive end. It was nothing special, just an all-out, gritty defensive effort.”

The Titans cut the Panthers’ advantage to 29-26 with 5:19 to go, but Eastbrook held that lead until there were just 49.6 seconds remaining, when the Titans forced an Eastbrook turnover. Moments later, Taylor’s Emma Good made them pay, knocking down the game-tying three to force overtime.

Langley opened the overtime period with a field goal, giving the Titans a 31-29 lead, but that would be end up being the last time Taylor would score. With 1:57 remaining, McKim hit her second free throw of the game to cut the Titans’ advantage down to one, and 39 seconds later, she made the biggest play of the game.

Playing tight defense at the top of the key, McKim stole the ball and drove the length of the court. Calmly, the sophomore knocked down the transition layup to put the Panthers ahead for good.

“I don’t remember getting the steal. Honestly, I remember just playing intense defense because I knew we needed a stop,” McKim said. “I just stuck my hand out, and that ball hit me in the hand, and my next mindset was, ‘I have to hit this layup.’ I knew I had to finish that shot.”

The contest ultimately came down to free throw shooting, and, at the most crucial point of the season, Manning delivered. With two seconds remaining in the overtime period, Manning was fouled on a defensive rebound, and went to the charity stripe for a chance to put the game away.

“Rachel is a good free throw shooter. She hits them all the time in practice,” McKim said. “I just told her, ‘Rachel, you’ve got this. You do this all the time.’” With the crowd roaring, her teammates cheering, and all of the pressure squarely on her shoulders, Manning hit both, putting the Panthers ahead by four and clinching the Sectional 39 championship.

The Panthers will play in the regional tournament next Saturday, where they will face off with a familiar foe in CIC rival Frankton in the first semi-final.

Goff led the Panthers with nine points against Taylor, seven of which came in the first half, while McKim ended the contest with eight. Manning and Singer each collected five points in Eastbrook’s victory.

## How they got there

The Eastbrook Panthers shot just four-of-25 from the field, and hit only one shot in the second half, but in the end, their defense and their free throw shooting made the difference, as the Panthers survived and advanced with a 27-26 triumph over the Madison-Grant Argylls in their Sectional 39 opener last Tuesday evening.

The Panthers’ victory over the Argylls was their third this season. They defeated Madison-Grant 36-27 in the annual Grant Four Tournament and 29-20 back on January 25.

“Our defense has been solid all year long,” Eastbrook Head Coach Jeff Liddick said. “I think we’ve only given up over 50 points twice all season long, and this is the sixth or seventh time that we’ve held a team under 30. We are doing great on the defensive end.”

The Panthers needed that strong defensive effort all evening long because offense was hard to come by.

“We weren’t aggressive,” Madison-Grant Head Coach Brandon Bradley said. “We were aggressive in the last few days of practice. We’ve been aggressive the second half of the season. Tonight, we were just catching the ball, making sure everything was exact and precise, and not taking a lot of chances.”

After the Panthers took a 12-6 lead, the Argylls began to push back, using a 6-1 run to cut Eastbrook’s advantage to 13-12 at the halftime break.

The scoring woes continued for both teams in the third quarter, as they combined for just eight points. The Panthers did not hit a shot in the third quarter, shooting zero-of-eight. At the 2:10 mark of the frame, the Panthers took a 19-14 lead after two free throws from Sedah McKim, but a basket from Greene off a steal in the final seconds cut the Panthers’ edge to just three points heading into the final eight minutes.

The Argylls made it interesting, tying the contest at 20-20 on a basket from Azmae Turner, but the Panthers answered with three more free throws. With 3:05 left to play, Goff hit the biggest shot of the game from three-point range, giving the Panthers a 26-20 advantage. It turned out to be their only field goal of the second half.

“Kristin’s been hitting shots like that for us all year,” Liddick said.

Playing against the No. 4 team in all of Class 3A, the Mississinewa Indians' 30 turnovers proved to be their undoing, as their 2019-2020 campaign came to an end with a 59-55 loss to the Norwell Knights in the first Sectional 23 semifinal.

"We played tough," Head Coach Laura Friday said. "I'm really proud of the girls, and I'm really proud to be their coach."

