## Group teaches students robotics

When you walk in the front door of the white, nondescript building on the main street in Matthews, the first thing that catches your eye is a sign welcoming you to PhyXTGears.

The creative name, which is pronounced "fixed gears," was smooshed together from parts of three other words and phrases: physics, the old XT computer architecture and the fixed gears on a bicycle. The creativity does not end with the name, though. It permeates every square foot of the building—which is about half the size of a gymnasium—where high school students and their adult mentors gather three times

## Justice delayed: a three-part series

# Pretrial release assessment's role in jailed

Part three of three

Three out of five people in local jails across the United States have not been convicted of the crime for which they are incarcerated. This series looks at the Grant County jail system in an attempt to shed light on the circumstances affecting pretrial detention. In the first segment, we reported that 88 percent of Grant County jail inmates as of October 2019 were awaiting trial. With the jail at capacity, the series explored the burden that overcrowding places on taxpayers and jail personnel. In part two, we examined some of the reasons for and results of pre-trial detention.

A few years ago, Grant County became one of 12 counties across the nation to enter into a pretrial

release pilot program. The mission of the pilot program was to reduce the number of low-level offenders in jail and lower or remove bail costs.

The pretrial release assessment allows individuals to appear before a judge almost immediately after they have been charged with a crime. Grant County Sheriff Reggie Nevels said, "We do have a system now in a place where [when] somebody does get arrested, they go in front of the judge quicker."

Under Indiana Criminal Rule 26, criminal court judges use a pretrial risk assessment scale to determine if a defendant will be granted a pretrial release.

"Grant County has been working on this for about three years,"

said David Glickfield, public defender, "Every single person, every single criminal defendant, if they don't bond out, they have a meaningful hearing. The pretrial release has compiled information on the person's criminal history or their probation or they a flight risk of a ramp before."

According to Glickfield, one of the missions of the pretrial assessment program was to reduce the number of offenders taking a guilty plea just to be released from jail. "The DOC did not want someone who was indigent to plead guilty, just because they were in jail and knew that they could get out if they took the plea," Glickfield said.

## Candidates jockeying for seat in Fifth District

Twenty-one candidates—16 Republicans and five Democrats—are waiting in the wings to succeed Congresswoman Susan Brooks as Indiana's Fifth District Representative in the U.S. House.

Brooks, a Republican, was first elected to Congress in 2012. She announced last June she would not seek a fifth term.

The Fifth District includes all of Grant, Madison, Tipton and Hamilton counties, and parts of Blackford, Marion, Boone and Howard counties. It is the wealthiest Congressional district in Indiana, with a median income of \$70,977, according to U.S. Census data.

About 785,000 people live in the Fifth District, 75 percent in urban areas and 25 percent in rural areas. Racially, the district is 80 percent Caucasian, 9 percent African-American, 5 percent Hispanic and 4 percent Asian.

**Kent Abernathy**, ex-state motor vehicles commissioner, ex-banker and retired Army colonel.

**Andrew Bales**, retired history teacher, U.S. Army veteran of the Persian Gulf War, marijuana legalization activist.

**Micah Beckwith**, student worship leader at Northview Church in Noblesville and businessman.

**Carl Brizzi**, former Marion County prosecutor.

# The call is to be all-in with regards to our faith

Philippians 4:1-7

Last week, we concluded that the text showed that the task for the entire body of believers was to join forces to restore two prominent women in the church who had a falling out. There is a simple formula of how Christians should love one another. There must be love (I Corinthians 13). Love is key because it never fails. There must also be steadfastness. We need to be fixed on what needs to be done, and then be loyal to these principles. The third aspect is unity. We must be all-in with regards to commitment to the faith. There is a real art to getting along with others. One never masters this because it is a continual

process. Others must be dealt with in sincere affection. The ability of having other people's feeling in mind as we live our lives is essential. We need to be sensitive to others. We must also delight in the company of others. I am a people-person, so this is easy for me. I enjoy others because it provides a means of getting to know and understand them. We must also be able to rejoice in the happiness of others. When God blesses others, it should bless us. We must not be envious or jealous. We must promote each other's well-being. Do you care about others? Does it bring joy to you when others have problems? We must want and pray for God's best for others. Paul knew that these two women, Eudia and

