held, including swine, beef, goat, sheep, rabbit, dairy beef, and horse.

The fairground, usually teeming with life, was nearly empty, but for the 4-H families and their show animals. Food truck numbers were cut nearly in half, as only four or five were present throughout the week. Expectantly, many projects were on display throughout the community building, though the building was eerily void of spec-

Despite these outward effects, Goff believes that the fair has gone according to

"It's going very well," Goff said. "It's been kind of warm outside, but everybody has been cooperating really well. [We don't] have the food vendors or the entertainment tent, so that makes it a lot quieter. It's mainly 4-H families that are here, which is how we wanted it with everything going on. It looks completely different, but everybody has been great working with our restric-

tions and what we had to do. "We are just glad to be

Goff has been happy with how the fairgoers have heeded to all the changes.

"We are trying to do all the things we need to do to keep it safe for the kids," Goff said. "The social distancing, and the wearing of the face coverings is recommended for them to do. Everybody has been very, very understanding and working with us. They are just glad to be able to be

Many 4-H members signed up for wristbands, which helped Goff and her staff know who was on the fairground and when. Furthermore, those who did not have a wristband were required to sign up at each building, which will assist in contact tracing in the case of any COVID-19 outbreak.

"Hopefully nothing happens," Goff said. "But if it does, we know who was here and we can let them know and notify them."

"Those kids bought animals to be the right size for June," Goff said. Hosting the fair in July did result in some minor issues, particularly with the swine show.

"We're a month later, and so, a lot of those animals were just way too big, so the kids were unable to show for that reason. The swine show was where you saw the effect of a July show] the most."

However, considering the severe impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on communities across the nation, Goff is pleased that the annual fair was able to happen in some capacity.

"We thought for a long time we weren't going to be able to do it, but every time we stopped and thought about the kids, especially the 10-year members," Goff concluded. "Those are all seniors, and they already lost their graduation and all of their traditional things, so the last thing we wanted to do was [have] them miss out on their very last fair.

"We worked really hard to come up with a safety plan and everything we needed to do so we could have this. Everybody has been very appreciative and thanking us for making the effort. We are just happy we are having
