

17, Solomon said, "I tried it all," but verse 18 kind of wraps it all up when he said he was 'unfulfilled.' What Solomon realized after an entire lifetime of seeking and searching is that what he needed had been right under his nose the whole time. I believe there are

many powerful lessons we can learn from Solomon's life, and it is not concerning the

rich and famous. God gave him everything he needed, and God does the same for us. And yet we, many times, find ourselves out hunting what we already have. Take a moment to take inventory of your life. It is not the outward things that bring peace and contentment. It begins on the inside. Let's take a minute and look within, because it is there.