Syntyche, needed to be of the same mind, and it was obvious they weren't. These two co-laborers had drifted apart because of differences. They were at odds, which could have come from doctrinal issues and opinions. False teachers were rampant at that time. More than anything, Paul wanted them to let this dissension cease. There are always two sides to every situation, but he wanted them to get along for the love of Christ. Those who are soldiers in the work of the Lord must always see the bigger picture. They had lost their way and their focus had become examples of pettiness. Life is difficult enough without the complications of fighting others. What are we thinking? In chapter four, verse three, Paul called upon his

faithful colleagues to step in to help these women. He encouraged them to pray for the women, sharing words of love that might trigger a reconciliation. These women were valuable to the ministry and definitely worth the effort. These two were fellow workers that needed to understand that the end of all work is the kingdom of God. They were special because their names were written in the book of life. The secret to harmony and maintaining a spirit of joy is to rejoice in the Lord (verse 4). There is no doubt that it is not always easy to rejoice in the midst of terrible circumstances. Knowledge of God is the key to rejoicing. We must also acknowledge that our needs are met through the wonderful grace of Christ (verse 19).

Paul goes on to direct believers in verse five with the challenge of learning to be content. There must be an experience of a gentle spirit that appropriates graciousness to others. Humility is the driving force that provides this

contentment. This is counter to ancient cult life of self-love, self-fulfillment, which ultimately leads to instability and anxiety. Considering all these thoughts, Paul had a great grasp on the workings of God. Right-thinking was always present. It is easy to understand why he could say, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). It is my prayer that the words of Scripture will challenge each of us to rise above the thinking of focus on "Right Thinking." Tom

in 2005 and initially met in the carpentry area at Ball State University.

"We met there for three years and Ball State didn't charge us anything," said Mike Koch, who founded the robotic organization. "They even let us use their tools, provided we took good care of them and put them away at the end of the day."

Koch is retired from Ontario Systems, a software firm in Muncie, where he worked for 23 years. He still is a PhyXTGears mentor and recently was honored as the top robotics mentor in the state.

After two moves in Muncie over the last decade, the group packed up its belongings in late 2019 and moved from Delaware County to the Matthews building, which was built during the gas boom in the late 1800s. A Taylor University professor bought the building for the purpose of furthering the robotics group.

Volunteers, most of them mentors for the robotics program, have spent several months renovating the interior of the building. The Upland/Matthews Working Group, which is a part of the Thriving Families, Thriving Grant County project, has worked to raise money for scholarships and to help with landscaping.

The 28 high school stu-

dents who are a part of the robotics team and their 12 adult mentors, all of them volunteers, moved into their new home in January to begin work on the robot they will enter in various levels of competition in the coming months. This year's robot is designed and programmed to pick up several balls and then place them in holes around the competition venue. The robot also must be able to get up on a 19-inch platform by itself.

The students come from several schools in East Central Indiana, including the Indiana Academy at Ball State, which attracts students from throughout the state.

"Our facility is open three days a week, a total of 16 hours, and most of the mentors are there most of the time," said Shawn Van Ness, president of the organization. "The students are required to be here at least six hours a week."

Van Ness said the students have about eight weeks to get their robot ready for two district competitions, which will be held in March in Bloomington and Columbus. The team then hopes to advance to the state competition in Lafayette.

If recent history is an indicator, the PhyXTGears team will be competing in the world competition at the end of April in Detroit. "We have gone to the world competition four of the last

five years," Van Ness said. "In 2019 we qualified by finishing second in the state championships and were 64th in the world competition."

Van Ness, who owns a managed IT corporation, also serves as the fundraiser for the robotic group, which has an annual budget of about \$50,000, much of it spent to get students and their robot to and from the various competitions. Much of the money comes from corporate sponsors, but students also are required to pay dues.

PhyXTGears is a member of FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology), which is an international high school robotics corporation. The organization offers \$80 million in scholarships.

