Giants pick up season's first win

When Kyle Coryea, JD Fagan, and Alex Powell play to their full potential and in sync with one another, they are one of the most dynamic boys soccer trios in Grant County.

Their skill was on full display on Wednesday night as the Marion Giants used an offensive explosion to defeat arch-rival Mississinewa, 6-3, under the lights of Dick Lootens Stadium for their first victory of the 2020 season.

"We came to play," Marion Head Coach Jorge Berry said. "We played hard. We played so hard. And that is how we have to play. Our kids busted their tail on both ends of the [pitch.]"

Coryea, Fagan, and Powell combined for five of Marion's six goals, while also recording four assists. Powell shined throughout the contest, scoring twice and creating a plethora of opportunities for both himself and his teammates.

"If we had possessed the ball a little bit more, we could have beaten their defense a little bit better than what we did," Mississinewa Head Coach Jared Reel said. "They had a good game plan. It worked, and it took us out of our game a little bit."

While they did give up three goals and make a few defensive lapses, Marion's young back line held firm, and Malik Smith put together a stellar performance in net, making 10 saves, several at point blank range.

"He has been our most consistent player," Berry said of Smith. "He has been the rock in our defense. He makes saves, but he is also talking to people in front of him. That makes all the difference in the world if you have your keeper talking to you. He's doing an outstanding job."

Colin Yoder played an excellent game for Mississinewa, scoring all three of their goals.

After the first 10 minutes, Marion began to dominate possession, maintaining consistent pressure on Mississinewa's side of the pitch, and in a span of 7:10, they took control of the contest.

At the 24:33 mark of the first half, Powell scored his first goal, giving the Giants a 1-0 lead. Just over four minutes later, Powell collected an assist, firing a perfect cross to the middle to a streaking Fagan, who connected on a beautiful header to make it 2-0.

Coryea capped off the scoring barrage off a perfectly placed free kick from Fagan, giving the Giants a 3-0 advantage with 17:22 to play in the first half.

Evan Yoder, who usually plays in the field for Mississinewa, was forced to play goalkeeper due to injuries and sickness. Facing a lethal Marion offense, Yoder filled in admirably, making eight saves.

Despite the three-goal deficit, the Indians continued to battle throughout the first half. With 6:11 remaining, Colin Yoder broke through the Giants' defense, scoring his first of the evening to trim Marion's lead to 3-1 at the halftime break.

The Indians came out strong in the second half, recording a few high-quality scoring opportunities, but Smith stood tall, keeping it a two-goal game.

Boys Soccer

Coming off their second-place finish at the Northwestern Invitational, the Mississinewa Indians dropped their second straight match last Tuesday evening, falling to the Liberty Christian Lions 3-1. Evan Yoder scored the lone goal for Mississinewa.

On Saturday, after losing to Marion, the Indians dropped their fourth straight contest, failing to score in a 1-0 shutout loss to Delta.

On Thursday, Eastbrook's offense came alive against Eastern in an 8-0 triumph over the Comets. Ben Moser finished with a hot trick, while Sam Spiegal, Bryan Popoca, and Joseph Kerton-Johnson also scored for the Panthers. On Saturday, the Panthers capped off their busy week with a 4-1 triumph over Woodlan on Senior Day. Moser finished with a hat trick.

Marion, fresh off their first victory over Mississinewa, recorded their first conference win of the season on Saturday afternoon, defeating longtime rival Muncie Central 3-1. Kyle Coryea scored two goals, while Alex Powell collected another for the Giants.

Boys Cross Country

At the Taylor Invitational on Saturday, Eastbrook, Marion, and Mississinewa competed and battled hard against a loaded field of runners. The Panthers were led by Thane Syswerda, who placed 42nd in a time of 18 minutes, 45.1 seconds, while Marion's Jonathan Reynolds led the Giants with a time of 20:13.5. Jon Alsup of Mississinewa led the Grant County field with a time of 18:39.3.

Coming off their stellar performance against Marion in week one, the Eastbrook Panthers dropped their first game of the young season on Friday night, falling to the Delta Eagles by a score of 42-28. Jett Engle finished 4-for-6 for 108 yards, a touchdown, and two interceptions, Alden Miller led the rushing attack with 99 yards on 23 carries, and Hayden Raikes caught two passes for 90 yards and a touchdown.

After missing its first game due to COVID-19, Madison-Grant put together an outstanding performance Friday, defeating the Cloverdale Clovers 52-22. Tanner Brooks scored three touchdowns in the Argylls' victory, while Clayton Powell and Trey Vetor each scored twice.
