Zoning ordinace passes to second reading

In the latest Marion Common Council meeting this past Tuesday, General Ordinance No. 6-2021, which would amend Marion City Code Chapter 153 (Zoning Ordinance) for several properties on Euclid Avenue, was passed to second reading, while the Council also adopted a new Electronic Communication Policy.

The measure has been in the works for the past two years, according to Advisory Plan Director Sam Ramsey. Eight home and property owners along Euclid Avenue approached Ramsey before the COVID-19 pandemic, looking to re-zone their

homes from R4, which are classified as Medium Density Single and Multi-Family Residential homes, to R2, which are classified as Medium Density Single Family Residential homes.

Six of the eight owners who own these properties have signed a petition and completed all the necessary paperwork, according to Ramsey.

"The homeowners brought it to us originally," Ramsey said. "We have talked about this quite a bit over the last two years, and after COVID, they finalized their application."

Through the years, many of the homes have been cut down into smaller units and apartments, destroying the historical value of the properties. This restriction of the zoning ordinance will keep the character of one of Marion's most historic neighborhoods intact.

"This area has taken a hit a number of times, and they like to keep it looking nice and moving forward," Councilman Brad Luzadder said. "I support this 100 percent."

The ordinance passed to a second reading by a 6-0 margin together with one abstention.

Later in the meeting, the City of Marion's new Electronic Communications Policy was passed by a unanimous 7-0 margin.

Going forward, and as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the governing body may attend meetings electronically throughout the year, with some stipulations. Council members must be physically present at at least 50 percent of all meetings, and a request to participate electronically must be given within 12 hours of the scheduled meeting. Furthermore, members can attend up to two consecutive meetings electronically.

Council members must attend meetings in person for certain tasks, including the

adopting of a budget, initiating a referendum, imposing or increasing a fee, imposing or increasing a penalty, exercising the Council's power of eminent domain, and establishing, imposing, raising, or renewing a tax.

"I think that this is great," Council Vice President Brian Cowgill said. "I'm glad that [the state] revised it. With the COVID situation alone...I think this helps us have full members participating in our meetings.'

The next Common Council Meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 23 in the Council Chambers beginning at 7 p.m.

One injured in Gas City two vehicle crash

On Thursday approximately 9:36 a.m., officers from the Indiana State Police, the Grant County Sheriff's Office, and the Gas City Police Department responded to a twovehicle crash on State Road 22 at Grant County Road 500 East, in which a Gas City woman was in-

jured.

The preliminary crash investigation by Indiana State Police Senior Trooper Jeremy Perez revealed that Sukhminder Singh, 63, Levittown, NY was driving a 2020 Freightliner semitractor, pulling a box trailer, westbound on State Road 22, approaching a

green light at County Road 500 East. The semi-tractor attempted to turn southbound onto County Road 500 East and pulled into the path of an eastbound 2001 Buick Century. The Buick, driven by Ada Benfield, 94, Gas City, had the right of way with a green light.

Ada was transported, via ambulance, to a local hospital with a severe leg injury. Singh was not injured.

This is an ongoing investigation. At this time neither the consumption of alcoholic beverages nor narcotics is suspected as having contributed to this

crash.

Perez was assisted at the crash scene by Senior Trooper Eric Treon, Senior Trooper A.J. Coffee, the Gas City Police Department, the Grant County Sheriff's Office, and the Gas City Fire Department.
