Coming off their second straight regional final appearance, the Eastbrook Panthers look to be successful in 2020, despite suffering heavy losses on their defensive back line.



The sounds of athletic competition filled the air Saturday for the first time in what felt like an eternity as all four Grant County boys soccer teams saw their first action of the 2020 season in the annual Grant County Jamboree.

Each team played two 40minute halves against two different opponents, looking to build on their strengths as well as identify weaknesses and areas to fix. Oak Hill went 2-0 on the day, Marion and Mississinewa each went 1-1, and Eastbrook finished

Oak Hill golfers down Marion

In the early stages of her senior campaign for the Oak Hill Golden Eagles, Hope Mygrant has taken her play to another level.

Coming off shooting a 37 against Frankton, Mygrant put together another terrific performance against Marion at Meshingomesia on Wednesday evening, medaling for the second straight match and playing a significant role in Oak Hill's second win of the young

Playing on a tough course, Mygrant fired a 41, marking the fourth straight contest where she finished as Oak Hill's low scorer, despite some struggles on the final few holes.

"She likes the game of golf, and she knows that she can perform at a high level or even a higher level," Oak Hill Head Coach Steve Nelson said. "She likes to work at the game. She practices hard at it. That tells you a lot about her makeup, and I think that she just wants to have a good senior year."

Despite her strong score, Mygrant felt she left several shots out on the course, particularly during the final five holes. After hitting for birdie on hole five, Mygrant hit for bogey on each of the next four holes, including back-to-back double bogeys on holes nine and one.

"I actually didn't feel that good about it," Mygrant said. "At the beginning, I had [several] fours, and one

of the fours was on a parfive, so I was feeling pretty strong. Then, I hit hole nine, and I had a bad hole. Then, I went to hole one and had another bad hole, and that kind of messed up my game."

However, her first four holes were spectacular, which helped propel her to another first place finish for Oak Hill. She started the match with three straight pars before collecting her birdie on hole five, and then, ended her round on a high note, hitting for par on hole two.

In her first four matches, Mygrant has been locked in. She hit 83 and 85 in the Harrison Invitational and Huntington North Invitational, respectively, before turning in her brilliant performance against Frankton in the Golden Eagles' first dual match.

Wednesday night's performance was just another example of her growth and development as a golfer.

"My past years, I had a huge problem with confidence," Mygrant said. "The game has always been there, but ever since I've gotten together with my swing coach, we've worked basically on the mental [aspect of] the game, because that's all I need, really."

The Giants only had three golfers compete on Wednesday, but each one performed well. Savannah Grieve finished with a 58, collecting a birdie on hole three, while
