alone,” Wilk said. “It’s about education and empowerment. Ideally, if they are in an abusive relationship, and they can recognize it’s abusive through the groups, we can help them leave that abusive relationship and be free of fear.”

The Relationship Building Group, which is a meeting for victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, and stalking, will meet every Monday beginning on October 5. The meetings will focus, in order, on family traditions with domestic violence recovery, do-



mestic violence cycles with non-partner perpetrators, helping minor children recover from domestic violence, and helping adult children recover from domestic violence.

The HEART group, or Health, Effective, & Adaptive Relationship Techniques, is similar to the Relationship Building Group in the way that it works with those suffering from domestic violence,

sexual violence, and stalking. While their first meeting on Emotional Addictions has already taken place, there are four more on each remaining Thursday throughout the month of October. Beginning on October 8, the HEART group will hold meetings on utilizing “triggers” as guides to healing, promoting mind and body healing, preventing blocks to growth, and creating meaning after trauma.

Those interested in taking part in the meetings must meet with the Hands of Hope outreach advocate because there

is some confidentiality paperwork they will need to fill out. Doing this allows each potential client to receive the links to the meetings in a safe way. The links are changed each week for privacy and confidentiality purposes.

Each meeting is scheduled from 7:00-8:00 pm and will be facilitated by a counselor.

Indiana Wesleyan University receives \$2.5 million Lilly grant

Throughout 2020, Indiana’s colleges and universities persist in their mission to educate our workforce amid unprecedented and rapidly changing needs of learners across the state. Lilly Endowment Inc. has emboldened Indiana’s colleges and universities to address key challenges and pursue opportunities which enhance their relevance, effectiveness, and sustainability. To this end, they have established Charting the Future for Indiana’s Colleges and Universities, a three-phase initiative.

Indiana Wesleyan University has received \$2.5 million as part of the second phase of Charting the Future.

“This is wonderful news for IWU,” IWU President David Wright said. “As has been the case so many times in our experience, Lilly Endowment’s deep commitment to Indiana institutions and to IWU in particular, will play a very important role in helping us prepare for the next generation of our institutional and missional health.”

IWU will use the funds to implement a five-year strategic plan for the Marion residential campus, led by IWU-Marion Chancellor Dr. Rod Reed. Projects include the creation of an Advising Center and a reimagined General Education Curriculum. The Wildcat Innovation Team, a hub for developing

new initiatives on campus, will be launched, as well as a Community Engagement Office, a central office connecting students and faculty with local businesses and service organizations.

This implementation grant was awarded to IWU under the second phase of Charting the Future. In this phase, Lilly Endowment invited proposals that present promising strategies that will result in economies of scale and other cost efficiencies to enhance the viability and financial condition of the institutions and prepare graduates for rewarding employment and to live engaged and meaningful lives, especially in Indiana. Grants under a third phase, which is

competitive, will be awarded in 2021. Those grants will support collaborative efforts that seek to have large-scale impact on the ability of higher education institutions in Indiana to fulfill their educational missions.

“We are so thankful for the generous support of our mission to develop students in character, scholarship and leadership,” Reed said. “This grant will support great initiatives we are pursuing in student thriving, academic excellence, enrollment growth and community engagement. It’s an honor to be able to serve the families of Indiana and our region even more fully through the support of the Lilly Endowment.”
