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Marion Community Schools announce plans

At their regularly scheduled meeting this past Tuesday evening, the Marion Community Schools Board of Trustees approved a pair of baseline plans for the 2020-2021 school year.

Along with an onsite learning plan for those comfortable with returning to a normal school environment, Marion Community Schools expanded their Giant Online Academy program to include options for all grade levels for those who wish to continue to learn from home.

"Our mission is continuity of learning for all our children, meeting the needs and preferences of our Giants and their families, whether that is home learning through our Giant Online Academy, or on campus



learning in our school buildings," Marion Community Schools stated in a release. "The health and safety of our community is our top priority, and important changes will be required for the school year ahead. Flexibility, innovation, and cooperation will be more crucial than ever."

The new school year will begin on Wednesday, Au-

gust 5 for grades K-12, while preschool will start up on Monday, August 10. Students will attend school five days a week, as usual, and start and end times will remain the same.

Mask usage by both staff and students is strongly encouraged, and Marion Community Schools acknowledged that there will be certain situations, including some in-school settings or a bus ride home, where wearing a mask will be required.

Hand washing and sanitizing throughout the school day will be expected, especially at the start of the school day, before and after eating, after using the restroom, after blowing nose, coughing, or sneezing, and before and after using shared equipment. Hand sanitizer will be available throughout the building, including classroom, cafeterias, and hallways.

Furthermore, classrooms will be spaced out as much as possible, all seating will be assigned, one-way traffic will be utilized whenever possible, and water fountains will not be used. Social distancing is to be used whenever possible.

All staff and students will be required to self-screen before coming to school each day. Students or staff with a fever of 100 degrees or higher will be not be allowed into the building. Additionally, they must be fever free for 72 hours without the use of fever reducing medications to be allowed to return to school.

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New Subway location officially open

After eight months of planning, preparation, and navigating a global pandemic, Grant County's newest Subway, located inside the BP gas station and convenience store off I-69, is officially open for business following a ribbon cutting ceremony this past Thursday.

Good Oil Company, which has been in the petroleum and convenience store business since 1941, purchased the building in November 2019 with plans to have the Subway portion up and running in the spring of 2020.

The COVID-19 pandemic pushed this goal back; however, the persistent work of Good Oil Company, the Marion-Grant County Chamber of Commerce, and their multiple partners streamlined the process.

"We felt compelled that it was probably the best thing to bring a Subway back to the area," Good Oil Company Director of Marketing and Food Services Mike Jones said. "That was always the plan going into it. Unfortunately, the COVID

situation and the shutdown added some untimely delays, but suffice to say, we worked diligently with the Humphries Development group, who is the Subway business development agent in the area, on making this possible."

The new branch of the popular sandwich chain is in a prime location. Not only is it right off the highway, but is also near Mar-

ion's Ivy Tech campus, giving Subway two distinct customers bases.

Jones stated that all those factors went into picking that location.

"There is great access for folks coming off the highway," Jones said. "We've got interstate signs to let them know that there is a Subway here at this exit. We figured with all the other QSR (quick service restau-

rant) offers that are available, Subway presents itself as a healthier option and a fresher option.

"Between the various businesses, the interstate traffic, and Ivy Tech behind us, there is a huge market for what we are going to have here."

Despite the delays due to the COVID pandemic, Jones praised the Marion-Grant County of Commerce, the Grant County Health Department, and various other organizations for their effort, their flexibility, and their drive to make this Subway possible.

"We deal, throughout the state of Indiana and even into Illinois, with a lot of municipalities and various counties and cities," Jones said. "Grant County, and

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