"Students who have gone through our program have done well when it comes to scholarships from prestigious colleges," Van Ness said. "My oldest daughter turned down an opportunity to attend Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology in return for a full-ride scholarship to Ball State. Another student in the class of 2015 attended Rose-Hulman on a full-ride scholarship. Both of those students had been offered and accepted jobs before they even graduated from college."

# Local school districts know what works best

Our teachers and schools spend countless hours working with young Hoosiers, helping to prepare them for bright futures. As our talented educators take on this vital responsibility, they are also met with copious mandates that can take them away from teaching in the classroom. Because local school districts understand what works best for them, I am co-authoring a bill that gives them more flexibility and streamlines teacher licensing requirements.

Currently, school districts have to comply with more than 1,200 pages of laws and regulations. To help ease the burden, House Bill 1003 would empower local schools to identify which education requirements work best for local districts and apply for a waiver with the State Board of Education (SBOE) to lift or streamline certain mandates. Since the needs of Hoosiers are growing and changing, schools need to have the flexibility to decide what education requirements work best for them to meet the needs of their students.

This legislation also

tasks the SBOE to evaluate the number of trainings teachers are required to complete. Many of these trainings were made with good intention, but have become increasingly burdensome. A recent survey conducted by the Indiana Department Education found only 35% of Hoosier teachers believed a mandated training on gang violence was critical to their roles. Under proposed legislation, the SBOE could merge trainings together or recommend others that need to be eliminated.

Tony Cook (Republican, District 32) represents all of Tipton County and portions of Hamilton, Madison, Delaware, Howard and Grant counties.

Though this legislation, teachers would have more flexibility when it comes to renewing their licenses. Educators now can choose one of four paths in the license renewal process. One option is the Professional Growth Plan, where educators must earn 90 hours or points over five years. This legislation would no longer require teachers to obtain 15 of those hours through professional development related to their community’s workforce needs. While learning about employment opportunities would be beneficial for students, it may not be suitable for all teachers in all grade levels.

Indiana is home to some of the best schools, with talented educators who want to help shape the next generation of Hoosiers. However, they are met with numerous mandates that have become increasingly burdensome. With more flexibility and streamlined licensing requirements, schools would have the freedom to decide how they want to meet the needs of students.

# Epidemics may ravage but we endure

Most of us really don’t know squat about epidemics and pandemics. We remember that time that a lot of kids got sick and they closed school for the day. Something like that. Or AIDS back in the ’90s, but it didn’t affect all of us, at least not until Ryan White died. Pay no attention to the 35 million men, women and children who have died of AIDS since a man named Ken Home got sick in San Francisco in April of 1980.

Most of us are too young to know much about the flu epidemic of 1918, although few families were exempt from death. My wife’s grandmother died of it and my mother’s teenage sister died in just a few days. More than a quarter of the American population got sick and more than a half-million people died, all within less than six months. It was called the Spanish Flu, only because Spain was one of the few countries to report honestly on the numbers of dead and dying. As is the case today with China, politics prevailed in most of Western Europe and the United States. Honesty was a luxury we apparently could not afford.

One of those little details that tells us much: October of 1918 was the deadliest month in American history. No war,

no crime, no disaster, natural or man-made, ever claimed so many lives. The greatest scarcity in the spring of 1919 in America: Temporary facilities for storage of the dead until burials could be arranged.

Then, when I was a kid, there was polio. If you were young and healthy in the early 1950s, you were kept away from the public swimming pool—to this day I cannot swim—and Saturday afternoon at the movies and anyplace else where you and your friends might want to congregate. We obeyed because most of us knew someone who had contracted “poliomyelitis” or, as it was more commonly called, “infantile paralysis,” and emerged either with dead legs and braces, or, even worse, condemned to spend a short life in a horrible thing called an iron lung. Jere Truex, who lived most of his life in

Europe several times in Medieval days, midway through the 14th century.

Somewhere between 75-200 million people in Europe and western Asia died between 1340 and 1350, leaving farms, lands, churches, towns, cities; indeed, nations, bereft of people. Governments rose and fell. Wars were abandoned, to be resumed later. Things like the invention of the dead wagon and the god-awful wail of “bring out your dead” came from those days. So did the children’s ditty, “Ring around the Rosie, pocket full of posies, ashes, ashes, all fall down.”

