

Carey Services launches virtual tour

On October 5, Carey Services announced their brand-new online campus virtual tour, giving the community a safe and accessible way to learn about Carey Services and its work in the Grant County and surrounding communities.

Established in 1954, Carey Service is the premier, local provider of employment services, early childhood education service, and other home and community-based services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

However, despite its longevity in the community, there are many who remain unaware of what Carey Services offers the city of Marion.

“One of the things we always know is that people in the community aren’t fully aware of everything we do and how we serve all age groups,” Maynard said. “A year or so ago, we started doing on-campus tours to highlight some of that and bring people in, and then obviously with COVID, that has all gone away.”

With people unable to visit due to the continuing COVID-19 pandemic, Allbaugh, Maynard, and the rest of the Carey Services leadership began to brainstorm how to continue showcasing their campus and programs all while keeping their patients and



offers within their curriculum. Additionally, there are links throughout the tour to documents that discuss a variety of programs in greater detail.

“It’s a very interactive kind of thing where is a lot of information is shared in a very easy-to-use format,” Maynard said. “It’s all 360, so you can see all the ceilings, the floors, and around the whole campus.”

Carey Services’ new virtual tour is the first phase of a multiple-step project. Over the course of the next few months, the virtual tour will be updated, showing off Carey Services’ satellite campuses in places like Wabash and Logansport.

Overall, the virtual tour will be a living, full-functioning document on Carey Services and all they offer Grant County and the whole of Indiana.

“We are trying to engage with more people in the community,” Maynard said. “If people have questions or are curious about something we do or maybe have heard something we do, they can do the tour and find that specific area.

“It’s just a way to be engaging with folks in this time when people are wanting to get out, and it’s something we can share.”

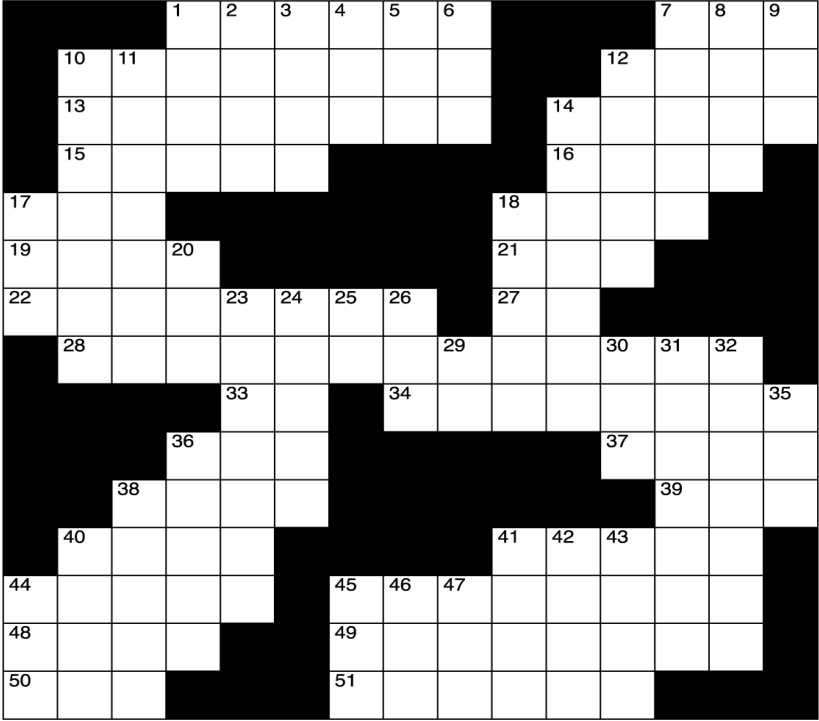
“I am extremely excited to have these valued and informed community members join the Marion campus Board of Trustees,” said

Here’s How It Works:
