The officers have entrusted Lisa Huber with training the dogs.

"It's important to start with obedience because that's the foundation for the behavior of a good therapy dog. They have to have a lot of opportunities for socialization, interaction with other people and animals, and many opportunities to love," said Huber.

"I have found that a good therapy dog can bring a conversation when there's not a conversation to be had. Sometimes there's heartache and devastation. The dog breaks down barriers," she said.

Biddle and Frost agree. "I have a passion for

keeping the mental health of my departments safe," said Frost.

Biddle added, "Zion has the opportunity to strengthen our officers."

Zion is just beginning his training and finding his place within the department. Biddle brings him to the station a couple of hours a shift to get to know people. Zion will need to be fully trained before he meets the public.

Miro will need a year also to prepare for any public interaction.