Hard to grasp the enormity, but we try. If such a scourge were to lash Grant County today, the newspaper would expand to include about 200 obituaries each day for a year, if there were anyone to write them and bury the dead, but, of course, there would not be.

The ancient Greeks in 430 B.C. were visited by something akin to typhoid fever, the first recorded epidemic that swept across Lybia, Ethiopia, and Egypt before devastating the Athenians to the extent that the Spartans were able to defeat the city state. Illness trumps politics.

The Antonine plague of 165 A.D. was our introduction to smallpox. It began with the Huns, who infected the Germans, who passed it to

the Romans and then returning troops spread it throughout the Roman empire. It raged for 15 years, claiming Emperor Marcus Aurelius among its victims.

Doctors will cure people. Scientists will develop drugs. Politicians will point fingers. People will die. But we shall prevail. We always do.

# Grant County boys basketball Panthers get first win; Giants win streak hits four

**Panthers lose to Bluffton**  
The Eastbrook Panthers were still searching for their first win heading into last Tuesday evening's contest against the Bluffton Tigers. After the final buzzer, the Panthers left the Panther Den still searching, falling to the Tigers by a score of 53-27.

Eastbrook was in striking distance throughout most of the first half. They trailed 16-9 after the first quarter and were down 25-15 at halftime, but the Panthers' offense sputtered in the final two quarters, producing just 12 more points the rest of the way.

**Panthers lose to Wes-Del**  
The Eastbrook Panthers' free-fall continued on Friday night. After a manageable first quarter, the Panthers struggled mightily on both ends the rest of the way, falling to 0-17 after a 79-45 loss to the Wes-Del Warriors.

Once the Warriors switched up their defense, the game turned decidedly in their favor. The Panthers turned the ball over on far too many occasions, and the Warriors made them pay.

"Wes-Del did a good job of speeding us up and playing faster than we wanted to play," Eastbrook Head Coach Greg Allison said. "They played pretty well for the first quarter, quarter-and-a-half, and they went to a full-court trapping defense, which sped us up and caused us problems. They were able to convert our turnovers into easy baskets."

Braxton Bowser put together a career-best performance, scoring 15 points for the Panthers, while Alex Baker collected eight and Bryce Schamber, back from injury, added six.

In a season full of frustration and adversity, the Eastbrook Panthers' hard work finally paid off on Saturday night. Behind a strong defensive effort, the Panthers routed Elwood, 49-23.

"It's just a testament to our kids," Eastbrook Head Coach Greg Allison said. "They didn't back down. They kept coming every day trying to get better."

Defense set the tone for the contest, as the Panthers forced Elwood into 29 giveaways. Eastbrook's half-court trap led to steals and easy baskets, and the Panthers were able to take control of and put the game away early.

"We had a really strong defensive effort tonight, and did some nice things offensively as well," Allison said. "I was just really impressed with how we defended tonight. To give up 23 points total in a 32-minute ball game is remarkable. They bought into the defensive end tonight."

Braxton Bowser put together another strong performance, scoring 15 points for the second straight contest, while Alex Baker finished with 15 points, seven rebounds, and six blocks.

**Argylls defeat Alexandria**  
It's been a heartbreaking week for the Madison-Grant Argylls. On February 7, Madison-Grant Assistant Coach Kyle Guenther passed away unexpectedly. A beloved teacher, coach, and friend, Guenther's passing rocked the program and sent shockwaves throughout the community.

Their game against Taylor the next evening was cancelled, and throughout this past week, the team grieved and comforted one another. Playing in their first game since February 1 on Friday evening, the Argylls, physically and mentally exhausted, struggled through

most of the first half. After halftime, though, they found another gear, coming back from a double-digit halftime deficit to defeat the Alexandria Tigers 66-59.

Madison-Grant began the second half with a pair of turnovers, and that sparked a 24-9 run over the next eight minutes that gave the Argylls the lead for good.

