Voting process, not candidates center of attention

The ballot for the November 3 General Election in Grant County officially was set Friday when filing for school board seats ended on Friday. But recent media attention has focused more on the voting process – specifically absentee ballots versus mail-



in ballots – than on the candidates.

Typically, absentee ballots refer to ballots that are requested and then mailed

when a person can't vote in person. Mail-in ballots refer to ballots in that allow all people to vote by mail.

At least 34 states have approved mail-in ballots for the Nov. 3 election, with some of those states mailing ballots to every registered voter. Indiana is one of seven states that will accept only absentee bal-

lots.

Indiana allowed all people to vote by mail in the June primary election, but the Indiana Election Commission deadlocked Aug. 3 on a proposal to extend the same privilege for the General Election. Two Democrat members of the commission supported the expanded balloting, and

two Republican members opposed it.

The window is now open in Indiana for voters to apply for absentee ballots, and Oct. 22 is the deadline.

Marion City Council to consider city court fate

When the Marion City Council began its review of the 2021 budget for the city, Council President Deborah Cain asked her fellow councilors to consider whether Marion can afford to keep its city court.

"I raised the issue after several conversations I've had with different council members in the last year," Cain said. "The local media read more into the comment than I intended. This conversation is just in the exploration stage. It's not something we are going to do this year. We may need a few more years before making a decision."

Cain thought this would be a good time to put the issue on the city's agenda because 2021 will be a year of transition for Marion City Court when Judge Jason McVicker steps down December 31 to become Judge of Grant Superior Court 3

rior Court 3.

Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb will choose a successor to complete the final three years of McVicker's term. McVicker, a seventh-generation resident of Grant County, has served six years as city court judge, which is considered a part-time position.

Cain said she plans to appoint a committee to study whether Marion should continue to fund the city court, which has an annual budget of about \$185,000. In addition to the judge, city court has a full-time probation officer and a secretary.

"The court generates
\$60,000 to \$75,000 in revenue each year, and I have been able to cut the budget each year that I have served as judge," McVicker said. "I know it sounds like a lofty goal to suggest the court ever could be self-