Mississinewa got off to a promising start in the opening eight minutes, as they took a 16-11 lead. But in the second quarter, the contest quickly shifted, and 10 turnovers from the Indians allowed the Knights to assume control.

Norwell opened the second half with a free throw, but five straight points from Catey tied the contest up at 34-34 with 6:19 remaining in the third. The two teams locked horns from there, neither giving up an inch. On two occasions, the Knights built their advantage to five, and each time, the Indians had a response.

The Knights ended the frame on a 5-0 run, giving them a 49-44 advantage.

With the game still within reach, the Indians' offense struggled in the final frame, knocking down just four field goals in 16 attempts. The Knights took advantage, building a game-high eight-point lead with 2:44 remaining and holding that advantage the rest of the way.

In her final game as an Indian, Caily Bolser left every-

thing out on the court. After missing most of the season with a broken wrist, the Toledo University commit was tremendous throughout the contest, leading the Indians with 20 points and eight rebounds.

Catey, who showed exponential growth throughout the course of the campaign, was second on the team with 16 points and seven boards. Riley McKee added nine points in her final showing.

**Oak Hill tops Heritage**

In their first foray into Class 3A playoff basketball under Head Coach Todd Law, the Oak Hill Golden Eagles, behind a strong, all-around performance on both ends of the floor, started their playoff run with an impressive victory.

Taylor Westgate predictably played stellar basketball, recording a double-double, the defense was sturdy throughout the contest, and the Golden Eagles punched their ticket to the Sectional 23 semifinals with a 45-33 triumph over the Heritage Patriots on Wednesday evening.

Oak Hill kept a stout Heritage offense under wraps from start to finish. While Bree Dossen, an Indiana Tech commit, scored 20 points, the Golden Eagles did not make it easy, holding the Patriots' star to just nine-of-20 from the floor.

Even more notable, Oak Hill held Abby Sheehan, Heritage's second leading scorer and one of their best three-point shooters, without a point. "Coming in, she was the best percentage three-

point shooter we've seen all year. She shot 141 threes, and she got one shot off tonight," Law said.

Westgate, who has played some tremendous basketball in the past two weeks, was dominant on both ends of the floor. She finished the contest with a game-high 22 points, 11 rebounds, and four assists, while also recording two steals on defense.

"She missed the first couple little bunnies inside and then she picked up a quick foul, [but] she's a smart player," Law said. "She was able to get through that first half and then was freer to play in the second half defensively."

Oak Hill's offense, as a whole, was crisp, as the team shot 46 percent (19-of-41) from the field.

"Every timeout in the fourth quarter, I just kept saying, 'Defend and rebound, defend and rebound.'" Law said.

Westgate added six more points in the quarter, as the team did a marvelous job of creating looks for her in the paint. The Golden Eagles led by as many as 14 points before settling for the 12-point triumph.

Hornocker and Shaw each provided solid secondary scoring, finishing with eight points apiece, while Biddle, Leak, and Coleena Selleck each added a field goal apiece.

**Oak Hill falls to Belmont**

In their final game of the 2019-2020 season, the Oak Hill Golden Eagles put together one of their best performances of the year. They

shot 42 percent from the floor (14-of-33), including a stellar six-of-13 from beyond the arc. For 32 minutes, they fought tirelessly against one of the toughest teams they've faced all year, battling to the very end in a 44-37 loss to the Belmont Squaws on Saturday evening in the second Sectional 23 semifinal.

"I'm extremely proud of our kids tonight," Oak Hill Head Coach Todd Law said. "...this was one of our best games. We played well tonight, we just got beat by a team that played better than us tonight."

The difference in the contest came down to turnovers. While the Golden Eagles only gave the ball up 13 times, the Squaws scored 11 points on those giveaways. Conversely, Oak Hill forced seven turnovers, but did not score any points in transition.

"We won most every statistical category," Law said. "But that was the game. It was a tough pill to swallow, because we played well."

An 11-2 run for the Squaws to start the second quarter gave them control of the contest, and a lead they would relinquish. Oak Hill cut the Squaws' advantage down to two points on two separate occasions in the latter stages of the third quarter, but Belmont always had an answer, heading into the fourth quarter on a 6-0 surge.

Belmont eventually built their lead to a game-high 10 in the final 1:52, and the Golden Eagles never got closer than seven the rest of the way.

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