"The third quarter was huge because that got us back into the game," Trout said. "These kids—I don't know how they did it...They showed their toughness tonight."

Grant Brown and Kaden Howell each finished with 15 points, while Justin Moore scored 11 and Seth Lugar added 10.

**Argylls over Southwood**  
Coming off of their emotional win over Alexandria, the Madison-Grant Argylls played even better on Saturday night, leading from tip-off to final buzzer in 85-63 triumph over Southwood. They led 20-12 after the first quarter, and held that advantage the rest of the way.

"We shot the ball well to start the game," Madison-Grant Head Coach Brian Trout said. "We passed the ball really well. We had 20 assists on 33 field goals [and] shot 61 percent from the floor for the game."

At halftime, their lead ballooned to 42-23, and they did not face much resistance in the final two quarters.

## Spotlight Game

When Marion Giants Head Coach James Blackmon called timeout with 3:15 remaining in Friday night's contest with McCutcheon, the Giants trailed by 10, and their winning streak was in serious jeopardy.

The Mavericks took advantage of a porous Giants' defense, driving to the basket without much resistance and getting to the free throw line on a frequent basis. Stud freshman Dra Gibbs-Lawhorn was lighting it up from all over the floor, eventually finishing with a game-high 33 points.

But the Giants did not panic, nor did they wilt. Instead, they outscored the Mavericks 18-7 the rest of the way to win 78-77, their fourth in a row.

"I told them [during that timeout,] 'There is plenty of time left in the ball game,'" said Blackmon, "We score in bundles, but we have to execute on the defensive end.' I thought we did a great job of keeping our composure being down 10 with that much time left."

JK Thomas and Rasheed Jones combined to score 14 of Marion's final 18 points, and several key plays from both helped turn the contest in the Giants' favor.

The Giants got off to a strong start, building a 13-6 lead early, but the Mavericks responded with a 13-1 run. A three by Thomas and a field goal by Jones tied the contest at 19-19 in the opening minute of the second frame, and the Giants were able to tie it twice more at 24-24 and 26-26, but they could not put together any sort of scoring run and trailed 33-32 at

halftime.

Marion continued their up and down play in the third quarter and the Mavericks took a 54-51 lead into the final frame. For the first five minutes of the final quarter, the Mavericks held all of the momentum. They continued to drive into the paint at will, and the Giants' defense seemingly had no answer.

But after Blackmon's timeout, the Giants returned refreshed and reinvigorated for the home stretch. Jones hit his fifth three of the game to make it 76-73, and later, Thomas hit three free throws after being fouled on a three-point attempt to cut the advantage to 77-76.

With 30.3 ticks to go, McCutcheon was called for a traveling violation, and six seconds later, Thomas hit the game-winning layup. The Mavericks had a chance to take the lead back with 14 seconds to go, but they missed their final two free throws.

While Lawhorn was sensational throughout the contest, Thomas was equally impressive, finishing with 31 points to lead the Giants. Jones finished with 21 points to go along with a team-leading six rebounds. Goolsby also played a part in Marion's second half resurgence, shooting six-for-six in the final two quarters.

"When Jalen got hurt, we went a while trying to find our identity, and these last five games, I think guys are starting to believe we can win ball games," Blackmon said. "It was a team effort down the stretch. I thought guys were locked in, and they got the job done."

"Blackford was very good and very efficient from the field. They shot 19 free throws and connected on 80 percent. What made it even more challenging was that Brown was 54 percent from three and most were very deep, which caused us to struggle covering rebounds."

Brown finished the game with 38 points on 13-of-25 shooting and five-of-six from the free throw line.

Tahj Johnson led the Golden Eagles with 22 points, while Tristen Hayes finished with 12 points and six rebounds. Ryan Peder-son also collected a double-double with 10 points and 10 boards, while both Clay McCorkle and Kody Dubois each scored 11.

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# Grant County girls basketball Eastbrook’s season ends in regional semi

Coming off of their remarkable Sectional 39 championship run, Jeff Liddick and the Eastbrook Lady Panthers knew they would have a fight on their hands against long-time conference rival Frankton in the Class 2A Regional 10 semifinal on Saturday morning.

