us to ascertain trends so we could see what the trends were.”

The research showed that many of these patients had similar issues, including underlying health conditions and work-related stresses.

In the behavioral analysis portion, several interesting trends were discovered. Of those affected by the virus, 52.1 percent were women. Among all of the people tested, the virus was distributed among multiple age groups: 27.9 percent were in the 60-69 range, 17.9 percent were in the 40-49 bracket, and 11.9 percent were in the 30-39 demographic. This result revealed that the virus affected people of all age populations, and was not exclusive to the older population.

While the data showed that the Grant County community continued to travel throughout the shutdown and mandatory quarantine, the citizens did do their part to help slow the spread of the virus.

“We were really impressed that our county did really well trying to be a community citizen and do what was recommended,” Vermilion said. “That was really warming to the results.”

The Vermilion group broke down their behavioral research into multiple categories, including mask use, hand washing, disinfectant use, and social distancing, while looking at trends across gender, age, race, and zip code.

For example, 89 percent of those polled washed their hands after being out in public, 75 percent followed social distancing protocols, and 81 percent used hand sanitizer on a frequent basis.

Additionally, the younger population traveled much more frequently than the older generation.

Survey results on mask-wearing behaviors revealed that 43.7 percent wore a mask when out, 48 percent wore masks occasionally, and nearly eight percent never wore a mask while out.

At the conclusion of the program, Vermilion and her team believe they have given themselves, the community and future researchers a playbook of how to continue fighting this disease in the future.

“Every age group will get COVID-19,” Vermilion said. “For us, it’s good information for topic, communication, and debate, [but overall,] we want to be sure we are protecting the most vulnerable.”

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
