IWU completely shut down Marian the rest of the way, ending the set on a 17-6 run. Only three of Marian’s final six points came via their offense.

The third set was one of multiple runs. After IWU took an early 9-8 lead, the Knights racked up three straight points to go up 11-9. The Wildcats answered with a 5-0 run to regain the lead at 14-11, before Marian came back with a 5-0 surge of their own to go back up 16-14.

This pattern continued throughout the final set, as neither team gained any sort of consistent advantage.

Van Note did everything in her power to force a fourth set, recording four kills in

five points to give Marian a 24-22 lead, but the Wildcats never lost their edge, collecting four straight points to secure the sweep and the Crossroads League Tournament championship.

“We just had that championship mentality,” Collar said. “These girls are a special group. We always talk about when Christ is center in everything we do, we really do well together. When you have that mentality, you don’t think about yourself, you think about the girl next to you. We just stuck together.”

With the win, IWU will receive an automatic bid to the NAIA National Championship Tournament, which will take place in the spring.

Girl’s Basketball  
Tuesday, Nov. 10

Against a talented and skilled Norwell team on Tuesday evening, the Mississinewa Indians fell to 0-2 on the season, struggling on the boards and with turnovers in an 84-41 loss to the Knights.

Karmen Swindall and Alayna Webb co-led the Indians with 13 points apiece, while Mia Catey finished with 10 points, seven rebounds, and five steals in the Indians’ loss.

Friday, Nov. 13

Mia Catey and Alayna Webb each put forth strong performances on Friday night, but it was not enough as Mississinewa fell to Wabash, 58-54. Friday night’s loss drops the Indians to 0-3.

Men’s Basketball  
Friday, Nov. 13

In their final non-conference tune-up, Kyle Mangas set another Wildcats’ record, scoring 51 points in No. 3 Indiana Wesleyan’s 114-70 over Oakland City University.

Mangas’ 51 points is a new single-game scoring record, breaking the 29-year record held by Bruce Smith, who scored 44 points against IU-Kokomo back in 1991. Additionally, the 51 points scored were a new career high for Mangas.

Michael Thompson III collected his first double-double of the season, finishing with 17 points on seven-of-nine shooting while grabbing 10 boards.

As a team, the Wildcats shot a scorching 56.6 percent from the floor, while holding Oakland City to just 32.9 percent.

Men’s Soccer

Hosting the Crossroads League Tournament Semifinals on Wednesday evening, Indiana Wesleyan’s fall season came to an end with a 3-2 loss to surging Grace.

The Lancers scored the first two goals of the contest to grab a lead they would relinquish and outshot the Wildcats 23-9, including a 12-4 margin in shots on target. IWU’s nine shots tied their season low.

Phillip Basara scored

twice for the Wildcats in the loss, while Aaron Carr made nine saves in net, his second-most saves in a game this season.

Saturday, Nov. 14

On Saturday afternoon at Odle Arena, Taylor recorded their third-straight, 30-point triumph, defeating Asbury University 99-65.

Madisyn Fischer led the way with 19 points on 58.3 percent shooting, including four three-pointers. Merideth finished with 15 points, knocking down five of her 11 three-point attempts, Lauren James collected 12 points and five assists, and Kayla Kirtley recorded a double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds. Claycee West added 11 points off the bench.

As a team, the Trojans shot 45.2 percent (38-of-84) from the field and 36.4 percent (16-of-44) from beyond the arc, while outrebounding Asbury 63-34.

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
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