The Eagles, much like Eastbrook, are a tough, defensive-minded team, and when playing at home they are tough to beat. In the end, a plethora of turnovers, combined with the shooting struggles that have plagued them all season, proved to be the difference as the Panthers’ were eliminated from the 2A playoffs with a 41-22 loss.

The Panthers coughed the ball up 20 times compared to Frankton’s nine, and, more often than not, the Eagles made them pay on the other end. The Eagles allowed just eight points in the second half, none in the fourth quarter.

“We knew that we were going to have to take care of the ball, and any possession we got, we were going to have to take full advantage of that,” Liddick said. “I think we were trying to be a little too quick. We were trying to play a little faster than we can play, and you have to attribute that to their defense. They get up in your face, they pressure

you, and they get after it.” Eastbrook shot just nine-of-29 from the floor for the contest, making just three field goals after halftime.

The two teams combined for just seven points in the first eight minutes. Frankton’s Chloe Thomas scored the first basket of the game, before Eastbrook’s Kristin Goff knocked down the Panthers’ only field goal, a three, to give them a 3-2 lead.

While the Panthers’ defense stymied the Frankton attack, their turnovers issues began early, stifling their offense in the process. Eastbrook turned the ball over seven times, and

their final one of the quarter led to another Thomas field goal, giving the Eagles a 4-3 edge.

The scoring picked up in the second quarter. Johnwen McKim’s first field goal and a converted and-one from Seddah McKim briefly helped Eastbrook take the lead back, but shortly thereafter, the Eagles regained the advantage for good. Frankton built their lead to eight points, and an Ava Gardner three off an Eastbrook turnover at the buzzer put the Eagles up 22-14 at the halftime break.

“A lot of our turnovers were just unforced errors,”

Liddick said. “What got us in trouble was not being able to take care of the ball on the offensive end, [and we also] missed a lot of shots in the paint.”

All three of Eastbrook’s remaining field goals came in the third; Rachel Manning’s basket at the end of the frame would prove to be the last for the Panthers. Frankton closed out the game with authority, outscoring the Panthers 11-0 in the final frame to advance the Class 2A Regional 10 championship game later in the evening.

Along with Bates’ 12 points, Gardner finished with

seven for the Eagles. Johnwen McKim led the Panthers with eight, while Goff ended the game with five.

Despite the loss, Liddick could not help but be proud of his team, particularly with their play on the defensive end of the floor. Frankton came into the game averaging over 50 points a game, and the Panthers held them to just 13 made field goals.

“Looking at the scoreboard, until we fouled at the end to get our subs in, we held them to 14 points below their average [at that point,]” Liddick said. “On the defensive end, even with the shots that they hit and the lead that they had, I thought our girls did an amazing job. They are used to scoring 53 a game, and they were sitting there with 39. We knew that we needed to hold them under 40 to have a chance to win, and we did. Our girls accomplished it. That’s a great offensive basketball team.”

Stepp, Shauna Singer, and Lillian Moore each played in their final game in an Eastbrook on Saturday morning, and there is no question that all three left a mark on the program. Singer was the one of the team’s best rebounders, and a strong defender to boot. Stepp provided energy off the bench on both ends and accomplished whatever

was required of her, unhesitatingly. While Moore did not play much, she was a consummate teammate, providing constant encouragement from the bench and lifting her teammates up regularly.

“They are great kids and great teammates,” Liddick said. “They were girls that came in every day and gave us everything they had...They set an example with their effort. They set an example with the way they treated other teammates, and we are going to miss them dearly.”

While this year may be over, the future is bright for the Eastbrook Lady Panthers’ basketball program. With a host of talented eighth graders ready to make the jump to varsity basketball next year, combined with a strong core of players set to return, this season could be the start of something special on the east side of Grant County.

“Going into next year, if they want to compete for a regional championship, or a sectional championship for that matter, they are going to have to invest some time,” Liddick said. “We have some girls that are going to help us tremendously...[but] hopefully what we have accomplished here in the latter half of the season will help with that.”

