After a near year of planning and preparation, the Marion-Grant County Chamber of Commerce, in partnership with STAR Financial Bank and IMG, rolled out

their new, exclusive health insurance plan in order to both attract and retain employees and businesses in the current job market.

"Grant County boasts a lot of opportunity for attracting a workforce
that wants to live, work, and play in
Grant County," STAR Financial
spokesman Allen Howard said in a
statement. "This new offering to
Chamber members will allow them
more affordable healthcare options
that also allows them to have better
deductible and out of pocket levels.
This is an exciting opportunity and we
are thrilled to be able to bring this to
Grant County."

When the idea for this new health insurance plan first started to formulate, Marion-Grant County Chamber of Commerce President Kylie Jackson and her team were looking for ways to help businesses alleviate the stress of high health insurance costs.

While this plan is not perfect for everyone, Jackson believes that the plan will help small and mediumsized businesses cut expenses while providing quality health insurance for their employees.

"One thing we have constantly heard from our members is the issue in attracting and retaining talent, and how having a benefit package is a huge part of keeping folks," Jackson said. "Health insurance is obviously a



big component of that. There are some employers that their health insurance is the largest chunk of their expenses.

"That's really what this plan is for. It's not going to be the best fit for everyone – we just want to put one more option out there for our members."

The plan is level-funded, according to Jackson, and includes several perks. Businesses can lower costs by having their employees participate in pre-emptive health screenings, while employees can lower their premiums with regular bloodwork and yearly checkups. Other incentives include deductible and cash-back credits for free telemedicine, free lab services, free diabetic testing supplies and much more.

Additionally, all hospitals and health networks throughout Indiana are in-network.

Marion-Grant County Chamber of Commerce members who participate could see premium savings from 15-50 percent off their current plans, all that is needed to qualify is at least two employees


Drivers from all over the world take turns racing one another down one of the airport's runways, reaching speeds over 200 miles per hour.


