Grant County Democratic Party holds voter registration rally

The Grant County Democratic Party met for the first time in six months on Saturday, hosting a voter registration rally at Matter

Along with hearing from several candidates on the status of their campaigns leading up to the election this November, the Grant County Democratic Party's primary goal on Saturday was to help people register to vote who have not done so al-

"We tried to bring in some candidates so people can hear what they plan on doing and how their campaigns are doing," County Chair for the Grant County Democratic Party Terry Stodghill said. "We had Christina Hale. We had a representative from Dr. Woody Myer's campaign. The main message for me here today is we've got to get the word out and we have to get people registered to vote. That is the main thing."

Following an inability to meet during the worst of the coronavirus pandemic, Stodghill believed that holding a rally outdoors was the best way to get people to come out of their homes and register.

Stodghill believes that the upcoming election will be one of the most important in the country's history and wants as many Democrats to get out to the polls as possible this

"It's been since March since we've had a meeting, and I was struggling. How were we going to communicate with the **Grant County Democrats?** And so I came up with this outdoors event," Stodghill said. "I think the main thing that people have to realize is that we have to change Washington. As far as the presidential race, we have to get changes in Washington D.C., starting with the White House."

While Stodghill and the **Grant County Democratic** Party were hoping to target as many people as possible from every

demographic, their primary focus was to target the 18-30 year range. With more votes coming from that group of people, Stodghill thinks that Democrats have a chance to shift the balance of power in the United State government.

"To me, those are the ones that we have so many that are not registered to vote," Stodghill said. "We've got people out working in different parts of the city trying to register the young people. This is the most important election of my lifetime. Our democracy is at stake. All people have to do is wake up and realize what is happening around them."

Stodghill hopes that there will be more chances for the Grant County Democratic Party to meet in the very near future. Right now, however, the plan is to continue to be out amongst the people, spreading the wod.

"Hopefully, we can plan a few more events before November 3, but right now, we have to hope for the best," Stodghill said. "Word of mouth is a good way, and we have some good Democrats, and believe me, they are out there speaking out there in the public. That is our biggest thing – we have to get the word out."