# Law hangs up whistle as Oak Hill girls head coach

After a Hall-of-Fame career that included over 300 wins, a state championship in 2019, and 16 years of molding and refining one of the top girls' basketball programs in Indiana, Oak Hill Head Coach Todd Law is stepping down.

On February 11 Law announced his resignation as the head coach of the Lady Golden Eagles basketball program. He leaves behind an impressive and remarkable legacy of success, a product of the love, hard work and commitment that rendered Oak Hill one of the

most premier programs in the state.

"This was a very difficult decision as I still enjoy coaching," Law said in a statement. "[I enjoy] teaching the game of basketball, the challenge of helping players and teams reach their potential, helping players learn life lessons through the sport of basketball, and trying my best to be a positive role model and having a positive impact on as many players as possible.

"[But] with the job being a 12-month, year-round commitment, I have decided it is time for me to make a

change. I have lifted this decision up to God in prayer, and He has made it clear to me that it is time for this change."

While his coaching chapter has come full circle, there is no denying the profound effect that Law has left on Oak Hill girls' basketball.

A 1984 Oak Hill grad, Law attended Taylor University, where he received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1988. He also studied psychology at Indiana Purdue Fort Wayne in 1991, before completing his education with a master's degree in school counseling

from the University of Saint Francis.

While in school at Taylor, Law began his coaching career in boys basketball, coaching Oak Hill's seventh grade team in the 1985-1986 season and the ninth grade group from 1986-1988. He then coached Oak Hill's JV boys team from 1988-1990 before moving on to Southwood as the varsity boys basketball coach.

Law spent six years at Southwood, compiling a record of 41-86 from 1990 to 1996 before returning to Oak Hill. After seven years as an assistant football coach, Law took the reins of the Oak Hill girls basketball program in 2004, and, over the next 16 years, he solidified his position as one of the greatest head coaches in the rich history of Grant County sports.

In that span, Law compiled a record of 305-83, a winning percentage of .786, and an average of 19.1 wins per season. He coached the Golden Eagles to eight Grant Four championships, 11 conference championships, seven sectional titles, five regional titles, four semi-state titles, and a Class 2A state championship, the first in program history, last March.

While Law was successful on the court, it was his relationship with his players that gave his coaching such an impact. He saw his players as young women, and

coached them not only in the areas of shooting, passing, and dribbling, but also in life, helping them navigate the trying times of high school and early adulthood.

Since Oak Hill opened its door in 1960, 15 girls have played or will play college basketball. Law has coached 12 of them, including 2010 Miss Basketball and former Purdue star Courtney Moses, Anderson University point guard Kristin Dubois, current IWU freshman Adriana Trexler, current Huntington University freshman Jenessa Hasty, and future Taylor Trojan Taylor Westgate.

Of the nine girls that have scored 1,000 points at Oak Hill, Law coached seven of them, including Moses, Westgate, Ashley Pickering, Toni Lautzenheiser, Kristen Hicks, and Lauren Meese.

"What I will miss the most is the opportunity to continue building relationships with players on a yearly basis," Law said. "This is why I coached—to have a positive impact on as many players as I could."

While it was clear that Law made an impression on all of the girls he coached over his 16-year head coaching career, they, along with all of his assistant coaches, his family, and Oak Hill as a whole, were a positive influence on him as well.

"I have been so blessed

to coach at a school and for an administration who supports its athletic programs so well," Law said. "I have been blessed to have had so many dedicated assistant coaches who came alongside me to help carry out our vision for the girls basketball program here at Oak Hill High School. I have been blessed and fortunate to have coached so many amazing ladies who embodied what a true student athlete should be. And I have been incredibly blessed to have my family's support and help throughout my coaching career."

As of this time, Law has not articulated his future plans. Whatever they may be, he will cherish his time as the head coach of the Oak Hill Golden Eagles girls basketball program.

"I am extremely proud of the successes that we have been able to accomplish together the past 16 years as God has blessed us and our program tremendously and we give Him all of the glory," Law said. "I am very excited to see what God has planned for me next as I know that His plan is perfect. I know my role in the Lady Eagle basketball program now changes to that of being their #1 fan and I look forward to fulfilling that role."


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
